Boyle/Lyons (10-11 G & O Component IV, V)

•As the technology capabilities and infrastructure of district school sites were evaluated last year, it became evident that Lincoln High School was in need of upgrades to its networking security, speed and reliability. LHS currently utilizes 25% of the District's network resources with increasing demands for faster, ubiquitous access. Bids were advertised and taken for needed wiring upgrades. The enclosed proposal includes new Category 6 data cabling to all classroom spaces, optical fiber where needed, and managed switching equipment, allowing for 10 data drops per classroom: 4 for student use, 4 for teacher use, and 2 for overhead presentation. This upgrade will increase the speed and reliability of the network as well as providing for greatly increased security.

•Last spring, the Board approved a revised job description for the Behavior Analyst position and its inclusion on the Classified Management salary schedule. Mr. Leaman recommended moving forward with the GO Bond. He discussed the next steps, and reported the county requires that the Board call for an election no less than 125 days before the desired election date. The June 22nd Board meeting will be the District's last opportunity to approve documents needed for a November 2010 election. The Board would need to approve a resolution calling for the election.

In moving forward, the State requires before you move forward to hardship, you are required to pursue a GO Bond prior to applying for a hardship.

8. PUBLIC HEARING

Based on meeting certain criteria set forth in Senate Bill 50, the District is authorized to collect residential developer fees over-and-above the Level I rate established by the State Allocation Board. The fee, based upon the criteria outlined in the School Facilities Needs Analysis and Justification Study, known as Level II fees, is proposed to be \$4.21 per square foot of residential development. This is a decrease from the \$4.74 the Board adopted in February 2009 due to a lower site development and acquisition costs.

Mr. Carras opened the public hearing for Establishing School Fees in Accordance with the Provision of Senate Bill 50.

BEHAVIOR ANALYST JOB DESCRIPTION AND SALARY

STRUCTURE - Boyle/Noyes (09-10 G & O Component I, II, III, IV, V)

• Over the past two years, the District has brought back several intensive Special Education programs from Placer County Office of Education, thereby providing our students with services within our local schools at a more affordable cost to our district. Those programs have included preschool and elementary programs for both Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Language Intensive (LI) students, and a secondary program for Emotionally Disturbed (ED) students.

Mr. Haley, Vice President took over the board meeting, while Board President Paul Carras excused himself for a brief moment.

Mary Boyle reported the reason for the change of the behavior analyst job description and salary structure. After some research, feels the need to replace the Behaviorist certification for the counseling credential. The change in job description will remove the position from Certificated Salary schedule to Classified Management position. Motion by Mr. Carras, seconded by Mr. Long, and passed by a 4-0 vote to change the job description and salary structure of the Behavior Analyst position.

9.5 Action

SUBJECT MATTER VERIFICATION ED. CODE 44258.3 -

Noyes (09-10 G & O Component I, III, IV, V)

• With the involvement of appropriate subject matter specialist, the Superintendent or designee shall develop and employ procedures for verifying the subject matter knowledge of teachers assigned to teach in departmentalized classes outside their credential authorization pursuant to mentor teachers, curriculum specialists, resource teachers, classroom teachers certified to teach a subject, staff to regional subject matter projects or curriculum institutes, or college faculty. (Education Code 44258.3)

Mr. Carras resumed his status as Board President.

Bob Noyes reported the reason approval of subject matter verification is needed on the list of certificated teachers. Motion by Mr. Long, seconded by Mrs. Stevenson, and passed by a 4-0 vote to approve the subject matter verification education code 44258.3.

SPECIAL TAX RATE - Allen (09-10 G & O Component I, II, III, IV, V)

• The CFD's special tax rate shall be adjusted at the beginning of each fiscal year by an escalation factor not to exceed 7% in any one year. The determination shall be made based upon the Engineering News Record's Construction Cost Index as of December 1 prior to the classification date. The escalation factor for FY 2010-11 is calculated at 0.73%. The escalation factor increases the CFD's amount for new residential development from \$5.90 per square foot of living space to \$5.95 in CFD No. 1 and from 0..3896 to 0.3924 in CFD No. 2 respectively. Because this falls under the 4% increase threshold, no approval by City of Lincoln's City Council will be required.

Cathy Allen explained the reason for the special tax increase for new construction and of new homes that have not yet been sold. Motion by Mr. Long, seconded by Mrs. Stevenson and passed by a 4-0 roll call vote to approve Resolution 09/10.22 authorizing the Community Facility Districts (CFD) No. 1 and No.2 special tax rate. Roll call vote: Stevenson, Haley, Long, Carras

ADOPT SCHOOL FACILITIES MASTER PLAN DATED JUNE 2010 - Allen (09-10 G & O Component I, III, IV, V)

• The School Facilities Master Plan for the Western Placer Unified School District, dated June 2010, has been being formulated for the past two years in order to have a solid foundation in which we can plan for current facilities, future facilities and ultimately build out of the District. The School Facilities Master Plan also includes addendums that are reports from the Facilities Needs Committee, Lincoln High School site master plan and Glen Edwards Middle School site master plan.

Cathy Allen handed out pages 53, 54, 55 and 56 which had corrections in the Facilities Master Plan. Motion by Mrs. Stevenson, seconded by Mr. Haley

and passed by a 4-0 vote to approve the adoption the School Facilities Master Plan.

Cathy Allen introduced Cathy Daminco of Capital Finance. She explained the purpose of the resolution needed for the obligation bond, changes in bond amount of \$163 million, and the wording of the resolution to be submitted to the County Elections Department. This is a 10 year plan along with the existing facilities. Motion by Mrs. Stevenson, seconded by Mr. Haley, and passed by a 4-0 roll call vote to approve Resolution No. 09/10.23 for General Obligation Bond on November 2, 2010 election. Brian handed out a list of Do's and don't of an obligation bond. Public monies can not be spent on the bond. District funds can only be used to educate the public. No district resources can be used to support the bond. The district can inform but cannot advocate.

EPS will prepare an analysis in support of the annual continuing disclosure and other analyses. This task also will include any other analysis of funding strategies for school facilities as directed by the District.

Schedule

By June 1, 2010, EPS will submit the FY 2010–11 annual tax levy and preliminary tax report to the District for review. After making any edits, the tax levy will be provided to the District electronically by June 4, 2010, and transmitted to the County Auditor-Controller by July 31, 2010.

Budget

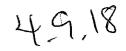

SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT LOWER-EMISSION SCHOOL BUS PROGRAM - BUS REPLACEMENT AGREEMENT

This Agreement (Agreement) is between the Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District (SMAQMD), a California local public agency and Western Placer Unified School District (Participant).

1.0. Recitals

- The SMAQMD is part of the Federal Sacramento Ozone Nonattainment Area (SFNA or Nonattainment 11 Area). (A map of the Nonattainment Area is included in Exhibit A) Ozone is formed by the interaction of Nitrogen Oxides (NOx) and other precursor pollutants. The majority of NOx in the Sacramento Nonattainment Area is generated by vehicles, including heavy-duty vehicles and engines.
- The SMAQMD is the local agency within the boundaries of Sacramento County with the primary 1.2. responsibility for the development, implementation, monitoring, and enforcement of air pollution control strategies, clean fuel programs, and motor vehicle use reduction measures under Health and Safety Code Section 40961.
- The SMAQMD is authorized by Health and Safety Code Sections 41062(a) and 41082 to implement 1.3. programs to reduce transportation emissions, including programs to encourage the use of alternative fuels and low-emission vehicles.
- Through a series of SMAQMD Board of Directors actions beginning in 1996, the SMAQMD adopted the 1.4. Heavy-Duty Low Emission Vehicle Incentive Program (HDLEV Program), and authorized the Air Pollution Control Officer, in consultation with the SMAQMD Counsel, to make revisions to the Program from time to time. The HDLEV Program incorporates the Lower-Emission School Bus Program (LESBP). Both the HDLEV Program and LESBP are incorporated by reference into this Agreement and will be referred to collectively as the "Program."
- The LESBP was established by the CARB in 2000 as a grant program to fund the purchase of new 1.5. school buses to replace old, high-polluting public school buses, and to equip in-use diesel public school buses with retrofit devices. The primary goal of this program is to reduce school children's exposure to both cancer-causing and smog-forming pollution. The replacement of old, high-emitting public school buses and the addition of diesel particulate filters (DPF), also known as retrofit devices, significantly reduce both NOx and toxic particulate matter emissions, thereby, reducing school children's exposure to diesel-related pollution.
- The California Air Resources Board (CARB) has defined particulate matter (PM) from diesel-fueled 1.6. vehicles and engines as a toxic air contaminant. CARB and air districts recognize that PM emissions from diesel-fueled engines and vehicles are a serious public health concern, and that PM poses an increased risk to school age children because children are more susceptible to PM's harmful health effects.
- In November 2006, Proposition 1B, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security 1.7 Bond Act of 2006 was approved. Proposition 1B provides \$200 million for school bus retrofit and replacement to reduce air pollution and to reduce children's exposure to diesel exhaust, and enabling Legislation, Senate Bill 88 (Stats 2007 Ch 181), prescribes the funding criteria and other requirements for the expenditure of the Proposition 1B funds, while Governor Schwarzenegger's Executive Order S-02-07 (EO S-02-07) contains further directives to ensure robust fund accountability and program oversiaht.
- On March 27, 2008, the California Air Resources Board issued their Lower-Emission School Bus 1.8 Program Guidelines. The LESBP allows larger air districts to administer the program on behalf of neighboring air districts.

- 1.9 SMAQMD Resolution No. 2008-031 authorized the Air Pollution Control Officer (APCO), in consultation with the SMAQMD Counsel, to implement the LESBP in Sacramento and administer the Program for other, smaller air districts in California.
- 1.10 SMAQMD is executing this Agreement on behalf of the Placer County Air Pollution Control District/ Air Quality Management District (PCAPCD), and (PCAPCD) is responsible for providing the funds referenced in paragraph 2.3.2.
- 1.11 Under LESBP, the SMAQMD will provide financial incentives for replacement school buses to public school district bus fleet owners that meet the criteria defined in the adopted LESBP Guidelines, approved on March 27, 2008. The criteria must also comply with the most recent motor vehicle federal safety standards, and if applicable, the joint funding source requirements.
- 1.12 This Agreement will help fund the replacement of old, high-emitting public school buses to significantly reduce toxic particulate matter emissions, thereby, reducing school children's exposure to diesel-related pollution.
- 1.13 Participant understands that the purpose of the Program, and this Agreement, is to help SMAQMD achieve clean air standards as required by state and federal law.
- 1.14 Participant wishes to participate in the Program by using Proposition 1B LESBP funds, and/or the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the United States Department of Energy (DOE), as applicable, in the purchase of replacement diesel or alternative fuel school buses that meet CARB's emission criteria as defined in the Lower-Emission School Bus Program Guidelines, adopted on March 27, 2008.
- 1.15 The parties specifically recognize that CARB, EPA, and DOE, as applicable, are third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement and have the right to audit compliance with the Agreement, including conducting inspections, and have the right to enforce Participant's compliance with the terms of the Agreement.

2.0. Special Terms and Conditions

The parties agree to the terms and conditions listed below.

- 2.1. **Definitions:** As used in this Agreement, the following terms have the following meanings:
 - 2.1.1 "1977-1986 School Bus" means a diesel or gasoline powered, heavy-duty engine school bus with an engine model year between 1977 and 1986.
 - 2.1.2 "Certified" means a motor vehicle or engine that is certified by CARB or EPA to an emission standard or standards.
 - 2.1.3 "Dealership" means a business that has entered into an agreement with SMAQMD to assist in the implementation of the LESBP and that specializes in the sale of new and used school buses or in the installation of specific retrofitting equipment.
 - 2.1.4 "Dismantle or Destroy" means to punch, crush, stamp, hammer, shred, or otherwise render permanently and irreversibly incapable of functioning as originally intended, any vehicle or vehicle part. The vehicle or equipment is rendered permanently incapable of passing a California Highway Patrol (CHP) inspection or is otherwise deemed permanently illegal to operate on public roads.
 - 2.1.5 **"Existing School Bus"** means the pre-1987, diesel or gasoline powered, heavy-duty engine school bus listed in Exhibit B that meets the March 27, 2008 LESBP Guideline criteria, and that the Program Participant surrenders for destruction.

- 2.1.6 **"Experimental Permit"** means an Executive Order issued by CARB for the experimental use of a non-certified or non-verified engine, fuel, or engine retrofit in California.
- 2.1.7 **"Funding Partner"** means any agency that awards a grant through the SMAQMD to Participant.
- 2.1.8 "Hybrid Vehicle" means any vehicle that can draw propulsion energy from both of the following on-vehicle sources of stored energy: 1) consumable fuel, and 2) a rechargeable energy storage system.
- 2.1.9 "In Regular Use" means that the Existing School Bus was routinely used each school day to transport school children to and from school.
- 2.1.10 "New Equipment" means the on-road motor vehicles, devices, and/or emission control systems funded under this Agreement and identified in Exhibit B.
- 2.1.11 "Participant Agreement" means the LESBP Agreement between SMAQMD and a Program Participant, under which SMAQMD agrees to pay the Program Participant a specific amount to help offset the cost of purchasing a qualifying replacement school bus from Dealership.
- 2.1.12 **"Pre-1977 School Bus"** means a diesel or gasoline powered, heavy-duty engine school bus with a chassis manufactured on or before April 1, 1977.
- 2.1.13 "Pre-1987 School Bus" refers to both pre-1977 chassis model year buses and 1977-1986 engine model year school buses.
- 2.1.14 "Project Completion" means the project post-inspection has confirmed that the new equipment is operational. Project Completion cannot occur before the date of execution of the Participant Agreement.
- 2.1.15 **"Project Implementation"** means the period following Project Completion, during which period the participant must meet the performance obligation in Exhibit C.
- 2.1.16 **"Program"** means the CARB Lower-Emission School Bus Program as adopted by CARB on March 27, 2008 which are incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth.
- 2.1.17 "Program Participant" means a public school district or Joint Powers Authorities (JPA) formed by several school districts in California that owns their own buses and is receiving funds to aid in the purchase of the Replacement School Bus.
- 2.1.18 "Reimbursement Formula" is the following calculation for determining the level of funds to be returned to the SMAQMD if Participant fails to meet the operational requirements of the Agreement:

- 2.1.20 "Retrofit or Particulate Matter Control Device" means the installation of one or more devices designed to reduce emissions from a heavy-duty diesel engine.
- 2.1.21 "Verified" means a device, fuel, or system that is verified by CARB or EPA to reduce emissions from a mobile source by a verified amount.
- Agreement: The Participant agrees to replace existing pre-1987 school buses with newer, low emission school buses as approved by the California Air Resources Board Lower-Emission School Bus Program Guidelines approved on March 27, 2008, and to meet the minimum operational requirement specified in paragraph 2.4.2 and Exhibit C. Participant will purchase and operate newer, low emission school bus(es) that replace the following:

ONE () pre-1977 replacement school bus(es); or

ZERO (0) 1977-1986 replacement school bus(es)

2.3 Payment:

- 2.3.1 SMAQMD will pay up to \$140,000 to Participant to aid in the purchase of the New Equipment identified in Exhibit B. No payment is required until: (i) the Participant commences operation, as required under paragraph 2.4.1 (Time), (ii) the Participant submits a Payee Data Record form, as required under paragraph 2.3.4, and (iii) the Participant satisfies the requirements in paragraph 2.6 (Inspections) and 2.7 (Invoices).
- 2.3.2 **Match Funding**: The LESBP program requires \$25,000 in match funding for each 1977-1986 replacement school bus. This Agreement is subject to the following:

2.3.4 Payments made under this Agreement may be subject to taxation. Participants are encouraged to consult with a tax professional regarding the taxability of payments from this program. Participant is not entitled to payment until it submits a completed W-9 form to the County of Sacramento prior to payment. The County of Sacramento will report the payment to both the State of California and the United States Treasury and will issue an IRS Form 1099 to the Participant.

2.4 Participant Obligations: Participant must:

- 2.4.1 **Time:** Purchase and begin operating the New Equipment described in Exhibit B: (i) within 180 days of the execution of this Agreement by all parties, (ii) before the deadlines outlined in the March 27, 2008 LESBP Guidelines, or (iii) before the deadlines associated with the joint funding source identified in Exhibit F, which ever occurs first. Participant may submit a written request to extend this time frame if it is unable to comply with the deadline due to circumstances outside Participant's reasonable control. No extension will be granted, regardless of the circumstances, if the new deadline would conflict with deadlines under the LESBP or the joint funding source.
- 2.4.2 **Operation:** Meet the operational requirements of Exhibit C for each item of New Equipment described in Exhibit B, and (i) operate the New Equipment in a manner that is consistent with the Program eligibility requirements, the goals and objectives of the Program, the terms of this Agreement, and all local, state, and federal rules, laws, and regulations, (ii) insure that at least 75% of the total operation of the New Equipment occurs within California.
- 2.4.3 **Equipment Warranties:** Secure New Equipment Warranties and operate the New Equipment within the manufacturer's specifications, including all maintenance and fueling requirements.
- 2.4.4 **Engine Calibration:** Ensure that the New Equipment is only operated when it is calibrated to the lowest emission standard certified by CARB or EPA, which ever is lower.

2.4.5 Additional Devices Requirements:

- 2.4.5.1 **Electronic Monitoring Unit:** If requested by the SMAQMD, install an EMU and provide proof of installation within 90 days of the request.
- 2.4.5.2 **Usage Meter:** Install an operational odometer or other SMAQMD approved usage measuring device on the Equipment.
- 2.4.5.3 Particulate Controls: Install a SMAQMD-approved and CARB verified particulate matter control device if not already installed by the manufacturer of the replacement bus. Installation may be waived if Participant obtains a certification from a SMAQMD-approved Engine Dealership stating that no such device has been approved or certified for use with the Replacement Vehicle.
- 2.4.5.4 Notice and Repair: Notify the SMAQMD immediately if the EMU (or other approved device) or particulate device fails or becomes inoperable, and repair the devices as soon as practicable. Prepare a written record of any usage not recorded by the EMU or other approved device while repairs are pending.

2.4.6 Destruction of Existing School Bus:

- (i) Participant must release the existing school bus, along with the signed vehicle title, to a SMAQMD-approved salvage yard to be dismantled and destroyed within 7 business days of receiving CHP safety certification authorizing the use of the replacement school bus. No part of the existing school bus can be re-used.
- (ii) Participant must insure that the existing school bus is in CHP safety certified operating condition when Participant delivers it to a SMAQMD-approved salvage yard.

- (iii) Obtain the SMAQMD's approval of an alternative to surrender for salvage. The SMAQMD may approve an alternative if there are special circumstances that justify the alternative approach and the alternative will not have a detrimental impact on air quality.
- 2.4.7 **Decals:** If requested by the SMAQMD, display two decals approved by the SMAQMD on the New Equipment. The SMAQMD must approve the location of the decals.
- 2.4.8 **Program Guidelines:** Comply with all other requirements detailed in this Agreement and the Program.
- 2.4.9 **Disclosures:** Complete Exhibit G and, if this Agreement requires approval by the Board of Directors, Exhibit H.
- 2.5 Participant's Warranties: The Participant warrants that:
 - (i) It has completed a LESBP Application Form and all of the information presented in the Form is complete and accurate. Participant's Application for the LESBP is incorporated by reference in this Agreement.
 - (ii) Both the Existing Vehicle, Engine or Equipment and the New Equipment meet all of the criteria established in the Program Guidelines in effect at the time this Agreement is signed, as well as the goals and objectives of the Program.
 - (iii) The purchase of the New Equipment described in Exhibit B is not required by any law or regulation. If the Participant is a public agency, Participant further warrants that its board policies do not require the purchase. Paragraph 2.5(iii) is not applicable to school bus projects funded by the Lower-Emission School Bus Program.
 - (iv) It will not make any modifications to, or tamper with the New Equipment, engine, emission control system or any recording devices on the New Equipment, and will not modify engine performance (including changes in horsepower), emission characteristics, engine emission components (not including repairs with substantially similar original equipment manufacturer replacement parts), or the engine's emission control function in any manner.
 - (v) It has read and agrees to all requirements of the Program application and guidelines, including the applicable CARB LESBP Guidelines. The Participant also agrees to read and meet all subsequent revisions to and advisories regarding the CARB LESBP Guidelines.
- 2.6 Inspections and Audits: The New Equipment funded under this Agreement is subject to inspection by SMAQMD, CARB, the State of California Department of Finance (DOF), or Funding Partner(s), as applicable, or their designees at any time. Any inspection will be conducted at a reasonable time and with reasonable notice to Participant. Inspections will include the pre-, post-, salvage, and audit inspections identified in paragraphs 2.6.1 to 2.6.4.
 - 2.6.1 **Pre-inspection:** SMAQMD will conduct a pre-inspection of the Existing Vehicle, Engine or Equipment, if any, to verify that the Existing Vehicle, Engine or Equipment qualifies for funding and that the information supplied in the Participant's application is correct.
 - 2.6.2 **Post-inspection:** SMAQMD will conduct an inspection after the New Equipment is purchased and (if necessary) installed to verify that the New Equipment meets the Program requirements.

- 2.6.3 Salvage Inspection: SMAQMD may conduct a pre-salvage inspection to ensure that, at the time of salvage, the Existing Vehicle, Engine or Equipment, if any to be destroyed, is in the same condition it was in at the pre-inspection. If the condition of the Existing Vehicle, Engine or Equipment has changed, SMAQMD may deny or decrease the payment authorized under paragraph 2.3 (Payment). SMAQMD will conduct a salvage inspection to verify destruction or disposal of the Existing Vehicle, Engine or Equipment, if applicable.
- 2.6.4 Audit Inspection: SMAQMD, CARB, or Funding Partner(s), as applicable, or their designees will conduct audit inspections as necessary to verify the New Equipment is operating pursuant to program guidelines and meeting contractual requirements. SMAQMD, CARB, or Funding Partner(s), as applicable, or their designees may perform a fiscal audit of the project at any time during the Project Implementation period.
- 2.7 **Invoice Requirements:** The Participant must submit a final invoice packet to SMAQMD. This requirement may be met by submission of the documents by a Dealership on Participant's behalf. The final invoice packet must include copies of:
 - 2.7.1 **Purchase Order Documentation:** A copy of the final purchase order. The purchase order must include the assumed delivery date of each replacement school bus and the Dealership's Liquidated Damages clause set forth in March 27, 2008 LESBP Guidelines.
 - 2.7.2 Final Invoice Documentation: A copy of (i) the New Equipment invoice, and (ii) copies of all invoice documents associated with the purchase and installation of New Equipment described in Exhibit B, detailing costs associated with parts, labor, and miscellaneous charges, including a copy of the Program Participant final itemized invoice, invoices for work performed to meet LESBP eligibility requirements, and the finance agreement for any portion of the New Equipment purchase price to be privately financed. The documentation must include the odometer or hour meter reading (whichever is applicable) on the date the New Equipment is financed.

SMAQMD will not release any funds until Participant or Dealership on Participant's behalf submits a final invoice that includes the following information:

- (i) Name, address and phone number of Participant
- (ii) Name, address and phone number of Dealership
- (iii) Purchase order date
- (iv) Vehicle Identification Number, model year, manufacturer, engine model year, horsepower rating, serial number, and fuel type of each replacement school bus funded
- (v) Cost of each replacement school bus including essential or standard equipment and tax
- (vi) Date Participant accepted delivery of each replacement school bus
- (vii) Odometer reading on the date each replacement school bus is delivered and accepted by Participant
- (viii) Name of lienholder(s) for each replacement school bus
- 2.7.3 DMV Registration: If the New Equipment is an on-road vehicle, a copy of the DMV registration for the New Equipment, listing Participant as the registered owner and SMAQMD as lienholder on the New Equipment.
- 2.7.4 **Engine Warranty:** A copy of an engine warranty that verifies the New Equipment meets the Program requirements.

- 2.7.5 **Usage Meter Installation:** Copy of an invoice documenting that an odometer, hour meter or other SMAQMD-approved tracking device has been purchased and installed on the New Equipment, and a written confirmation by Dealership that the meter is operational.
- 2.7.6 Particulate Control Device: A copy of an invoice verifying that a SMAQMD approved, CARB verified diesel emission control system has been installed on the New Equipment, or a certification by the Dealership that no such device has been approved or certified for use with the New Equipment. If a device is installed, include a written confirmation by the Dealership that the device is operational.
- 2.7.7 **Proof of Insurance:** A copy of proof of insurance demonstrating compliance with paragraph 3.6 and Exhibit D.
- 2.7.8 **Proof of Cost Share Payment:** Documents showing proof of the Participant cost share payment for the New Equipment, if applicable.
- 2.7.9 **CHP Inspection:** A copy of the CHP safety certification (CHP form 292) authorizing the use of the replacement school bus.
- 2.8 **Title and Finance Requirements:** If this Agreement is for the purchase of a new vehicle, the Participant agrees to the following motor vehicle title and finance requirements:
 - (i) The Participant must provide a copy of the vehicle's title to the SMAQMD, demonstrating that the SMAQMD is named as a lienholder of the vehicle. If the SMAQMD is the sole lienholder, Participant will provide the original title to the SMAQMD.
 - (ii) The Participant must be the registered owner of the vehicle throughout the term of this Agreement.
 - (iii) If the vehicle is financed, the Participant must list the SMAQMD and the Finance Company as lienholders for the vehicle.
 - (iv) If the vehicle is financed, and the vehicle loan is repaid before the termination of this Agreement, the Participant must ensure that the SMAQMD is listed as the sole lienholder on the vehicle for the entire remaining term of this Agreement.
 - (v) If the vehicle is repossessed by the finance company, the Participant must immediately notify the SMAQMD and must reimburse the SMAQMD in accordance with paragraph 2.10 (Reimbursements).
 - (vi) Any changes to the vehicle's title must be pre-approved in writing by the SMAQMD.

2.9 Termination:

2.9.1 General:

- 2.9.1.1 The SMAQMD may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, if it determines that there is an illegal or improper use of funds.
- 2.9.1.2 This Agreement may be terminated by the SMAQMD under Paragraph 3.15.2 (5-day Notice Termination) after 30 days' written notice to the Participant to meet the obligations established in this Agreement or outlined in the Lower-Emission School Bus Program Guidelines or the Health and Safety Code. If the Agreement is terminated, the Participant will be subject to Paragraph 2.10.3 (Early-Termination Reimbursements). The APCO may, at his or her discretion, waive the refund or allow the Participant further opportunity to cure its failure to meet the Agreement obligations. Additionally, the SMAQMD and/or CARB may seek all available remedies for breaches of any Agreement provisions, Program requirements, or Health and Safety Code.

4.9.26

- 2.9.2 **Limitation:** Notwithstanding the provisions of this Paragraph, the Participant is subject to the reimbursement requirements of paragraph 2.10 (Reimbursements), which are in addition to, and do not offset or displace, any other recovery rights that the SMAQMD may have in the event the contract is breached.
- 2.9.3 **Funding:** The parties acknowledge that this Agreement will be funded by incentive fund revenues from other agencies; however, the SMAQMD may terminate this Agreement if: (i) it does not receive all or a portion of the revenues, or (ii) funds are not specifically appropriated for this Agreement in the SMAQMD's final budget prior to the expiration of the Agreement and any Agreement extensions. If the SMAQMD terminates this Agreement under this paragraph, it will serve notice of the action on the Participant within 10 working days.
- 2.10 Reimbursements: Notwithstanding the provisions in paragraph 2.9 (Termination), the Participant is subject to the reimbursement requirements of this Paragraph, which are in addition to, and do not offset or displace, any other recovery rights that the SMAQMD may have in the event the contract is terminated or breached. If the Participant fails to fulfill the minimum operational requirements by the termination date in paragraph 2.16 (Term), it must refund a pro rata portion of the \$140,000 to the SMAQMD.
 - 2.10.1 Reimbursement Determination: The SMAQMD will determine whether a reimbursement is required after reviewing the annual reports required under paragraph 2.11 (Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements). If the Participant has failed to submit a report for any year, the SMAQMD may assume that none of the operational requirements were met for that year.
 - 2.10.2 Reimbursement Amount: The reimbursement amount is the difference between the required level of operation and the actual level of operation during a given contract year, according to the Reimbursement Formula. The termination date of the contract will be automatically extended until payment is complete.
 - 2.10.3 **Early-Termination Reimbursements**: If the contract is terminated prior to the termination date in paragraph 2.16 (Term), the SMAQMD may:
 - (i) Demand full repayment of the paragraph 2.3 (Payment) funds, or
 - (ii) Apply the Reimbursement Formula and demand repayment of the prorated amount.
 - 2.10.4 Inoperable Equipment Reimbursements: If the Equipment is stolen or rendered inoperable prior to the end of the Agreement term (as determined by Participant's insurance company), Participant may either: (i) replace the inoperable Equipment with new equipment certified to equal or lower emission levels than the inoperable Equipment and complete performance of this Agreement or (ii) terminate the Agreement and return a prorated portion of the \$140,000, based on the Reimbursement Formula.
 - 2.10.5 Full or Partial Waiver: The APCO of the SMAQMD may, at his or her sole discretion, relieve the obligation to reimburse funds after considering the circumstances leading to the failure to fulfill the minimum performance requirements.

2.11 Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements:

- 2.11.1 Record Requirements: Participant must maintain adequate records to document compliance with this Agreement. Records include the documents specified below. Participant must maintain the records for the term of the contract and the three years following the end date listed in paragraph 2.16 (Term). The SMAQMD may inspect or request copies of these records at any time during the term of this Agreement. This paragraph will survive the termination of this Agreement.
 - (i) On-road Vehicles: Required records include copies of all driver log book entries, miles travelled, vehicle downtime, and type and cost of maintenance performed.

- 2.11.2 Report Requirements: The Participant must submit a report stating the miles travelled or hours operated in the preceding year, the fuel consumed, the type and cost of maintenance or repair work performed over the course of the year, and the amount of time the Equipment was inoperable due to the maintenance and repair activities.
- 2.11.3 Report Submission Deadlines: Participant must submit use reports at least once annually or as requested by SMAQMD, CARB, or Funding Partner(s), as applicable, or their representatives. Annual reports are due not later than January 31 of each year. Additional reports are due on the date specified in the request, or within 30 days if no date is specified. SMAQMD, CARB, or Funding Partner(s), as applicable, or their representatives may also request additional performance or other documentation at their discretion and Participant must provide the requested information on the date specified in the request, or within 30 days if no date is specified.
- 2.11.4 **Failure to Comply:** If Participant fails to comply with the reporting requirements, the SMAQMD may require repayment in accordance with paragraph 2.10 (Reimbursements), or, at its sole election, institute on-site monitoring and inspection measures.
- 2.12 Sale of New Equipment: By initialing this paragraph, the Participant acknowledges and agrees that it may not sell or encumber the New Equipment without the prior written consent of the SMAQMD. The SMAQMD will not approve the sale, transfer, licensing, or subcontracting, unless:
 - (i) The Participant notifies the prospective buyer of the Equipment, in writing, of the terms of this Agreement and any unperformed requirements.
 - (ii) The buyer executes a LESBP Agreement with the SMAQMD.
- Grant of Security Interest: Participant grants to SMAQMD a security interest in the New Equipment to secure its performance under this Agreement. Participant authorizes SMAQMD to prepare and file applications, financing statements, continuation statements, statements of assignment, termination statements, lawsuits, and the like, as necessary to perfect, protect, preserve, foreclose, or release SMAQMD's interest in the New Equipment.
- 2.14 Incentive Funding Limits: Participant (Participant must initial one):

HAS received incentive funding for the Old Equipment described in Exhibit B under a previous incentive agreement, and the information associated with this funding, including but not limited to the funding source, amount, and contract term associated with the previous incentive grant is attached as Exhibit E. Participant understands that funds received under any other incentive agreement may not be used to fund the New Equipment

HAS NOT received incentive funding from a previous incentive agreement.

2.15 Liquidated Damages:

For every day after April 1, 2011 in which a pre-1977 replacement school bus has not been delivered as specified in the Agreement, the Participant will pay liquidated damages in the amount of \$100 per day per bus purchased with funds from the Lower-Emission School Bus Program. Participant authorizes CARB to withhold this amount from the funds granted in paragraph 2.3.1. Liquidated damages will be reallocated to the CARB LESBP.

(ii) For every day after April 1, 2011 in which a 1977-1986 replacement school bus has not been delivered as specified in the Agreement, the Participant will pay liquidated damages in the amount of \$100 per day per bus purchased with funds from the Lower-Emission School Bus Program. Participant authorizes CARB to withhold this amount from the funds granted in paragraph 2.3.1. Liquidated damages will be reallocated to the CARB LESBP.

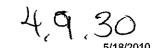

- (iii) Participant agrees to comply with the requirements of the EPA or DOE Program for Utilization of Small, Minority, and Women's Business Enterprises in procurement under assistance agreements, contained in 40 CFR, Part 33.
- 2.17 Term: This Agreement will begin upon execution by all parties and terminate on 12/31/2015. The Project Completion period is 180 days beginning with the execution of the Agreement by all parties and ending with the initial operation of the New Equipment as verified by the post-inspection. See paragraph 2.4.1 (Time) regarding extensions of this period. The Project Implementation period is the period immediately following the Project Completion period. Notwithstanding the expiration or early termination of this Agreement, SMAQMD's security interest in the New Equipment will continue in full force and effect until Participant fully satisfies its obligations under this Agreement.

3.0 General Terms and Conditions

- 3.1 Term: Not Applicable, see paragraph 2.17 (Term).
- 3.2 **Inspections:** Not Applicable, see paragraph 2.6 (Inspections).
- Prohibition on Emission Reduction Credits: The receipt of funds under this Agreement prohibits application for any form of emission reduction credit for any pollutant for the New Equipment described in Exhibit C. This prohibition includes, but is not limited to: (i) all attainment, nonattainment, criteria and noncriteria pollutants, and (ii) application for Emission Reduction Credits (ERC), Mobile Emission Reduction Credits (MERC) or Certificates of Advanced Placement (CAP). This prohibition extends to credits from all Air Quality Management or Air Pollution Control Districts.
- 3.4 Prohibition on Vocation Change: Not Applicable.
- 3.5 **Voluntary Act:** The Participant's purchase of the New Equipment is a completely voluntary act and the SMAQMD has not made representations or guarantees to the Participant regarding the New Equipment.
- Insurance: The Participant must maintain the insurance coverage described in Exhibit D for the entire term of this Agreement and any extensions to the Agreement. The Participant must name the SMAQMD as an additional insured and loss payee. The Participant must obtain and transmit to the SMAQMD a yearly Certificate of Insurance from the Insurance Company(ies) listing the SMAQMD as additional insureds and loss payees, and obligating the Company(ies) to provide at least 30 days notice to the Participant and the SMAQMD in the event of a change in, cancellation of, non-renewal of, reduction in coverage under, or termination of any policy listed on the certificate for any reason whatsoever. If the Participant fails to obtain the required certificate of insurance, or if the required insurance lapses, this Agreement may be terminated by the SMAQMD immediately.

- 3.7 **Notice of Significant Events:** Participant will provide to the SMAQMD prompt written notice of any of the following events:
 - (i) Any pending litigation or governmental action that may have a material adverse effect on Participant's ability to operate its business in the ordinary course, or Participant's ability to perform this Agreement.
 - (ii) Any change in its name, adoption of a fictitious business name, change in the location of its principal place of business, change in its business structure (such as from a sole proprietorship to a corporation), any proposed sale or transfer of substantially all its operating assets, or any proposed sale or transfer of 20.0% of its equity ownership or control.
 - (iii) The filing of any petition in bankruptcy by or against Participant.
 - (iv) The occurrence of any catastrophic loss to Participant, Participant's principal place of business, or Participant's operating assets.
 - (v) Damage to the New Equipment greater than 10% of its value at the time of damage.
 - (vi) Repossession of the New Equipment.
- 3.8 **Ability to Perform:** If either of the events listed in this paragraph occur, the Participant must notify the SMAQMD within 30 days of the date Participant knows, or should have known, that the event has occurred or is likely to occur:
 - (i) The Participant suffers catastrophic loss.
 - (ii) Any other event has occurred or is likely to occur that could impair the Participant's ability to perform the conditions of this Agreement.
- 3.9 **Amendment:** No amendment, alteration or variation of the terms of this Agreement is valid unless made in writing and signed by all parties.
- 3.10 **Assignments:** No performance rendered or payment due under this Agreement may be delegated or assigned without the written consent of Participant, SMAQMD, CARB, and Funding Partner(s), as applicable. If Participant assigns any of its rights or obligations under this contract, all of the terms and conditions of this contract will apply to the Participant's assignee.
- 3.11 Non-Discrimination: Not Applicable.
- 3.12 **Subcontracts:** If the Participant submitted the name of a subcontractor in the proposal or application for this Agreement, the SMAQMD's approval of the Agreement is also an approval of the use of the named subcontractor. In the event that any part of this Agreement is subcontracted, Participant agrees to document the following affirmative steps for utilizing Minority Business Enterprises (MBE) or Women Owned Business Enterprises (WBE) as required by the Environmental Protection Agency:
 - (i) Include MBEs and WBEs on solicitation lists.
 - (ii) Assure MBEs and WBEs are solicited once they are identified.
 - (iii) Divide total requirements into smaller tasks to permit maximum MBE/WBE participation, where feasible.
 - (iv) Establish delivery schedules which will encourage MBE and WBE participation, where feasible.



- (v) Encourage use of the services of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA) and the U.S, Small Business Administration to identify MBEs and WBEs.
- 3.13 **Successors:** This Agreement will bind the successors of the SMAQMD and Participant in the same manner as if they were expressly named.
- 3.14 Recordkeeping: Not Applicable. See paragraph 2.11 (Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements).
- 3.15 Termination Notice Requirements:
 - 3.15.1 **30-day Notice Termination:** Either the SMAQMD or Participant may terminate this Agreement for any reason by giving the other party 30-days written notice.
 - **5-day Notice Termination:** The SMAQMD, through its APCO, may terminate this Agreement with 5 days written notice if Participant fails to perform any of the terms and conditions of this Agreement in the time and manner specified.
 - 3.15.3 **Immediate Termination:** The SMAQMD, through its APCO, may terminate this Agreement immediately if informed that moneys to fund the contract are not available. If the SMAQMD terminates this Agreement under this paragraph, it will serve notice of the action on the Participant within 10 working days.
- 3.16 **Waiver of Claims:** Participant waives any claims against the SMAQMD, CARB, Funding Partner(s), its officers, agents, employees, delegates or volunteers from damage or loss caused by:
 - (i) Any suit or proceeding directly or indirectly attacking the validity of this Agreement, or any part of this Agreement.
 - (ii) Any judgment or award declaring this Agreement either void or voidable, or delaying the performance of any part of this Agreement.
- 3.17 Waiver of Agreement Provisions: Waiver by either party of any default, breach or condition precedent will not be construed as waiver of any other default, breach or condition precedent or any other right under this Agreement.
- 3.18 **Time:** Time is of the essence with respect to the timely performance of each provision of this Agreement.
- 3.19 **Severability:** If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid or unenforceable, its invalidity or unenforceability will not affect any other provisions of this Agreement, and this Agreement will be construed and enforced as if such provision had not been included.
- 3.20 Venue and Choice of Law: This Agreement is executed in Sacramento County, California and will be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any action arising out of this Agreement must be filed in a state court or federal court located in Sacramento, California.
- 3.21 Compliance with Laws and Regulations: Participant must observe and comply with all applicable laws and regulations. In addition to all other applicable laws, this Agreement is subject to the provisions and limitations of Health & Safety Code. Notwithstanding the terms of this Agreement, the Participant, the SMAQMD nor CARB are permitted to undertake any actions that contravene the Health & Safety Code or any other law or regulation.
- 3.22 Payments that Contravene the Law: The SMAQMD and CARB have no liability for payments that are found to contravene the law. Participant will reimburse the SMAQMD for any payments made by the SMAQMD to Participant and later determined to contravene federal, state or local laws and regulations.

- 3.23 **Status of Participant:** This Agreement is only for the payment of incentive funds to offset the cost of the items identified in Exhibit C. Accordingly, Participant, its employees, consultants and subcontractors do not have any of the entitlements of a CARB, SMAQMD, or Funding Partner employee. Participant is an independent contractor.
 - 3.23.1 Direction of Third Parties: If the Participant employs any third persons, these persons will be under the exclusive control of Participant. All terms of employment, including but not limited to hours, wages, working conditions, discipline, hiring, and discharging will be determined by Participant.
 - 3.23.2 **Right to Bind:** Neither the Participant nor its employees, subcontractors or consultants have the right to act on behalf of CARB or the SMAQMD in any capacity, or to bind CARB or the SMAQMD to any obligation.
 - 3.23.3 **Taxes:** Neither CARB nor the SMAQMD will make any deductions or withholdings from the compensation paid to Participant. Participant must issue all forms required by federal and state laws for income and employment tax purposes for all of Participant's assigned personnel.
- 3.24 **Conflict of Interest:** No officer or employee of CARB or the SMAQMD has any pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or the proceeds of the Agreement. No officer or employee of Participant may serve on CARB or the SMAQMD's governing body or hold any CARB or SMAQMD position which by rule, practice, or action nominates, recommends, supervises or authorizes the development or execution of this Agreement, or any payment to Participant.
- 3.25 **Indemnity:** The Participant must indemnify and defend the SMAQMD, CARB, Funding Partner(s), their officers, agents, employees, delegates and volunteers, from any and all losses, costs, damages, fines or expenses (including attorneys fees, court costs and expert fees) or liability of any kind or character to any person or property that:
 - (i) Arises from, or are alleged to arise from, any breach of the responsibilities required of Participant by this Agreement, or
 - (ii) Are related in any way to the Equipment described in Exhibit C, including any and all liability for general, special, consequential, or other damages arising from the use of the Equipment by Participant, for which financial assistance or other incentives are received from the SMAQMD by Participant.
- 3.26 **Force Majeure:** If performance by CARB, the SMAQMD, or the Participant of any of its obligations or undertakings under this Agreement is interrupted or delayed by any occurrence not occasioned by the conduct of either party to this Agreement, whether that occurrence is an act of God or public enemy, or whether that occurrence is caused by war, riot, storm, earthquake, or other natural forces, or by the acts of anyone not a party to this Agreement, then CARB, the SMAQMD or the Participant may be either excused from any further performance or excused from any further performance for whatever period of time after the occurrence is reasonably necessary to remedy the effects of that occurrence at the election of CARB and the SMAQMD.
- 3.27 **Two Originals:** This Agreement and any modification to this Agreement will be executed in two originals, one to be kept by the SMAQMD and one to be kept by the Participant. Either of the originals is enforceable without the presentation of the other original.
- 3.28 Entire Agreement: This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the SMAQMD and Participant. All parties revoke all prior or contemporaneous oral or written Agreements between them that are inconsistent with this Agreement. In the event of a dispute between the parties regarding the Agreement, this Agreement will be deemed to have been drafted by the parties in equal parts so that no presumptions or inferences concerning its terms or interpretation may be construed against any party to this Agreement. 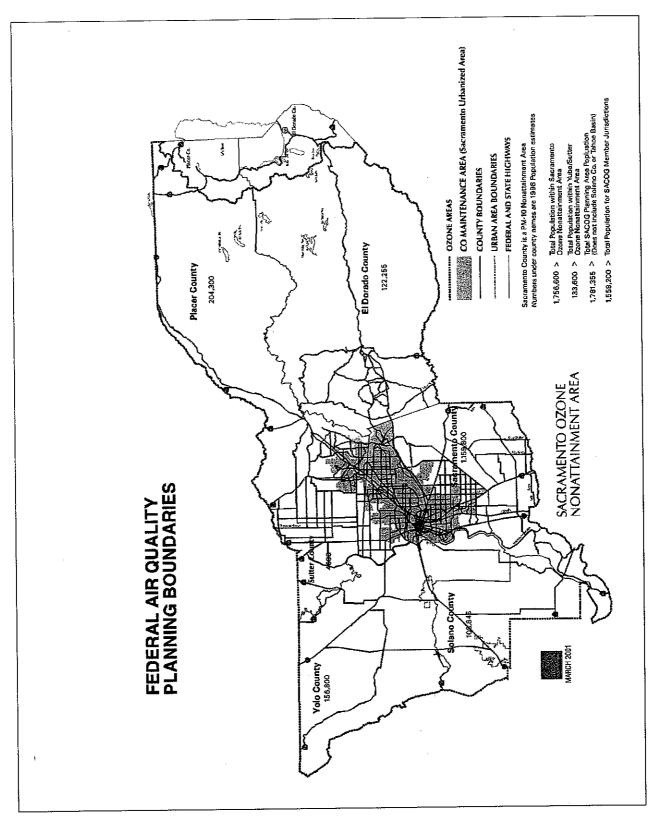

EXHIBIT A SACRAMENTO OZONE NON-ATTAINMENT MAP



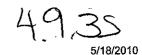

The purpose of this Agreement is to stimulate and promote the part-time employment of students who are in need of the income from such employment to pursue courses of study at <u>Heald College</u>.

This Agreement is entered into this 28th day of June 2010 and ending on the 30th day of June 2011, between Heald College-Roseville and Western Placer Unified School District.

Agency

Heald College shall be considered the Employer for purposes of this Agreement and therefore has the right to control and direct the services of the student for the agency. The agency's right is limited to the direction of the details and means by which the result is to be accomplished. This Agreement is subject to the right of either party to terminate, at any time, provided a fifteen (15) day written notice is supplied by the initiating party.

The following terms and conditions shall govern participation in the Work-Study Program and the employment of any Work-Study student. The terms and conditions are as follows:

A. Heald College-Roseville agrees: Campus Location

- 1. To be responsible for establishing the eligibility of the students participating in Work-Study Program.
- 2. To be responsible for Work-Study records and payroll distribution to the student(s).
- 3. To provide, to the best of its ability, eligible Work-Study employees as long as matching federal funds are available.
- 4. To complete Schedule A of this agreement with information provided by Company/Agency
- 5. To bill the Agency for its contribution toward student's wages and a proportionate share of employer's contribution toward social security and payroll taxes (if applicable based on terms of this agreement).
- 6. To notify the Agency when the student is about to complete his/her Work-Study allocation.
- 7. To provide sufficient documentation to the agency supporting amounts disbursed to students.

 - 3. That Work-Study employment will not involve the construction, operation or maintenance of a facility that is used, or is to be used, for sectarian instruction, or as a place for religious worship.
 - 4. That Work-Study employment will not involve any partisan or nonpartisan political activity associated with a faction in an election for public or party office.
 - 5. To give Work-Study employment under this Agreement only to those students approved and referred to your agency by Heald College-Roseville.
 - 6. To provide information needed for Schedule A of this agreement.
 - 7. To confer Marci Vistro (School Representative) before the dismissal of any Work-Study employee and to inform them of the termination of a student's employment.
 - 8. To provide responsible, direct supervision of Work-Study employees, and to provide proper working conditions, and to allow the College to inspect the premises if it elects to do so.
 - 9. To contribute to that percentage of the student-employee's salary required by federal regulation and a proportionate share of employer's contribution toward social security and payroll taxes during the period of the student's employment at the rate of \$0-(for literacy/reading/math tutoring positions) during the academic year.
 - 10. To verify that all hours worked are reported accurately and in a timely manner in accordance with the payroll calendar, as well as to insure that there is no anticipating or backtracking of hours worked.
 - 11. To monitor that all employees' remaining hours once an imminent notice of termination has been received. Payroll timesheets, submitted after the student's Work-Study eligibility is exhausted, will not be processed and will be returned to the employing Agency for payment.
 - 12. To pay 100% of the student's salary in excess of their College Work-Study award.
 - 13. That it is mutually understood and agreed that no alteration or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, and no oral understandings or agreements not incorporated herein, and no alterations or variations of the terms unless made in writing between the parties, shall be binding on any of the parties.

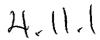
AGREEMENT

Now, therefore, in consideration of the above, ACI and The Company agrees as follows:

I. DEFINITIONS

- A. Services: The services to which employees and family members are entitled under this Agreement, and the services to be provided to The Company hereunder, as set forth in Exhibit A Benefits Summary.
- B. Short-Term Sessions: A block of sessions available under the program intended to be applied to situations in which the EAP Case Manager believes that the presenting issues can be reasonably and appropriately resolved in the sessions allotted and defined in Exhibit A.
- C. Provider Network: A network of professionals licensed by the state in which they practice. - G. CISD: Critical Incident Stress Debriefing A meeting and discussion either on-site or on-line (via webinar) regarding a qualifying incident. These services are conducted by specially trained and qualified ACI network providers.

- H. Conclerge Services: Conclerge services offer information and referrals, on an unlimited basis, for any type of personal convenience in the broad category of personal service. ACI Concierge Service acts as an information service only and does not cover the cost of services nor does ACI guarantee delivery and/or quality of service provided by vendors.
- Intake Line: A 24-7 toil free service to provide urgent provider contact with a distressed participant.
- J. Session: In-person or telephone consultation related to a participant's concerns. II. SCOPE OF SERVICES

- A. - D. Critical Incident Response: ACI will respond with CISM services relating to a distressing and traumatic event occurring in the workplace on an unlimited basis. Each CISD response is limited to two (2) on-site hours per incident unless otherwise noted in Exhibit A. Additional hours are available as a cost pass-through.
- P. Materials: ACI shall be responsible for supplying all materials necessary to perform the services set forth in Exhibit A. All materials will be made available in electronic format. Printed materials may be made available at an additional cost to customer. Requested hard copy materials will be shipped to The Company via first class mail. Overnight and express delivery can be provided at an additional cost.

- Consultation: ACI will provide ongoing consultation to include the overall design, development, implementation and management of the program. ACI will provide clinical expertise regarding performance and behavior related issues.
- J. Reporting: ACI shall provide The Company with quarterly utilization reports summarizing the service provided, including key metrics and demographic data. Utilization report are created and standardized by ACI. Special reports may be requested and priced at time of request. In accordance with confidentiality laws and regulations ACI will only provide utilization reports to companies with an employee count of 115 or above. Year End Reports are provided upon request.
- K. Confidentiality: Information given to ACI by individuals seeking to access benefits is considered confidential and is subject to privacy laws and regulations. ACI will release confidential information only upon written authorization by the participant seeking assistance or an authorized representative. ACI may retain and use aggregated, non-individually indentifiable data. In addition, ACI shall transport, handle and store Protected Health Information (as identified under HIPAA) and other

M. Online Services: A variety of websites and other online services, including but not limited to email, webinars, texting, are part of the services provided with the program.

IV. LIMITATIONS ON BENEFITS/SERVICES

- A. Benefits must be obtained from an EAP Provider through ACI. A participant may obtain benefits by calling 800-932-0034. Upon contact, ACI will determine the participant's eligibility and arrange for benefits. Participants must contact ACI for authorization prior to accessing services.
- B. In the event of any major disaster, act of God and/or epidemic, ACI shall provide to the extent practical, according to its best judgment, within the limitations of such facilities and personnel as are then available. ACI shall have no liability to The Company for any delay in providing or failure to provide services under such circumstances.

V. EFFECTIVE DATE OF SERVICES

The Contract and Initiation of Services as specified in this Agreement will be activated upon two (2) conditions being met:

- A. Receipt of signed contract: ACI must receive at least one copy of the Agreement signed by an appropriate officer of The Company; and,
- B. Receipt of the Initial Payment as specified in Periodic Fees outlined in Exhibit A.

VI. PERIODIC FEES AND PARTICIPANT CHARGES

- A. Periodic Fees: The Company shall remit to ACI, by the date specified the applicable Periodic Fees set forth on Exhibit A of this Agreement. Fees are remitted quarterly in advance, unless otherwise specified on or before the first day of the contract. The first payment must be received by ACI prior to the initiation of any services, provision of materials or any other participation (e.g. On-Site Orientation).
- B. Finance Charges: In the event The Company fails to make payment in a timely manner, a late fee of 2% per month will be applied to all outstanding balances in excess of 30 days. Services may be suspended for non-payment and potential participants so informed.
- C. Cost of Ongoing Treatment: The Company shall inform all its employees that the cost of any treatment not specifically provided pursuant to this Agreement, shall be the responsibility of the participant.

D. Participant Charges: Participants will not be required to make co-payments to EAP or other ACI Providers for services. However, a participant is responsible for paying for the services of any provider outside the ACI referral and network, and other such entities to whom the Participant may be referred are not covered by this Agreement.

VII. EFFECTIVE DATE OF BENEFITS

- A. Initial Participant: All employees as specified by The Company as of effective date of this Agreement and all persons entitled to be Participants through such employees shall be entitled to receive Benefits as of 12:01 a.m. on stated effective date.
- B. Changes in Employee Count: Changes to the employee count may be made in the following manner:

a. The Company may report employee count changes of 25 (or more) in writing (fax or email) with payment remittance.

b. Addition of new employees or the reduction of force may result in changes in the rate and/or invoiced charges.

c. Changes will be reflected in the form of supplemental invoice or credit towards the

next invoicing period.

d. Account audit requests must be submitted in writing (fax or email) and received by ACI Pinance Department no later than 15 days after affected coverage period has closed for consideration.

VIII. TERM AND TERMINATION

- A. Termination of Individual Participant: If an employee ceases to meet the eligibility requirements of The Company, the coverage for benefits under this Agreement for such employee, and all other Participants covered for Benefits through the employee, terminates automatically 30 days from the date of termination after which the employee ceases to meet the eligibility requirements of The Company.
- B. Term and Termination of Group:

 - Termination: Either party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause, and without penalty, by sending written notice via certified mail of such termination to the other party within sixty (60) days of the expiration date of the Term or any Renewal Term, provided, however, that this Agreement shall not be terminated at any time during the first year of this Agreement. In addition, either party may terminate

this Agreement immediately if at any time the other party is in breach of this Agreement and has not cured such breach within ten (10) business days of receiving notice of such breach from the terminating party.

- 3. Nonpayment. If The Company fails to pay any amount due ACI within thirty (30) days after ACI's notice to The Company of, and bill for the amount due, then ACI may terminate the rights of the participants involved, effective upon ACI's issuance of notification of cancellation to The Company. Participants may be informed of such suspension.
- C. Contractors maintain a contractor-client relationship with participants, and contractors are solely responsible to participants for any and all services that they may provide to participants. ACI makes no warranties, expressed or implied, of any kind with respect to the services provided by a contractor. ACI shall not be liable for the negligence or wrongful acts or omissions of contractors.

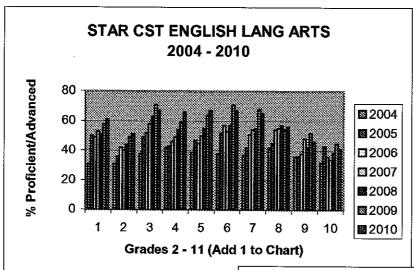

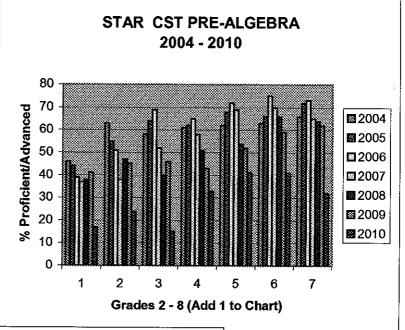

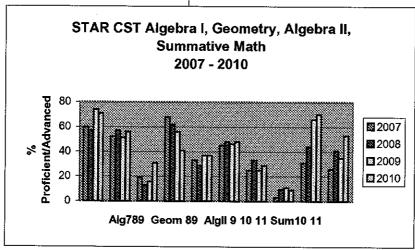

As the technology capabilities and infrastructure of district school sites were evaluated last year, it became evident that Lincoln High School was in need of upgrades to its networking security, speed and reliability. LHS currently utilizes 25% of the District's network resources with increasing demands for faster, ubiquitous access. Bids were advertised and taken for needed wiring upgrades. 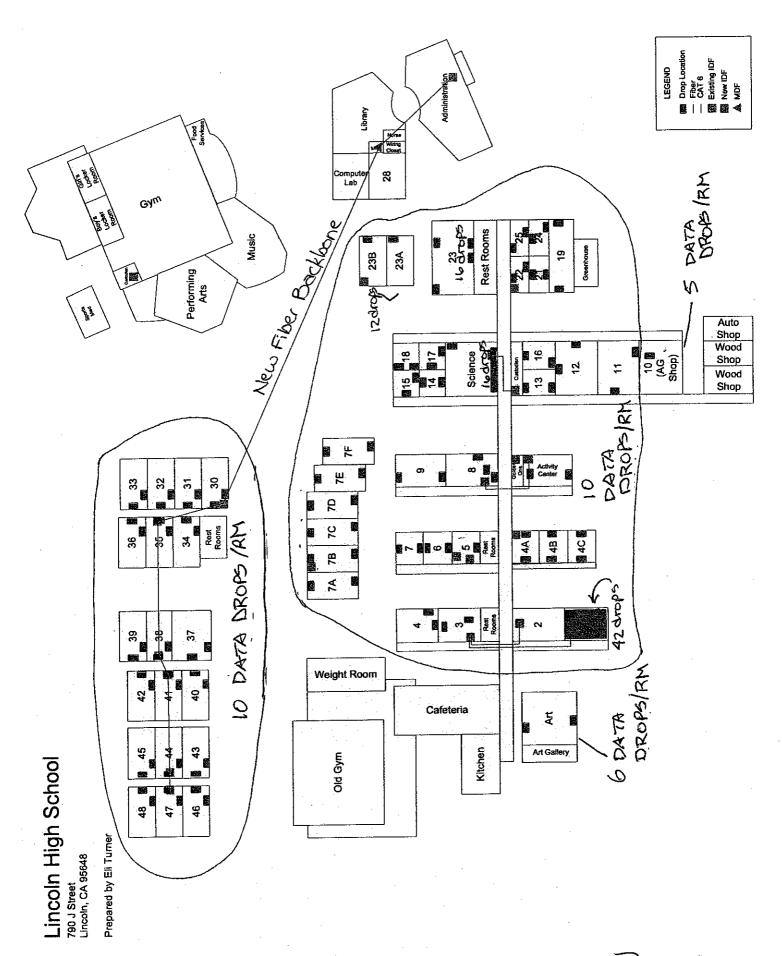

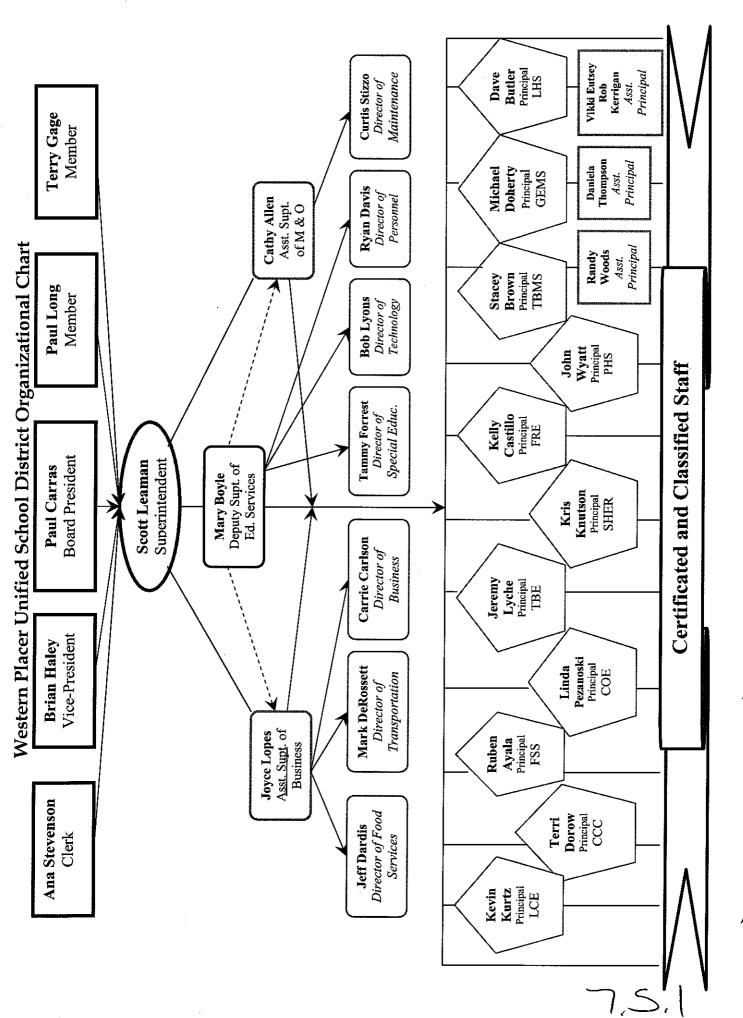
BACKGROUND:

Definitions

Core academic subjects include English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history, and geography. (20 USC 7801)

Hard-to-staff setting means a middle or high school classroom eligible for the federal Small Rural Schools Achievement Program, a middle or high school special education classroom, or a middle or high school alternative education program as specified in Education Code 44865, including home teaching, hospital classes, necessary small high schools, continuation schools, alternative schools, opportunity schools, juvenile court schools, county community schools, and district community day schools. (5 CCR 6100)

High Objective Uniform State Standard Evaluation (HOUSSE) is a method of determining a teacher's subject matter competence using forms developed by the California Department of Education (CDE). HOUSSE Part 1 consists of a summation of the teacher's years of experience, coursework, professional development, and service to the profession. HOUSSE Part 2, to be conducted only if Part 1 does not indicate subject matter competency, consists of direct observation and portfolio assessment and, if necessary, completion of the Peer Assistance and Review Program for Teachers or other individualized professional development plan. (5 CCR 6104)

Level 1 professional development means training that will provide a teacher with the requisite understanding of each set of state content standards. Level 2 professional development means training that will provide a teacher with more in-depth understanding of the content standards than provided in a Level 1 professional development program. The trainings shall be consistent with state-adopted academic content standards, curriculum frameworks, and adopted texts and shall incorporate the assessment of subject matter competency as outlined in the CDE's document California's Subject Matter Verification Process for Middle and High School Level Teachers in Special Settings. For each type of training, at least 36 hours in the core subject for which the teacher is being certified is required to substantively address the subject matter content. (5 CCR 6100, 6105)

Teacher new to the profession is a teacher who either graduated from an accredited institution of higher education and received a credential, or was enrolled in or had completed an approved intern program, on or after July 1, 2002. (5 CCR 6100)

Teacher not new to the profession is a teacher who either graduated from an accredited institution of higher education and received a credential, or was enrolled in or had completed an approved intern program, before July 1, 2002. (5 CCR 6100)

Teacher Qualifications

To meet the teacher qualification requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), a teacher of a core academic subject shall meet all of the following conditions: (20 USC 6319, 7801; 34 CFR 200.55, 200.56, 300.18; 5 CCR 6101, 6104, 6105, 6110)

- 1. Hold a bachelor's degree
- 2. Hold a full credential or be currently enrolled in an approved intern program for less than three years

3. Demonstrate subject matter competency in accordance with the applicable requirements below

A teacher who holds a supplementary authorization or is employed on a local teaching assignment shall meet the teacher qualification requirements of NCLB if he/she holds a California teaching credential and has demonstrated subject matter competency for the grade span and subject matter taught. (5 CCR 6116)

A teacher shall not meet the teacher qualification requirements of NCLB if he/she is teaching with a short-term staff permit, a provisional internship permit, or a state or local waiver for the grade or subject taught. (5 CCR 6115, 80021, 80021.1)

Demonstration of Subject Matter Competency

Subject matter competency shall be demonstrated in accordance with the following requirements based on the grade levels taught and the teacher's length of time in the profession:

1. An elementary teacher who is new to the profession shall pass a validated statewide subject matter examination certified by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC). (5 CCR 6102)

- 2. An elementary teacher who is not new to the profession shall complete one of the following: (5 CCR 6103-6104)
 - a. A validated statewide subject matter examination that the CTC has utilized to determine subject matter competency for credentialing purposes
 - b. The HOUSSE, as defined above, to determine the teacher's subject matter competency in each of the core academic subjects taught by the teacher
- 3. A middle or high school teacher who is new to the profession shall pass or complete one of the following for every core academic subject currently assigned: (5 CCR 6111)
 - a. A validated statewide subject matter examination certified by the CTC
 - b. University subject matter program approved by the CTC
 - c. Undergraduate major in the subject taught
 - d. Graduate degree in the subject taught
 - e. Coursework equivalent to the undergraduate major
- 4. A middle or high school special education teacher who is new to the profession, holds a special education credential or is currently enrolled in an approved special education intern program for less than three years, and has demonstrated subject matter competence in mathematics, language arts, or science in accordance with item #3 above, may demonstrate competence in other core academic subjects through the HOUSSE, as described below. The HOUSSE shall be completed not later than two years after the date of employment. (20 USC 1401; 34 CFR 300.18; 5 CCR
- 4. A middle or high school teacher who is not new to the profession shall pass or complete one of the following for every core subject assigned: (5 CCR 6112)
 - a. A validated statewide subject matter examination that the CTC has utilized to determine subject matter competency for credentialing purposes
 - b. University subject matter program approved by the CTC
 - c. Undergraduate major in the subject taught
 - d. Graduate degree in the subject taught
 - e. Coursework equivalent to the undergraduate major

- f. Advanced certification or credential, such as certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards
- g. The HOUSSE, as defined above, to determine the teacher's subject matter competency in each of the core academic subjects taught by the teacher

To determine a teacher's fulfillment of the HOUSSE option as described in items #2, #4 and #5 above, the Superintendent or designee shall complete the following steps in the manner prescribed by the California Department of Education (5 CCR 6104)

- 5. A middle or high school teacher in a hard-to-staff setting, as defined above, shall complete professional development for the subject matter verification process within three years of the date of assignment to such a setting. (5 CCR 6100, 6105)
 - a. If the teacher has fewer than 20 total or 10 upper division nonremedial college-level semester units, or equivalent quarter units, in a core academic subject, he/she shall complete both Level 1 and Level 2 professional development courses as defined above.
 - b. If the teacher has fewer than 32 semester nonremedial college-level units, but at least 20 total or 10 upper division nonremedial semester units, or the equivalent quarter units, in a core academic subject, he/she shall complete a Level 2 professional development course.

- 6. An elementary, middle, or high school special education teacher teaching multiple subjects exclusively to students with disabilities may either: (20 USC 1401; 34 CFR 300.18; 5 CCR 6111)
 - a. Meet the requirements above for teachers who are new or not new to the profession, as applicable
 - b. In the case of a new special education teacher who has demonstrated subject matter competency in mathematics, language arts, or science, demonstrate competency in the other core academic subject(s) he/she teaches through the HOUSSE no later than two years after the date of employment

Satisfaction of Requirements Outside District

A teacher who has been determined by another district in California to have met the teacher qualification requirements for the grade level and/or subject taught shall not be required to demonstrate again that he/she meets those requirements. (5 CCR 6120)

With the Title I local educational agency plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a plan for ensuring that all teachers of core academic subjects will meet NCLB requirements within the timelines established by law. As part of this plan, the Superintendent or designee shall provide high-luality professional development designed to enable teachers to meet NCLB requirements. (20 USC 6312, 6319)

A teacher who has been determined to meet subject matter competency requirements outside of California shall be considered to have met those requirements for the particular subject and/or grade span in California. The date of issuance of a valid out-of-state credential shall be used to identify a teacher as new or not new to the profession. (5 CCR 6125)

A teacher prepared in a country other than the United States shall be considered to have met NCLB teaching requirements if he/she: (5 CCR 6126)

- 1. Holds a degree from a foreign college or university that is at least equivalent to a bachelor's degree offered by an American institution of higher education
- 2. Has completed a teacher preparation program that meets CTC requirements for outof-country trained teachers
- 3. Demonstrates subject matter competency for the grade span and subjects taught through the same or equivalent processes and methods required of California teachers
- 4. Holds a California teaching credential

Certification of Compliance

All teachers teaching core academic subjects shall complete and sign a certificate of compliance with **NCLB requirements and** attach appropriate documentation. The Superintendent or designee shall verify the information and retain the signed original copy.

The principal of each school receiving Title I funds shall annually attest in writing as to whether the school is in compliance with NCLB requirements related to teacher qualifications. Copies of the attestation shall be maintained at the school and at the district office and shall be available to any member of the public upon request. (20 USC 6319)

District Plan for Highly Qualified Teachers

Within the Title I local educational agency plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a plan for ensuring that all teachers of core academic subjects will meet NCLB requirements within the timelines established by law. in accordance with law. As part of this plan, the Superintendent or designee shall provide high-quality professional development designed to enable teachers to meet NCLB requirements. (20 USC 6312, 6319)

Parental Notifications

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of each student attending a school receiving Title I funds that they may request information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teacher including, but not limited to: (20 USC 6311)

- 1. Whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction
- 2. Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived
- 3. The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree
- 4. Whether the student is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall provide timely notice to individual parents/guardians of students attending a Title I school whenever their child has been assigned to or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher of a core academic subject who does not meet NCLB teacher qualification requirements. (20 USC 6311; 34 CFR 200.61)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify teachers, as appropriate, prior to distributing the above notice to parents/guardians.

The notice and information provided to parents/guardians shall be in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, be provided in a language that the parents/guardians can understand. (20 USC 6311)

Pre-Employment Drug/Alcohol Screening for Safety-Sensitive Positions

To ensure the privacy of the drug and alcohol screening of job applicants, the district will not use test results for any purpose other than those stated in Board of Trustees policy and administrative regulation. The district shall maintain the confidentiality of screening records and shall not disclose these records unless the applicant has consented to the disclosure or the Superintendent or designee is presented with a court order requiring the disclosure.

Applicants shall sign a form consenting to the drug and alcohol testing. The consent form shall authorize release of the test results to the district. To ensure an individual's privacy, the district shall not use test results for any purpose other than those stated in Board policy and administrative regulation, shall maintain the confidentiality of screening records, and shall not disclose such records unless the applicant consents or the Superintendent or designee is presented with a court order requiring the disclosure.

All initial screening tests shall be conducted at the applicant's district's expense. If an applicant's initial test is positive, a second test, at the district's expense, shall be administered as soon as possible to confirm the results. Upon obtaining a second positive result, the applicant may seek an independent drug and alcohol screening from a recognized medical laboratory at his/her own expense. Any applicant who fails to provide the district with a negative drug and alcohol screening report within five working days of a confirmed positive result shall be determined to have failed the screening and shall not be employed.

Failure to submit to the process or to complete the process shall preclude the applicant from being hired into the position. Disqualified applicants shall not be prohibited from applying for another job within the district.

Students found to be in violation of the district's bus conduct rules shall be subject to discipline in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee may deny a student the privilege of using school transportation upon the student's continued disorderly conduct or his/her persistent refusal to submit to the authority of the driver. (5 CCR 14103)

Bus Surveillance Systems

The Board believes that the use of surveillance systems on school buses will help to deter misconduct and improve discipline, ensure the safety of students and bus drivers, and prevent vandalism. Therefore, surveillance systems may be installed and used on school buses to monitor student behavior while traveling to and from school and school activities.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify students, parents/guardians, and staff that surveillance may occur on any school bus and that the contents of a recording may be a student record and, as such, may be used in student disciplinary proceedings or referred to local law enforcement, as appropriate. In addition, a prominent notice shall be placed in each bus stating that the bus is equipped with a surveillance monitoring system.

BUS CONDUCT

Bus Rider Rules

The following rules apply at all times when students are riding a school bus, including when on school activity trips:

1. Riders shall follow the instructions and directions of the bus driver at all times.

(cf. 3542 - School Bus Drivers)

2. Riders should arrive at their designated bus stop on time and stand in a safe place at the stop to wait quietly for the bus.

(cf. 3541 - Transportation Routes and Services)

- 3. Riders shall enter the bus in an orderly manner and go directly to their seats.
- 4. Riders shall sit down and fasten any passenger restraint systems. Riders shall remain seated while the bus is in motion.
- 5. Riders shall not block the aisle or emergency exit with their body or personal belongings. Riders may bring large or bulky items, such as class projects or musical instruments, on the bus only if the item does not displace any other rider or obstruct the driver's vision.
- 6. Riders should be courteous to the driver and to fellow passengers. Vulgarity, rude, or abusive behavior is prohibited.
- 7. Any noise or behavior that could distract the driver, such as loud talking, scuffling or fighting, throwing objects, or standing or changing seats, is prohibited and may lead to suspension of riding privileges.

8. Riders shall not use tobacco products, eat, or drink while riding the bus.

(cf. 5131.62 - Tobacco)

9. Riders may bring electronic devices onto the bus only if such devices are permitted at school. If the use of cellular telephones or similar devices disrupts the safe operation of the school bus, the bus driver may direct the student to no longer use the device on the bus.

- 10. Riders shall not put any part of the body out of the window nor throw any item from the bus.
- 11. Riders shall help keep the bus and the area around the bus stop clean. Riders shall not damage or deface the bus or tamper with bus equipment.
- 12. Service animals are permitted on school transportation services; all other animals are prohibited. (Education Code 39839; 13 CCR 1216)

- 13. Upon reaching their destination, riders shall remain seated until the bus comes to a complete stop and upon the signal from the driver, unfasten any restraint system, enter the aisle, and go directly to the exit.
- 14. Riders should be alert for traffic when leaving the bus and shall follow the district's transportation safety plan when crossing the road and exiting the bus.

The driver or any passenger shall report any violation of the district's bus rules to the principal or designee. The principal or designee shall notify the student's parent/guardian of the misbehavior, determine the severity of the misconduct, and take action accordingly. In instances of a severe violation or repeated offenses, the rider may be denied transportation for a period of time determined appropriate by the principal or designee.

Bus drivers shall not deny transportation services except as directed by the principal or designee.

Bus Surveillance Systems

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the use and maintenance of the district's bus surveillance system. Students are prohibited from tampering with the bus surveillance system. Any student found tampering with the system shall be subject to discipline and shall be responsible for the costs of any necessary repairs or replacement.

Camera supports may be installed in all buses. Cameras may be rotated among the buses at the discretion of the Superintendent or designee.

The content of any recording is a student record and may only be accessed in accordance with the district's policy and administrative regulation concerning student records.

Transportation Discipline System

FIRST OFFENSE

- 1. The bus driver may issue a warning referral to the student. The student is responsible for taking the referral to his/her parent or guardian.
- 2. The parent or guardian must sign the referral before the student is allowed back on the bus.

SECOND OFFENSE

- 1. The bus driver may issue a referral to the student with a one-day suspension of bus riding privileges. The student is responsible for taking the referral to his/her parent/guardian.
- 2. The parent/guardian must sign the referral before the student is allowed back on the bus.

THIRD OFFENSE

- 1. The bus driver may issue a referral to the student with a three-day suspension of bus riding privileges. The student is responsible for taking the referral to his/her parent/guardian.
- 2. The parent/guardian must sign the referral before the student is allowed back on the bus.

FOURTH OFFENSE

- 1. The bus driver may send a referral to the student with a five-day suspension of bus riding privileges. The student is responsible for taking the referral to his/her parent/guardian.
- 2. The parent/guardian must sign the referral before the student is allowed back on the bus.

FIFTH OFFENSE

- 1. The bus driver may issue a referral to the student and may suspend bus riding privileges for the remainder of the school year. The student is responsible for taking the referral to his/her parent/guardian.
- 2. The parent/guardian must sign the referral before the student is allowed back on the bus.

At anytime during the discipline process the parent/guardian may request a meeting with the applicable driver and the Transportation Coordinator.

The intent is that each time a pupil receives a bus referral he/she advances to a higher level of consequence until the fifth offense is reached.

In the case of a bus referral resulting from a severe misconduct the Transportation **Director** may assign a consequence up to that of the fifth offense.

General Information

- 1. Fighting on a school bus is an automatic five-day suspension of bus riding privileges.
- 2. Situations endangering the safety and well being of any persons may result in suspension of bus riding privileges for the remainder of the school year.
- 3. All referrals will be signed by the parent/guardian before the student is allowed to ride the bus.
- 4. No change in disciplinary actions shall be made without a meeting of the parent/guardian, Transportation **Director**, driver, and student.

CHARTER SCHOOL FACILITIES

Upon request by a charter school operating within the district, the Governing Board shall provide facilities in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

(cf. 0420.4 - Charter Schools) (cf. 7110 - Facilities Master Plan)

A charter school must be operating in the district as defined in Education Code 47614 before it submits a request for facilities. A new or proposed charter school operating within the district is eligible to request facilities for a particular fiscal year only if it submits its charter petition before November 1 of the fiscal year preceeding the year for which facilities are requested. A new charter school is entitled to be allocated and/or provided access to facilities only if it receives approval of the petition before March 15 of the fiscal year proceeding the year for which facilities are requested. (5 CCR 11969.9)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that requests received are evaluated and processed in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

If the district's preliminary proposal or final notification of space does not accommodate the charter school at a single school site, the Board shall consider the offer, make a specific finding that the district cannot accommodate the charter school's students at a single school site, and adopt a written statement of reasons explaining the finding. (5 CCR 11969.2)

BACKGROUND:

At the May 4, 2010, Board of Trustees meeting, the Board approved eliminating transportation for students living within the city limits and combining K-12 students on all routes. This modification will save the district \$323,100 a year in transportation costs. In addition, the Board approved providing special education transportation with District staff as opposed to a third party provider. This will save the district \$60,000 a year.

Special Education Transportation:

The WPUSD Transportation Department staff, under the direction of Mark Derossett, successfully transitioned special education transportation in-house. Mark coordinated the purchase of equipment and training personnel to provide transportation to 55 extended year program students beginning in June 2010. Our extended year program students were transported by district staff throughout the summer. Feedback from parents described a very smooth transition.

Regular Education Transportation:

Mark has also been working hard on the implementation of K-12 combined routes. He has purchased new buses with our low emissions grant funding and the remaining transportation equipment reserves. We have met with City of Lincoln Transit staff to review their routes and stops in the morning and afternoon. The City staff has been very helpful and cooperative. The City, like WPUSD, has many

federal and state regulations with which they must comply. They are not in the position to add a full route in the Lincoln Crossing development at this time. They have modified the morning schedule to include a stop at the corner of Ferrari Ranch and Groveland Lane at 7:40 and a stop at Wilson Park (adjacent to Twelve Bridges Middle School) at 7:50. In the afternoon, the bus will stop at Wilson Park at 2:50 and drop off at Ferrari Ranch and Groveland Lane at 3:15. In addition, they have offered a free ride to parents and students wishing to try out the bus routes prior to the start of school. We appreciate City staff working with the district to provide these accommodations.

Conclusion:

While these changes will have a significant impact on students and parents, they also reduce the budget deficit by nearly \$400,000 while maintaining programs and teachers. Every district constituency will need to contribute to balancing the budget during the difficult economic times our state is facing. We appreciate the sacrifice parents and students are making to assist with our budget crisis.

STANDARD PROVISIONS FOR STATE CONTRACTS

1. The Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless the State, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, and any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying work services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of this Agreement, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any person, firm or corporation who may be injured or damaged by Contractor in the performance of this Agreement.

2. Contractor, and the agents and employees of Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall

act in an independent capacity and not as officers or employees or agents of the State.

3. The State may terminate this Agreement and be relieved of any payments should the Contractor fail to perform the requirements of this Agreement at the time and in the manner herein provided. In the event of such termination the State may proceed with the work in any manner deemed proper by the State. All costs to the State shall be deducted from any sum due the Contractor under this Agreement and the balance, if any, shall be paid to the Contractor upon demand.

4. This Agreement is not assignable by the Contractor, either in whole or in part, without the consent of

the State in the form of a formal written amendment.

5. Time is of the essence in this Agreement.

6. No amendment or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties and approved as required. No oral understanding or Agreement not incorporated in the Agreement is binding on any of the parties.

7. The consideration to be paid Contractor, as provided herein, shall be in compensation for all of Contractor's expenses incurred in the performance hereof, including travel, per diem, and taxes, unless

otherwise expressly so provided.

8. Contractors entering into a contract funded wholly or in part with funds from the United States Government agree to amendments in funding to reflect any reductions in funds if the Congress does not appropriate sufficient funds. In addition, the contract is subject to any restrictions, limitations or enactments of congress which affect the provisions, terms or funding of this agreement in any manner. The State shall have the option to terminate the contract without cost to the State in the event that Congress does not appropriate funds or a United States agency withholds or fails to allocate funds.

WHEREAS, the Western Placer Unified School District ("the District") requests the County of Placer to collect on the County tax rolls certain charges which have been imposed pursuant to Resolution No. 91/92.23 (the "Resolution") duly adopted on December 9, 1991, by the District; and

WHEREAS, the County has required as a condition of the collection of said charges that the District warrant the legality of said charges and defend and indemnify the County from any challenge to the legality thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Board of the District that:

- 1. The Auditor-Controller of Placer County is requested to attach for collection on the County tax rolls those taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges, attached hereto.
- 2. The District warrants and represents that the taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges imposed by the District and being requested to be collected by Placer County comply with all requirements of state law, including but not limi8ted to Articles XIIIC and XIIID of the California Constitution (Proposition 218)
- 3. The District releases and discharges County, and its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, liabilities, costs and expenses, damages, causes of action, and judgments, in any manner arising out of the collection by County of any taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges on behalf of District.

- 4. The District agrees to and shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees (the "Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, liabilities, cost and expenses, damages, causes of action, and judgments, in any manner arising out of the collection by County of any of District's of said taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges requested to be collected by County for District, or in any manner arising out of District's establishment and imposition of said taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges. District agrees that, in the event a judgment is entered in a court of law against any of the Indemnified Parties as a result of the collection of one of District's taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges, the County may offset the amount of the judgment from any other monies collected by County of behalf of District, including property taxes.
- 5. The District agrees that its officers, agents and employees will cooperate with the County in answering questions referred to District by County from any person concerning the District's taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges, and that District will not refer such persons to County officers and employees for response.
- 6. The District agrees to pay such reasonable and ordinary charges as the County may prescribe to recoup its costs in placing on the tax rolls and collecting the taxes, assessments, fees and charges, as provided by Government Code sections 29304 and 51800.

WHEREAS, the Western Placer Unified School District ("the District") requests the County of Placer to collect on the County tax rolls certain charges which have been imposed pursuant to Resolution No. 91/92.23 (the "Resolution") duly adopted on December 9, 1991, by the District; and

WHEREAS, the County has required as a condition of the collection of said charges that the District warrant the legality of said charges and defend and indemnify the County from any challenge to the legality thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Board of the District that:

- 1. The Auditor-Controller of Placer County is requested to attach for collection on the County tax rolls those taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges, attached hereto.
- 2. The District warrants and represents that the taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges imposed by the District and being requested to be collected by Placer County comply with all requirements of state law, including but not limi8ted to Articles XIIIC and XIIID of the California Constitution (Proposition 218)
- 3. The District releases and discharges County, and its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, liabilities, costs and expenses, damages, causes of action, and judgments, in any manner arising out of the collection by County of any taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges on behalf of District.

- 4. The District agrees to and shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents and employees (the "Indemnified Parties") from any and all claims, demands, liabilities, cost and expenses, damages, causes of action, and judgments, in any manner arising out of the collection by County of any of District's of said taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges requested to be collected by County for District, or in any manner arising out of District's establishment and imposition of said taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges. District agrees that, in the event a judgment is entered in a court of law against any of the Indemnified Parties as a result of the collection of one of District's taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges, the County may offset the amount of the judgment from any other monies collected by County of behalf of District, including property taxes.
- 5. The District agrees that its officers, agents and employees will cooperate with the County in answering questions referred to District by County from any person concerning the District's taxes, assessments, fees and/or charges, and that District will not refer such persons to County officers and employees for response.
- 6. The District agrees to pay such reasonable and ordinary charges as the County may prescribe to recoup its costs in placing on the tax rolls and collecting the taxes, assessments, fees and charges, as provided by Government Code sections 29304 and 51800.
