FY 2004-05 MULTI-YEAR PROJECTION CRITERIA AND ASSUMPTIONS

Beginning Balance:

1. The total unaudited estimated beginning balance (restricted and unrestricted) is projected to be \$799,933. This balance is not expected to increase or decrease as a result of the auditor's review of the District's FY 2003-04 financial records.

Revenue:

- 1. Revenue Limit Sources are based on an estimated P-2 Average Daily Attendance (ADA) of 4,151 multiplied by a Base Revenue Limit of \$4,946.16. This reflects growth of 355 ADA over FY 2003-04. The projected ADA is calculated by multiplying the District's CBEDS' enrollment of 4,369 by 95.00%.
- 2. The Base Revenue Limit per ADA incorporates a 2.41% Cost-of-Living-Allowance (COLA) which equates to a \$117.00 increase over the prior year. In addition, \$15.47 was added for equalization. In accordance with the adopted State budget, the Base Revenue Limit per ADA was then deficited by 2.14%.
- 3. Federal Revenues are based on projected levels of program funding based on the most recent data available from Federal and State agencies, and includes prior year deferred revenue.
- 4. Other State Revenues are based on projected levels of program funding based on information received from various State agencies, and includes prior year deferred revenue.
 - a. K-3 Class Size Reduction (CSR) is based on the current grade configurations and projected student enrollment averages. Two kindergarten classes will not qualify for CSR funding this year since they are stand-alone classes without PM teacher support. The per pupil amount is budgeted at \$928 for the full-day (Option 1 Grades 1-3) program, and \$464 for the half-day (Option 2 Kindergarten) program.
 - b. Based on the School Services of California projection, Lottery revenue is based on \$110.00 per FY 2003-04 P-3 (Annual) ADA; Lottery Instructional Materials are budgeted at \$13.00 per FY 2003-04 P-3 (Annual) ADA.
 - c. \$45,000 was budgeted for Mandated Costs based on actual receipts.

5. Local Revenues reflect transfers from the Placer-Nevada Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) for the District's Special Education Master Plan, the one percent oversight fee for Horizon Instructional Systems, anticipated home-to-school transportation and other fees, interest, and locally managed programs such as ROP, clubs, and events.

Expenditures:

- 1. Step and column salary increases for all certificated, classified, and administrative personnel were applied. Negotiated salary improvements and reclassifications are budgeted.
- 2. All known staffing changes regarding resignations and retirements are incorporated. New teacher positions were converted from the budgeted E-01 placement to actual salaries.
- 3. The health and welfare benefit budget is based on the actual cost of benefits as designated by the employees. The benefit cap is set at Kaiser + child, vision, dental, salary protection, and life insurance.
- 4. Statutory payroll benefits are projected to be as follows:

State Teachers Retirement System (STRS)	8.250%
Public Employees Retirement System (PERS)	9.95%
Social Security	6.200%
Medicare	1.450%
Workers' Compensation Insurance	3.260%
State Unemployment Insurance	0.065%
PERS Reduction	3.070%

Most of the above0referenced payroll rates remained essentially the same; however, Workers Compensation Insurance increased by 1.17% of the total District payroll, and State Unemployment Insurance more than doubled from a prior year rate of .030%

5. Site discretionary budgets were calculated by multiplying the site's 2003 CBEDS count by the per student allocation. Typically, the per student allocation is adjusted each year to reflect the District's COLA; however, due to budget constraints, the COLA was not applied. Please accept this letter as notification and public notice by the California School Employees Association Chapter #741, as to our intent to open negotiations for a successor agreement to our current contract. We intend to discuss and negotiate the following language in the current contract, in the effort of finalizing a three-year agreement:

- 1. Article 2 <u>Organization Rights-</u> we intend to negotiate release time for chapter representatives so that they may conduct Association business.
- 2. Article 3 <u>Terms and Conditions of Employment</u> we intend to negotiate a job sharing plan, discuss overtime, compensatory time, shift differential and work assignments. We also intend to negotiate Transportation language including but not limited to: definitions, bus routes, bumping, extra routes, special trip assignments, summer schedule, driver preparation, parent conference time and driver requirements
- 3. Article 4 <u>Employee Benefits</u>- we intend to negotiate a fair and equitable increase to Health, welfare and retirement benefits.
- 4. Article 5 <u>Leaves</u> negotiate that two of the seven days of personal necessity leave will be "don't ask, don't tell" days.
- 5. Article 6 <u>Salaries</u>- we intend to negotiate a fair and equitable increase to the salary schedule.
- 6. Article 7 <u>Vacancies/Transfers/Promotions</u>- negotiate over the access and ability to transfer, compensation guidelines for transfers of step E employees, and further define the ability of bargaining unit employees to promote.
- 7. Article 9 <u>Layoff and Reemployment</u>- negotiate notification language in order to be compliant with Ed Code 45117.
- 8. Article 10 <u>Grievances</u> we intend to negotiate over grievance procedure.

- 9. Article 11 <u>Disciplinary Action</u>- we intend to negotiate cause, procedure, and arbitration.
- 10. Article 12 <u>Negotiation Procedures</u>- negotiate the number of Association Representatives who will receive release time for negotiations.
- 11. <u>Duration</u> a new successor agreement being effective July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2007

BACKGROUND:

As described in prior meetings, the Board is being asked to evaluate current criteria used to grant interdistrict agreements. To assist with the process, the criteria included in Administrative Regulation 5117.1 have been grouped by area on the attached documents. All criteria except letter "a", which is a restatement of Education Code, are permissive. The Board will be asked to discuss the criteria under each grouping. Regulation 5117.1 will be returned to the Board for approval at the second meeting in January.

The other reason used for interdistict agreements is establishing student residency through employment (AR 5111.12). This policy is included for information/discussion under another item.

After action on the Administrative Regulation, a parent guidebook will be authored and the policies will be implemented for the coming school year.

ADMINISTRATION'S RECOMMENDATION:

No action is required on this item.

Interdistrict Transfer Board Policy

Reason

Comment

The Superintendent or designee may approve interdistrict agreements based upon the following reasons:

Child Care

a. To meet the child care needs of the student. Once a student has been admitted to a district school on the basis of child care needs, continued attendance will be encouraged. Students in grades 1 thru 6 who have been admitted on an interdistrict transfer based upon child care needs will not have to reapply for readmission unless the student ceases to receive child care in the district. Transfers approved based upon the child care needs of students in grades 7 thru 12 shall be subject to reapproval each year. (Education Code 46601.5)

a. This is updated language stated in Education Code.

Family Connection

b. When the student has brother(s) or sister(s) attending school in the school district.

b. If a family is approved using this reason, they will probably not return to the district if there are siblings.

Physical or Metal Health

- c. To meet a child's special mental or physical health needs, as certified by a physician, school psychologist or other appropriate school personnel.
- $c.\ Documentation\ required.$
- d. To provide a change in school environment for reasons of personal and social adjustment.
- d. A wide range of situations can fit into this reason.
- e. When recommended by the School Attendance Review Board or by county child welfare, probation or social service agency staff in documented cases of serious home or community problems, which make it inadvisable for the student to attend the school of residence.
- e. Supports students needing support from outside agencies.

Maintenance of Social Group

f. To allow students to remain with a class graduating that year from an elementary, junior or senior high school.

f. We typically describe "graduation" as completion of high school only

- g. To complete a school year when parents/guardians have moved during the school year.

As part of the interdistrict agreement improvement process, the Board is being asked to discuss AR 5111.12. This policy delineates the process students may use to establish residency outside of our district while residing within Western Placer Unified School District.

SUPERINTENDENT'S RECOMMENDATION:

The administration recommends discussion of the items.

WESTERN PLACER UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

AR 5111.12 (a)

STUDENTS

Residency Based on Parent/Guardian Employment

District residency status may be granted to an elementary grade student if the student's parent/guardian works within the district boundaries. Proof of the parent/guardian's employment within the district shall be required prior to initial enrollment. (Education Code 48204)

District residency status may be granted to a student whose parent/guardian is employed within district boundaries. (Education Code 48204)

(cf. 5111.1 - District Residency) (cf. 5117 - Interdistrict Attendance)

Applications for Admission

When applying for his/her child's admission to a district school based on employment, the parent/guardian shall provide proof of employment within district boundaries, such as a paycheck stub or letter from his/her employer.

The Governing Board may deny enrollment based on parent/guardian employment if any of the following circumstances exists:

- 1. The additional cost of educating the student would exceed the amount of additional state aid received as a result of the transfer. (Education Code 48204)
- 2. Enrollment of the student would adversely affect the district's court-ordered or voluntary desegregation plan. (Education Code 48204)
- 3. The school facilities are overcrowded at the relevant grade level.
- Other circumstances exist that are not arbitrary. (Education Code 48204)

The student's parent/guardian shall be notified in writing of the Board's decision to deny admission. The notice shall include specific reasons for the denial. (Education Code 48204)

Residency Based on Parent/Guardian Employment (continued)

Students enrolled in the district on the basis of parent/guardian employment shall not be ebliged required to reapply for enrollment in subsequent the next school years Such students They may continue to attend school in the district through the highest grade provided by the district, if the parent/guardian so chooses, and if one or both of the student's parents/guardians continue to be employed within district boundaries 12th grade, subject to restrictions specified in law related to excess costs and negative impact on desegregation plans. (Education Code 48204)

District Students Attending Other Districts Based on Parent/Guardian Employment

When a student's parents/guardians request a transfer to another district based on the parent/guardian's employment within that other district, the Board may deny the request if the percentage of district students admitted to other districts on the basis of parent/guardian employment exceeds the limits (1% of ADA) prescribed in Education Code 48204.

A transfer may also be denied if the Board determines that the transfer would negatively impact a court-ordered or voluntary desegregation plan. (Education Code 48204)

The student's parent/guardian shall be notified in writing of the Board's decision to deny the transfer to the school district in which the parent/guardian's employer is situated. The notice shall include specific reasons for the denial.

If more than 1% (percent) of the district's ADA or 75 students, whichever is greater, are admitted to other districts on the basis of parent/guardian place of employment, the Board may dony any further transfers out of the district on this basis. (Education Code 48204)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the district of residence of all children requesting admittance into the district on the basis of parent/guardian place of employment. Unless approved by the student's current district of attendance, no student shall be admitted into the district on the basis of a parent/guardian place of employment in excess of the limits imposed by law.

The student's parent/guardian shall be notified in writing of the Board's decision to deny admission or transfer out of the district. The notice shall include specific reasons for the denial. (Education Code 48204)

Notifications sent to parents/guardians at the beginning of each year shall include information about employment-based school attendance options. (Education Code 48980)
