#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Western Placer Unified School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Western Placer Unified School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### **Opinions**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Western Placer Unified School District, as of June 30, 2017, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### Other Matters

#### Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the *Management's Discussion and Analysis* on pages 4 to 14 and other Required Supplementary Information, such as the General Fund Budgetary Comparison Schedule, Schedule of Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) Funding Progress, Schedule of the District's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability, and Schedule of the District's Contributions on pages 53 to 58 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

#### Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise Western Placer Unified School District's basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditure of Federal Awards as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* the other supplementary information listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Schedule of Expenditure of Federal Awards and supplementary information as listed in the table of contents are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information, except for the Schedule of Financial Trends and Analysis, has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Schedule of Expenditure of Federal Awards and other supplementary information as listed in the table of contents, except for the Schedule of Financial Trends and Analysis, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

The Schedule of Financial Trends and Analysis has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 11, 2017 on our consideration of Western Placer Unified School District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Western Placer Unified School District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

#### Western Placer Unified School District Management's Discussion and Analysis For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2017

The management's discussion and analysis of Western Placer Unified School District's (the District) financial performance provides an overview of the District's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. Management has prepared the financial statements and the related footnote disclosures along with this discussion and analysis. The intent of this discussion and analysis is to look at the District's financial performance as a whole.

To provide a complete understanding of the District's financial performance, please read it in conjunction with the Independent Auditor's Report on pages 1 through 3, notes to the financial statements on pages 24 to 52, and the District's financial statements, which begin on page 15.

#### **FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS**

- California K-12 education finance is in the fourth year of an estimated (by the California Department of Finance) eight-year implementation period of the new funding model "Local Control Funding Formula" (LCFF).
- In 2016-17 the District's Total Assets increased by \$48,926,609 which represents a 21% increase from the 2015-16 fiscal year. The increase was primarily due to increases in cash and investments from bond issuances and capital assets, specifically Work in Progress (WIP) at Lincoln High School of a net \$9.6 million.
- The District's Net Position decreased by \$6,611,571 from June 30. Total revenues were \$84,479,289, compared to \$91,090,860 in expenditures.
- The fund balance of the General Fund decreased overall by \$1,222,633 from the prior year. The fund balance in the unassigned fund balance category decreased by \$1,196,726, having begun the year with a balance of \$11,928,849. This reserve also includes the 3% Reserve for Economic Uncertainty of \$2,158,381. The decrease in fund balance from the prior year was projected in both the original and revised budgets adopted by the Board.
- District enrollment in 2016-17 was 6,878 at Second Period reporting, an increase of 133 students, or 2.0%, with a corresponding increase of 92 Average Daily Attendance (ADA) to 2015-16 ADA of 6,489. For 2017-18 enrollment is projected to increase by 80 students. The District attendance rate is projected to remain stable at 95.8% for the next two years.
- In the past number of years, the housing crisis has had a significant impact on District demographics and enrollment growth; although we see an uptick in growth, it is unlikely that significant growth will be seen until the housing market begins to fully recover. Developers have been pulling housing permits for the past few years, and new homes continue to appear within District boundaries. Administration is optimistic that once we see steady growth in new housing, we will begin to see a consistent increase in student enrollment.

#### **OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements are organized to provide the reader first with a look at the financial status of the entire Western Placer Unified School District. The statements then proceed to provide an increasingly detailed look at specific financial activities. This annual report consists of three parts:

- Management's Discussion and Analysis this section, which provides an overall review of the financial activity for the past fiscal year as well as a look at the future years.
- Basic Financial Statements a look at Western Placer Unified School District's financial statement as a whole for the entire operating entity. The financial statements also include notes that explain some of the information in the statements and provide more detailed data.
- Required Supplementary Information detailed information for specific financial activities including required supplementary information that further explains and supports the financial statements with a comparison of the District's budget for the year.

#### Reporting on the District as a Whole

Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities

These two statements provide information about the District as a whole using the accrual accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. They help answer the question, "How did we do financially during 2016-17?"

The change in net position is reported in the Statement of Net Position. This change in net position is important because it tells the reader whether the financial position of the District has improved or diminished. The causes of this change may be the result of many factors, some of them financial and some not. Over time, the increases or decreases in the District's net position, as reported in the Statement of Activities, are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating.

All current year revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities regardless of when cash is received or paid. The relationship between revenues and expenses indicates the District's operating results. It is important to remember, the District's goal is to provide services to its students, not to generate profits as is necessary in commercial entities. One must consider many other non-financial factors, such as the quality of education provided and the safety of the schools in order to assess the overall health of the District.

In the District-wide financial statements, the District's activities are divided into two categories:

- Governmental Activities All of the District's services are reported here, including regular and special education, general administration, transportation, food services, plant services, facilities acquisition and construction, interest, and long-term debt. State support from LCFF and categorical apportionments finance most of these activities.
- Business-type Activities The District does not currently have any business type activities.

#### Reporting the District's Most Significant Funds

**Fund Financial Statements** 

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's most significant funds. Funds are accounting devices the District uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs:

- Some funds are required to be established by State law, bond covenants, or through grant or program restrictions.
- The District establishes other funds to control and manage money for specific purposes (like repaying its long-term debts) or to show that it is properly using certain revenues (like federal grants).

#### A District may have three kinds of funds:

- Governmental Funds Most of the District's activities are reported in governmental funds. The major governmental funds of the District are the General Fund, the Building Fund and the Mello-Roos Fund. Governmental funds focus on how money flows into and out of the funds and the balances that remain at the end of the year. They are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the District's operations and services that help determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs.
- Proprietary Funds Services for which the District charges a fee are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds use the full accrual basis of accounting, the same as the District-wide statements. The District does not have programs classified in this category.
- Fiduciary Funds The District is the trustee, or fiduciary, for assets that belong to others, such as the student activities funds. The District is responsible for ensuring that the assets that are reported in these funds are used only for their intended purposes and by those to whom the assets belong. The District's fiduciary activities are reported in a separate statement of fiduciary net assets and a statement of changes in fiduciary net assets. We exclude these activities from the District-wide financial statements because the District cannot use these assets to finance its operations.

### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT-WIDE STATEMENTS The District as a Whole

#### **Statement of Net Position**

The District's total assets increased by \$48,926,609 to \$279,519,061 during the 2016-17 fiscal year. Cash and cash equivalent accounts increased \$42,253,917 from FY 2015-16. Deferred outflows of resources for pensions increased by \$7,542,686 due to the continued implementation of GASB 68.

Total liabilities increased \$69,032,115 primarily due to General Obligation Bond issuances and an increase in the GASB 68 net pension liability. Accounts payable decreased \$304,835 and deferred revenues decreased by \$2,156,233 due to grant funds earned and spent in 2016-17. Deferred inflows of resources for pensions decreased by \$3,075,000 due to the continued implementation of GASB 68.

The District's net position for FY 2016-17 was (4,377,753), a decrease of \$6,611,571 from FY 2015-16. Of this balance, \$16,614,997 was restricted while (\$47,747,061) was unrestricted. Net investment in capital assets accounted for \$26,754,311 of the total net position.

This is the third year of implementation of a change in accounting principles for the implementation of Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 68 (GASB 68), Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 27 and GASB Statement No. 71 (GASB 71), Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date – an amendment of GASB Statement No. 68 (collectively, the Statements). The primary objective of the Statements is to improve accounting and financial reporting by state and local governments for pensions by establishing standards for measuring and recognizing liabilities, deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources, and expenses/expenditures. It requires employers to report a net pension liability for the difference between the present value of projected pension benefits for past service and restricted resources held in trust for the payment of benefits. The Statements identify the methods and assumptions that should be used to project benefit payments, discount projected benefit payments to their actuarial present value, and attribute that present value to periods of employee service.

The Statement of Net Position is included in the table below and provides the detail information for 2015-16 and 2016-17 along with the variances between the years.



The users of the District's programs paid \$727,666 of the cost. This revenue was generated through cafeteria sales of \$683,171 and other miscellaneous revenue of \$44,495. The federal and state governments subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions of \$13,164,368. Most of the governmental activities were paid with \$56,244,227 in property taxes, \$10,516,594 of unrestricted state aid based on the statewide Local Control Funding Formula, and \$561,574 of investment earnings. The Miscellaneous Revenues of \$3,264,860 is comprised of a number of items, including interest revenue, facilities use fees, developer fees, Mello-Roos receipts, interagency revenues and site co-curricular revenues.

Sources of Western Placer USD's Revenue for the 2016-17 Fiscal Year Figure 1




As reported in the Statement of Activities, the cost of all of the District's governmental activities this year was \$91,090,860

Instruction, instructional library, media & technology, and pupil services expenses made up approximately 62% of total 2016-17 expenditures. This is a 3% decrease from the 65% expended in FY 2015-16. General administration accounted for approximately 6% of the expenditure budget, a 1% increase from the prior year. Interest on debt, fiscal charges and transfers between agencies represented 16% of all outgo, and pupil services accounted for 8% of expenditures. Plant maintenance and operations accounted for 7% of the expenditure budget, no change from 2015-16.

Figure 2 charts the Districts expenditures for the 2016-17 school year.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE FUND STATEMENTS

The fund financial statements focus on individual parts of the District's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements. The individual fund statements provide information on inflows and outflows and balances of spendable resources. The District's Governmental Funds reported a combined fund balance of \$90.4 million, an increase of \$45.6 million from the previous fiscal year's combined ending balance of \$44.8 million. The funds with greatest change were the Building Fund increasing by \$47.4 million due to general obligation bond issuance for Measure A and Measure N bonds, the Mello-Roos Fund decreasing by \$3.5 million due to refunding of certain certificates of participation, the Bond Interest Redemption Fund increasing by \$3.7 million for bond refunding premium deposits and the General Fund decreasing \$1.2 million for prior year grant funds expenditure.

#### **General Fund Budgetary Highlights**

Over the course of the year, the District revised the annual operating budget regularly. Significant budget adjustments fell into the following categories:

- Budget revisions acknowledging the inclusion of restricted ending balances, deferred revenue, and carryover from the prior year.
- Budget revisions to update revenues to actual enrollment information and to update expenditures for staffing adjustments related to actual enrollments.
- Budget revisions to reflect salary settlements.

• Other budget revisions are routine in nature, including adjustments to categorical revenues and expenditures based on final awards, and adjustments between expenditure categories for school and department budgets.

The final revised budget for the General Fund reflected a net decrease to the ending balance of approximately \$6.2 million. Actual audited activity reflected a net decrease to the ending balance of \$1.2 million. The difference between the final budget and the actual ending balance is due primarily to unspent District and school site, federal and state program fund carryovers, including state one-time mandate reimbursement funds. This is not uncommon, particularly in categorical programs that carry balances over from year to year.

#### **CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION**

#### **Capital Assets**

By the end of the 2016-17 fiscal year, the District had invested \$182.3 million in a broad range of capital assets, including school sites, school buildings, site improvements, vehicles, equipment, and work in progress regarding the construction of new schools and building. This amount represents an increase of \$6.2 million from the previous fiscal year, which consists of construction work in progress, building construction, parcel land purchase and equipment additions totaling \$11.2 million, net of deletions and depreciation expense in the current fiscal year of \$5.0 million.

During 2016-17 the District substantially completed the addition of a new building wing with five classrooms and a lab at Lincoln High School. The district also continued modernization construction projects at Lincoln High School to include the quad area with a new covered eating area, stadium field replacement and stadium grounds resurfacing. Those expenditures at the existing high school and the new Agriculture CTE Pathways Building at the District Farm make up the majority of the June 30, 2017 WIP balance.

#### **Long-Term Debt**

At June 30, 2017, the District had \$288,093,710 in long-term debt outstanding.

The General Obligation Bonds are financed by the local taxpayers and represent 26.4% of the District's long-term debt. With the issuance of a portion of the Measure A and Measure N bonds in 2016-17, General Obligation Bonds have increased by \$53.7 million. Certificates of Participation (COPs) are defeased through Mello-Roos special taxes and developer fees. COPs represent an additional 44.48% of the District long-term debt. The District's Net Pension Liability, represents 20.55% of the District's long-term liability. PARS represents the five-year payment of an early retirement incentive the District offered in 2016-16. Nineteen employees took the opportunity to retire early under this plan. PARS debt represents .3% of the District's long-term liabilities at June 30, 2017. Other post-employment benefits are approximately .7% of the long-term liability balance.

#### FACTORS BEARING ON THE DISTRICT'S FUTURE

For several years, the District saw rapid growth as new housing developments were completed and new homeowners moved into the District. The housing crisis and the economic downturn of prior years had a significant impact on this development. Enrollment in 2013-14 increased 114 students (or 1.7%) over 2012-13. Over the last three years since 2013-14, the district has increased enrollment by 166 students (or 2.5%). The District currently anticipates that enrollment will increase by approximately 1.0% annually over the next few years and will increase steadily as developers continue to pull permits and building houses in Lincoln.

The District's greatest challenge continues to be maintaining a viable relationship between its revenues and expenditures while at the same time expanding its infrastructure and services to address the educational and technology needs of its existing and future students. The District is committed to a balanced budget and maintaining a minimum reserve of 3% of expenditures for economic uncertainties.

The 2017-18 State Budget was approved on June 30, 2017. The State Budget continues to be balanced and the structural deficit has been eliminated, at least for the duration of Proposition 30. The Governor has used the Proposition 98 revenues to increase Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) gap funding for the 2017-18 and funding to support a one-time allocation of prior year State-mandate cost program reimbursements. On the expenditure side, the State continues to project increases in STRS and PERS employer contribution rates over the next several years. The increases in employer contribution rates continue to outpace State funded cost of living adjustment (COLA) increases.

In 2017-18, the District adopted a General Fund budget with COLA for revenue of 1.56% (Approved State Budget). Due to the low COLA, lower LCFF Gap Funding, increased STRS and PERS costs and on-going support expenditures, the District adopted its General Fund budget with a structural deficit of \$1.5 million. Although the district projects this deficit, it still maintains the 3% reserve for Economic Uncertainty and an additional 2% and 0.5% over the next two subsequent years.

#### **NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

Western Placer Unified School District (the "District") accounts for its financial transactions in accordance with the policies and procedures of the California Department of Education's *California School Accounting Manual*. The accounting policies of the District conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. The following is a summary of the more significant policies:

Reporting Entity: The Board of Trustees is the level of government which has governance responsibilities over all activities related to public school education in the District. The Board is not included in any other governmental "reporting entity" as defined by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board since Board members have decision-making authority, the power to designate management, the responsibility to significantly influence operations and primary accountability for fiscal matters.

Mello-Roos Community Facilities District: The District and the Mello-Roos Community Facilities District (the "CFD") have a financial and operational relationship that meets the reporting entity definition criteria of GASB Codification Section 2100, *The Financial Reporting Entity*, for inclusion of the CFD as a blended component unit of the District. Accordingly, the financial activities of the CFD have been included in the financial statements of the District within the Mello-Roos Fund, a debt service fund. Special tax bonds issued by the CFD are included in long-term liabilities on the government-wide financial statements.

Western Placer Unified School District Financing Corporation: The District and the Western Placer Unified School District Financing Corporation (the Corporation) have a financial and operational relationship that meets the reporting entity definition criteria of GASB Codification Section 2100, *The Financial Reporting Entity*, for inclusion of the Corporation as a blended component unit of the District. Accordingly, the financial activities of the Corporation have been included in the general-purpose financial statements of the District within the Building Fund, a capital projects fund. The certificates of participation issued by the Corporation are included in long-term liabilities on the government-wide financial statements.

The following are those aspects of the relationship between the District and the Corporation and the District and the CFD & Corporation which satisfy *Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards, Section 2100*, as amended by criteria:

#### A - Accountability:

- 1. The CFD & Corporation's Board of Directors were appointed by the District's Board of Trustees.
- 2. The CFD & Corporation have no employees. The District's Assistant Superintendent, Business and Operations functions as the agent of the CFD & Corporation and does not receive additional compensation for work performed in this capacity.
- 3. The District's Board exercises significant influence over operations of the CFD & Corporation as the District is the sole lessee of all facilities owned by the CFD & Corporation.
- 4. All major financing arrangements, contracts, and other transactions of the CFD & Corporation must have the consent of the District.
- 5. Any deficits incurred by the CFD & Corporation will be reflected in the lease payments of the District. Any surpluses of the CFD & Corporation revert to the District at the end of the lease period.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

- 6. The District's lease payments are the sole revenue source of the CFD & Corporation.
- 7. The District has assumed a "moral obligation," and potentially a legal obligation, for any debt incurred by the CFD & Corporation.
- B Scope of Public Service:

The CFD & Corporation were formed for the sole purpose of financially assisting the District. The CFD & Corporation were formed to provide financing assistance to the District for construction, rehabilitation and acquisition of major capital facilities to support the student population.

#### C - Financial Presentation:

For financial presentation purposes, the CFD & Corporation's financial activity have been blended with the financial data of the District. The basic financial statements present the CFD & Corporation's financial activity within the Mello-Roos and Building Funds, respectively.

<u>Basis of Presentation - Financial Statements</u>: The basic financial statements include a Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD & A) section providing an analysis of the District's overall financial position and results of operations, financial statements prepared using full accrual accounting for all of the District's activities, including infrastructure, and a focus on the major funds.

<u>Basis of Presentation - Government-Wide Financial Statements</u>: The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities displays information about the reporting government as a whole. Fiduciary funds are not included in the government-wide financial statements. Fiduciary funds are reported only in the Statement of Fiduciary Net Position and the Statement of Change in Fiduciary Net Position at the fund financial statement level.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from exchange and exchange-like transactions are recognized when the exchange takes place. Revenues, expenses, gains, losses, assets and liabilities resulting from nonexchange transactions are recognized in accordance with the requirements of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Codification Section (GASB Cod. Sec.) N50.118-.121.

*Program revenues*: Program revenues included in the Statement of Activities derive directly from the program itself or from parties outside the District's taxpayers or citizenry, as a whole; program revenues reduce the cost of the function to be financed from the District's general revenues.

Allocation of indirect expenses: The District reports all direct expenses by function in the Statement of Activities. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a function. Depreciation expense is specifically identified by function and is included in the direct expense of each function. Interest on general long-term liabilities is considered an indirect expense and is reported separately on the Statement of Activities.

<u>Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting</u>: The accounts of the District are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures or expenses, as appropriate. District resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### A - Major Funds

#### General Fund:

The General Fund is the general operating fund of the District and accounts for all revenues and expenditures of the District not encompassed within other funds. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. General operating expenditures and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds are paid from the General Fund. The activities of the Special Reserve for Other Than Capital Outlay Fund have been included in the General Fund for financial reporting purposes.

#### **Building Fund:**

The Building Fund is a capital projects fund used to account for resources used for the acquisition of capital facilities by the District.

#### Mello-Roos Fund:

The Mello-Roos Fund is a capital projects fund used to account for resources used for the acquisition or construction of capital facilities by the District.

#### B - Other Funds

#### Special Revenue Funds:

The Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. This classification includes the Adult Education, Child Development and Cafeteria Funds.

#### Capital Projects Funds:

The Capital Projects Funds are used to account for resources used for the acquisition or construction of capital facilities by the District. This classification includes the Capital Facilities, County School Facilities and Special Reserve Funds.

#### Bond Interest and Redemption Fund:

The Bond Interest and Redemption Fund is a debt service fund used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

#### Trust Funds:

The Trust Funds are used to account for assets held by the District as Trustee. The District maintains two expendable trust funds, the Scholarship Trust, which is to be used to provide financial assistance to students of the District, and the Retiree Benefits Fund, which is used by the District to reserve for funds to pay for retiree benefits.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### Agency Funds:

The Student Body Funds are used to account for revenues and expenditures of the various student body organizations. All cash activity, assets and liabilities of the various student bodies of the District are accounted for in Student Body Funds.

<u>Basis of Accounting</u>: Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the basic financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

<u>Accrual</u>: The governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and the fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

<u>Modified Accrual</u>: The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term liabilities, if any, is recognized when due.

<u>Budgets and Budgetary Accounting</u>: By state law, the Board of Trustees must adopt a final budget by July 1. A public hearing is conducted to receive comments prior to adoption. The Board of Trustees complied with these requirements.

<u>Receivables</u>: Receivables are made up principally of amounts due from the State of California and Categorical programs. The District has determined that no allowance for doubtful accounts was needed as of June 30, 2017.

<u>Capital Assets</u>: Capital assets purchased or acquired, with an original cost of \$5,000 or more, are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at acquisition value for the contributed asset. Additions, improvements and other capital outlay that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over 5 - 50 years depending on asset types.

<u>Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources</u>: In addition to assets, the statement of net position includes a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s), and as such will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditures) until then. The District has recognized a deferred loss on refunding reported, which is in the Statement of Net Position. A deferred loss on refunding results from the difference in the carrying value of refunded debt and its reacquisition price. This amount is deferred and amortized over the shorter life of the refunded or refunding debt. Also, the District has recognized a deferred outflow of resources relate to recognition of the pension liability reported in the Statement of Net Position.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and as such, will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The District has recognized a deferred inflow of resources related to the recognition of the pension liability reported which is in the Statement of Net Position.

<u>Pensions</u>: For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the State Teachers' Retirement Plan (STRP) and Public Employers Retirement Fund B (PERF B) and additions to/deductions from STRP's and PERF B's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by STRP and PERF B. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Certain investments are reported at fair value. The following is a summary of pension amounts in the aggregate:

<u>Compensated Absences</u>: Compensated absences totaling \$188,291 are recorded as a liability of the District. The liability is for the earned but unused benefits.

<u>Accumulated Sick Leave</u>: Sick leave benefits are not recognized as liabilities of the District. The District's policy is to record sick leave as a operating expenditure or expense in the period taken since such benefits do not vest nor is payment probable; however, unused sick leave is added to the creditable service period for calculation of retirement benefits for certain STRP and PERF B employees, when the employee retires.

<u>Unearned Revenue</u>: Revenue from federal, state, and local special projects and programs is recognized when qualified expenditures have been incurred. Funds received but not earned are recorded as unearned revenue until earned.

Net Position: Net position is displayed in three components:

 Net Investment in Capital Assets – Consists of capital assets including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances (excluding unspent bond proceeds) of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### Net Position:

- 2. Restricted Net Position Restrictions of the ending net position indicate the portions of net position not appropriable for expenditure or amounts legally segregated for a specific future use. The restriction for legally restricted programs represents the portion of net position restricted to specific program expenditures. The restriction for capital projects represents the portion of net position restricted for capital projects. The restriction for debt service represents the portion of net position available for the retirement of debt. The restriction for scholarships represents the portion of net position to be used to provide financial assistance to students of the District. The restriction for retiree benefits represents the portion of net position available for the former employees of the district. It is the District's policy to use restricted net position first when allowable expenditures are incurred.
- 3. Unrestricted Net Position All other net position that do not meet the definitions of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets".

<u>Fund Balance Classifications</u>: Governmental Accounting Standards Board Codification Sections 1300 and 1800, *Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions* (GASB Cod. Sec. 1300 and 1800) implements a five-tier fund balance classification hierarchy that depicts the extent to which a government is bound by spending constraints imposed on the use of its resources. The five classifications, discussed in more detail below, are nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned and unassigned.

#### A - Nonspendable Fund Balance:

The nonspendable fund balance classification reflects amounts that are not in spendable form, such as revolving fund cash, prepaid expenditures and stores inventory.

#### B - Restricted Fund Balance:

The restricted fund balance classification reflects amounts subject to externally imposed and legally enforceable constraints. Such constraints may be imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or may be imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. These are the same restrictions used to determine restricted net position as reported in the government-wide and fiduciary trust fund statements.

#### C - Committed Fund Balance:

The committed fund balance classification reflects amounts subject to internal constraints self-imposed by formal action of the Board of Trustees. The constraints giving rise to committed fund balance must be imposed no later than the end of the reporting period. The actual amounts may be determined subsequent to that date but prior to the issuance of the financial statements. Formal action by the Board of Trustees is required to remove any commitment from any fund balance. At June 30, 2017, the District had no committed fund balances.

#### D - Assigned Fund Balance:

The assigned fund balance classification reflects amounts that the District's Board of Trustees has approved to be used for specific purposes, based on the District's intent related to those specific purposes. The Board of Trustees can designate personnel with the authority to assign fund balances, however, as of June 30, 2017, no such designation has occurred.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

#### Fund Balance Classifications:

#### E - Unassigned Fund Balance:

In the General Fund only, the unassigned fund balance classification reflects the residual balance that has not been assigned to other funds and that is not restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes.

In any fund other than the General Fund, a positive unassigned fund balance is never reported because amounts in any other fund are assumed to have been assigned, at least, to the purpose of that fund. However, deficits in any fund, including the General Fund that cannot be eliminated by reducing or eliminating amounts assigned to other purposes are reported as negative unassigned fund balance.

<u>Fund Balance Policy</u>: The District has an expenditure policy relating to fund balances. For purposes of fund balance classifications, expenditures are to be spent from restricted fund balances first, followed in order by committed fund balances (if any), assigned fund balances and lastly unassigned fund balances.

While GASB Cod. Sec. 1300 and 1800 do not require districts to establish a minimum fund balance policy or a stabilization arrangement, GASB Cod. Sec. 1300 and 1800 do require the disclosure of a minimum fund balance policy and stabilization arrangements, if they have been adopted by the Board of Trustees. At June 30, 2017, the District has established a minimum General Fund fund balance policy of 5% of General Fund total outgo. As of June 30, 2017, the District has an unassigned balance of \$9,208,664 or 12.8%.

<u>Property Taxes</u>: Secured property taxes are attached as an enforceable lien on property as of March 1. Taxes are due in two installments on or before December 10 and April 10. Unsecured property taxes are due in one installment on or before August 31. The County of Placer bills and collects taxes for the District. Tax revenues are recognized by the District when received.

<u>Encumbrances</u>: Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. All encumbrances are liquidated as of June 30.

<u>Eliminations and Reclassifications</u>: In the process of aggregating data for the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities, some amounts reported as interfund activity and balances in the funds were eliminated or reclassified. Interfund receivables and payables were eliminated to minimize the "grossing up" effect on assets and liabilities within the governmental activities column.

<u>Estimates</u>: The preparation of basic financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

<u>Pooled Funds</u>: In accordance with Education Code Section 41001, the Office of Education maintains substantially all of its cash in the interest bearing Placer County Treasurer's Pooled Investment Fund. The Office of Education is considered to be an involuntary participant in an external investment pool. The fair value of the Office of Education's investment in the pool is reported in the financial statements at amounts based upon the Office of Education's prorata share of the fair value provided by the County Treasurer for the entire portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of that portfolio). The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by the County Treasurer, which is recorded on the amortized cost basis.

<u>Deposits - Custodial Credit Risk</u>: The District limits custodial credit risk by ensuring uninsured balances are collateralized by the respective financial institution. Cash balances held in banks are insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and are collateralized by the respective financial institution. At June 30, 2017, the carrying amount of the District's accounts was \$363,484 and the bank balance was \$367,132, of which \$21,159 was uninsured by the FDIC.

<u>Investments</u>: The Cash with Fiscal Agent of \$8,103 in the Mello-Roos Fund represents debt proceeds that have been set aside for capital projects and the repayment of long-term liabilities. These amounts are held by a third party custodian in the District's name.

<u>Interest Rate Risk</u>: The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits cash and investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. At June 30, 2017, the District had no significant interest rate risk related to cash and investments held.

<u>Credit Risk</u>: The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits its investment choices other than the limitations of state law.

<u>Concentration of Credit Risk</u>: The District does not place limits on the amount it may invest in any one issuer. At June 30, 2017, the District had no concentration of credit risk.

#### **NOTE 3 - INTERFUND TRANSACTIONS**

<u>Interfund Activity</u>: Transactions between funds of the District are recorded as transfers. The unpaid balances at year end, as a result of such transactions, are shown as due to and due from other funds.

#### **NOTE 5 - LONG-TERM LIABILITIES**

Special Tax Bonds: On March 10, 2015, the District issued Community Facilities District No. 1 Special Tax Bonds in the amount of \$12,376,387, to provide funds for refunding all of the Series 2005 Bonds. The Mello-Roos Bonds are authorized pursuant to the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 and are payable from the proceeds of an annual Special Tax to be levied and collected on property within the District. The Special tax is to be levied according to the rate and method of apportionment determined by a formula approved by the Board, as the legislative body of the District, and by the registered voters within the District.

The bonds bear interest rates ranging from 2.44% to 3.5% and are scheduled to mature in September 2034.

#### NOTE 7 - NET PENSION LIABILITY - STATE TEACHERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

General Information about the State Teachers' Retirement Plan

<u>Plan Description</u>: Teaching-certified employees of the District are provided with pensions through the State Teachers' Retirement Plan (STRP) – a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS). The Teachers' Retirement Law (California Education Code Section 22000 et seq.), as enacted and amended by the California Legislature, established this plan and CalSTRS as the administrator. The benefit terms of the plans may be amended through legislation. CalSTRS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at http://www.calstrs.com/comprehensive-annual-financial-report.

Benefits Provided: The STRP Defined Benefit Program has two benefit formulas:

- CalSTRS 2% at 60: Members first hired on or before December 31, 2012, to perform service that could be creditable to CalSTRS.
- CalSTRS 2% at 62: Members first hired on or after January 1, 2013, to perform service that could be creditable to CalSTRS.

#### NOTE 7 - NET PENSION LIABILITY - STATE TEACHERS' RETIREMENT PLAN (Continued)

The Defined Benefit Program provides retirement benefits based on members' final compensation, age and years of service credit. In addition, the retirement program provides benefits to members upon disability and to survivors/beneficiaries upon the death of eligible members. There are several differences between the two benefit formulas which are noted below.

#### CaISTRS 2% at 60

CalSTRS 2% at 60 members are eligible for normal retirement at age 60, with a minimum of five years of credited service. The normal retirement benefit is equal to 2.0 percent of final compensation for each year of credited service. Early retirement options are available at age 55 with five years of credited service or as early as age 50 with 30 years of credited service. The age factor for retirements after age 60 increases with each quarter year of age to 2.4 percent at age 63 or older. Members who have 30 years or more of credited service receive an additional increase of up to 0.2 percent to the age factor, known as the career factor. The maximum benefit with the career factor is 2.4 percent of final compensation.

CalSTRS calculates retirement benefits based on a one-year final compensation for members who retired on or after January 1, 2001, with 25 or more years of credited service, or for classroom teachers with less than 25 years of credited service if the employer elected to pay the additional benefit cost prior to January 1, 2014. One-year final compensation means a member's highest average annual compensation earnable for 12 consecutive months calculated by taking the creditable compensation that a member could earn in a school year while employed on a fulltime basis, for a position in which the person worked. For members with less than 25 years of credited service, final compensation is the highest average annual compensation earnable for any three consecutive years of credited service.

#### CaISTRS 2% at 62

CalSTRS 2% at 62 members are eligible for normal retirement at age 62, with a minimum of five years of credited service. The normal retirement benefit is equal to 2.0 percent of final compensation for each year of credited service. An early retirement option is available at age 55. The age factor for retirement after age 62 increases with each guarter year of age to 2.4 percent at age 65 or older.

All CalSTRS 2% at 62 members have their final compensation based on their highest average annual compensation earnable for three consecutive years of credited service.

<u>Contributions</u>: Required member, employer and state contribution rates are set by the California Legislature and Governor and detailed in Teachers' Retirement Law. Contribution rates are expressed as a level percentage of payroll using the entry age normal actuarial cost method.

A summary of statutory contribution rates and other sources of contributions to the Defined Benefit Program are as follows:

Members - Under CalSTRS 2% at 60, the member contribution rate was 10.25 percent of applicable member earnings for fiscal year 2016-17. Under CalSTRS 2% at 62, members contribute 50 percent of the normal cost of their retirement plan, which resulted in a contribution rate of 9.205 percent of applicable member earnings for fiscal year 2016-17.

#### NOTE 7 - NET PENSION LIABILITY - STATE TEACHERS' RETIREMENT PLAN (Continued)

In general, member contributions cannot increase unless members are provided with some type of "comparable advantage" in exchange for such increases. Under previous law, the Legislature could reduce or eliminate the 2 percent annual increase to retirement benefits. As a result of AB 1469, effective July 1, 2014, the Legislature cannot reduce the 2 percent annual benefit adjustment for members who retire on or after January 1, 2014, and in exchange for this "comparable advantage," the member contribution rates have been increased by an amount that covers a portion of the cost of the 2 percent annual benefit adjustment.

Effective July 1, 2014, with the passage of AB 1469, member contributions for those under the 2% at 60 benefit structure increase from 8.0 percent to a total of 10.25 percent of applicable member earnings, phased in over the next three years. For members under the 2% at 62 benefit structure, contributions will increase from 8.0 percent to 9.205 percent of applicable member earnings, again phased in over three years, if there is no change to normal cost.

Employers – 12.58 percent of applicable member earnings.

In accordance with AB 1469, employer contributions will increase from 8.25 percent to a total of 19.1 percent of applicable member earnings phased in over seven years starting in 2014. The new legislation also gives the board limited authority to adjust employer contribution rates from July 1, 2021 through June 2046 in order to eliminate the remaining unfunded actuarial obligation related to service credited to members prior to July 1, 2014. The board cannot adjust the rate by more than 1 percent in a fiscal year, and the total contribution rate in addition to the 8.25 percent cannot exceed 12 percent.

The CalSTRS employer contribution rate increases effective for fiscal year 2016-17 through fiscal year 2045-46 are summarized in the table below:

The District contributed \$3,812,851 to the plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017.

Also as a result of AB 1469, the additional state appropriation required to fully fund the benefits in effect as of 1990 by 2046 is specific in subdivision (b) of Education Code Section 22955.1. The increased contributions end as of fiscal year 2046-2047. The CalSTRS state contribution rates effective for fiscal year 2016-17 and beyond are summarized in the table below.

As shown in the subsequent table, the state rate will increase to 4.811 percent on July 1, 2017, to continue paying down the unfunded liabilities associated with the benefits structure that was in place in 1990 prior to certain enhancements in benefits and reductions in contributions.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2016, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2015. The District's proportion of the net pension liability was based on the District's share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the contributions of all participating school districts and the State. At June 30, 2016, the District's proportion was 0.057 percent, which was an increase of 0.001 percent from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2015.

<sup>(2)</sup>During its April 2017 meeting, the board of CalSTRS exercised its limited authority to increase the state contribution rate by 0.5 percent of the payroll effective July 1, 2017.

<sup>(3)</sup>The CalSTRS board has limited authority to adjust state contribution rates from July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2046 in order to eliminate the remaining unfunded actuarial obligation associated with the 1990 benefit structure. The board cannot increase the rate by more than 0.50 percent in a fiscal year, and if there is no unfunded actuarial obligation, the contribution rate imposed to pay for the 1990 benefit structure would be reduced to 0 percent. Rates in effect prior to July 1, 2014, are reinstated if necessary to address any remaining 1990 unfunded actuarial obligation from July 1, 2046, and thereafter.

Differences between expected and actual experience and changes in assumptions are amortized over a closed period equal to the average remaining service life of plan members, which is 7 years as of the June 30, 2016 measurement date. CalSTRS uses custom mortality tables to best fit the patterns of mortality among its members. These custom tables are based on RP2000 series tables adjusted to fit CalSTRS experience. RP2000 series tables are an industry standard set of mortality rates published by the Society of Actuaries. See CalSTRS July 1, 2006 – June 30, 2010 experience analysis and June 30, 2015 Actuarial Program Valuations for more information.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. The best estimate ranges were developed using capital market assumptions from CalSTRS general investment consultant as an input to the process. The actuarial investment rate of return assumption was adopted by the board in 2012 in conjunction with the most recent experience study. For each future valuation, CalSTRS consulting actuary reviews the return assumption for reasonableness based on the most current capital market assumptions. Best estimates of 20-year geometric real rates of return and the assumed asset allocation for each major asset class used as input to develop the actuarial investment rate of return are summarized in the following table:

<u>Discount Rate</u>: The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.60 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members and employers will be made at statutory contribution rates in accordance with the rate increase per Assembly Bill 1469. Projected inflows from investment earnings were calculated using the long-term assumed investment rate of return (7.60 percent) and assuming that contributions, benefit payments, and administrative expense occur midyear. Based on those assumptions, the STRP's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments to current plan members. Therefore, the long-term assumed investment rate of return was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

#### NOTE 8 - NET PENSION LIABILITY - PUBLIC EMPLOYER'S RETIREMENT FUND B

General Information about the Public Employer's Retirement Fund B

<u>Plan Description</u>: The schools cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan Public Employer's Retirement Fund B (PERF B) is administered by the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). Plan membership consists of non-teaching and non-certified employees of public schools (K-12), community college districts, offices of education, charter and private schools (elective) in the State of California.

The Plan was established to provide retirement, death and disability benefits to non-teaching and noncertified employees in schools. The benefit provisions for Plan employees are established by statute. CalPERS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at https://www.calpers.ca.gov/docs/forms-publications/cafr-2016.pdf.

<u>Benefits Provided</u>: The benefits for the defined benefit plans are based on members' years of service, age, final compensation, and benefit formula. Benefits are provided for disability, death, and survivors of eligible members or beneficiaries. Members become fully vested in their retirement benefits earned to date after five years (10 years for State Second Tier members) of credited service.

#### NOTE 8 - NET PENSION LIABILITY - PUBLIC EMPLOYER'S RETIREMENT FUND B (Continued)

<u>Contributions</u>: The benefits for the defined benefit pension plans are funded by contributions from members and employers, and earnings from investments. Member and employer contributions are a percentage of applicable member compensation. Member contribution rates are defined by law and depend on the respective employer's benefit formulas. Employer contribution rates are determined by periodic actuarial valuations or by state statute. Actuarial valuations are based on the benefit formulas and employee groups of each employer. Employer contributions, including lump sum contributions made when agencies first join the PERF, are credited with a market value adjustment in determining contribution rates.

The required contribution rates of most active plan members are based on a percentage of salary in excess of a base compensation amount ranging from zero dollars to \$863 monthly.

Required contribution rates for active plan members and employers as a percentage of payroll for the year ended June 30, 2017 were as follows:

*Members* - The member contribution rate was 6.0 or 7.0 percent of applicable member earnings for fiscal year 2016-17.

Employers - The employer contribution rate was 13.888 percent of applicable member earnings.

The District contributed \$1,229,817 to the plan for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

At June 30, 2017, the District reported a liability of \$13,361,000 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2016, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2015. The District's proportion of the net pension liability was based on the District's share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the contributions of all participating school Districts. At June 30, 2016, the District's proportion was 0.068 percent, which was an increase of 0.003 percent from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2015. For the year ended June 30, 2017, the District recognized pension expense of \$1,983,530.

<u>Discount Rate</u>: The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.65 percent. A projection of the expected benefit payments and contributions was performed to determine if assets would run out. The test revealed the assets would not run out. Therefore the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability for the Plan. The results of the crossover testing for the Plan are presented in a detailed report that can be obtained at CalPERS' website.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a buildingblock method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class.

In determining the long-term expected rate of return, CalPERS took into account both short-term and long-term market return expectations as well as the expected cash flows of the Plan. Such cash flows were developed assuming that both members and employers will make their required contributions on time and as scheduled in all future years. Using historical returns of all the Plan's asset classes, expected compound (geometric) returns were calculated over the short-term (first 10 years) and the long-term (11-60 years) using a building-block approach. Using the expected nominal returns for both short-term and long-term, the present value of benefits was calculated. The expected rate of return was set by calculating the single equivalent expected return that arrived at the same present value of benefits for cash flows as the one calculated using both short-term and long-term returns.

The expected rate of return was then set equivalent to the single equivalent rate calculated above and rounded down to the nearest one guarter of one percent.

#### **NOTE 9 - OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

In addition to the pension benefits described in Notes 7 and 8, the District established an Other Postemployment Benefits Plan which is a single-employer defined benefit healthcare plan. The District participates in the California Employer's Retiree Benefit Trust Program (CERBT) to pre-fund OPEB liabilities. The CERBT is an agent multiple employer plan consisting of an aggregation of single-employer plans, with pooled administrative and investment functions that are administered by PERS. A copy of the aggregated CERBT annual financial report may be obtained @www.calpers.ca.gov. CERBT serves as an irrevocable trust, to ensure that funds contributed into the Trust are dedicated to service the needs of member districts, and their employees and retirees.

The District provides postretirement health care benefits to certificated employees (under three distinct agreements between the District and the Western Placer Teachers Association) and classified employees (under an agreement between the District and the Western Placer Classified Employees Association) as follows:

- A. The District pays the full cost of health care benefits to age 65 for employees who retired prior to June 30, 1990 and had reached age 60. The full cost of benefits is limited to the amount the District was paying as of June 30, 1990. After age 65, the District continues to pay 50% of the current certificate cap and the retiree pays the remainder. As of June 30, 2017, there were 4 retirees receiving benefits under this agreement.
- B. The District's certificated retirees who had at least fifteen years of service and had reached a minimum age of 55 and retire after July 1, 2001 receive up to \$6,455 per year in health care benefits for a maximum of 10 years or until age 65, whichever comes first. As of June 30, 2017, there were 6 retired employees receiving benefits under this agreement.
- C. The District pays up to \$2,775 per year in healthcare benefits for classified employees who had at least fifteen years of service and had reached age 55 and retired after July 1, 2003. These benefits cease after a maximum of five years or at age 65, whichever comes first. As of June 30, 2017, there were 5 retired employees receiving benefits under this agreement.

# NOTE 9 - OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (Continued)

The District provides these benefits on a pay-as-you-go basis. The CERBT agent plan consists of an aggregation of single employer plans under the terms of which separate accounts will be maintained for each employer. So the District's assets will provide benefits only under the District's plan. Separate financial statements are not prepared for the District's Single Employer Plan.

The District's annual other postemployment benefit (OPEB) cost (expense) is calculated based on the annual required contribution of the employer (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Cod. Sec. P50.108-.109. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed thirty years. The following table shows the components of the District's annual OPEB cost for the year, the amount actually contributed to the plan, and changes in the District's net OPEB obligation:

As of July 1, 2015, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the plan was partially funded. The actuarial accrued liability for benefits was \$5.6 million and the actuarial value of plan assets was \$3.5 million, resulting in an unfunded liability of \$2.3 million. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the Plan) was \$33.5 million, and the ratio of the UAAL to the covered payroll was 7 percent.

# NOTE 9 - OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (Continued)

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and the healthcare cost trend. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress, shown as required supplementary information, presents multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

In the July 1, 2015 actuarial valuation, the entry age actuarial cost method was used. The actuarial assumptions included a 6.3 percent investment rate (net of administrative expenses), which is a blended rate of the expected long-term investment returns on plan assets and on the employer's own investments calculated based on the funded level of the plan on the valuation date, and an annual healthcare cost trend rate of 4.0 percent. The actuarial value of assets was determined using a 5 year smoothing formula with a 20% corridor around market value, based on the market value of the assets as of June 30, 2016.

#### **NOTE 10 - JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT**

<u>Schools Insurance Group</u>: The District is a member with other school districts of a Joint Powers Authority, Schools Insurance Group (SIG), for the operation of a common risk management and insurance program for property and liability coverage. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage in the prior year.

The relationship between the District and the Joint Powers Authority is such that the Joint Powers Authority is not component unit of the District for financial reporting purposes.

#### **NOTE 11 - CONTINGENCIES**

The District is subject to legal proceedings and claims which arise in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of management, the amount of ultimate liability with respect to these actions will not materially affect the financial position or results of operations of the District.

The District has received federal and state funds for specific purposes that are subject to review and audit by the grantor agencies. Although such audits could result in expenditure disallowances under terms of the grants, it is management's opinion that any required reimbursements of future revenue offsets subsequently determined will not have a material effect on the District's financial position or results of operations.

#### **NOTE 12 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS**

Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes: On July 6, 2017, the District issued Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANs) totaling \$11,800,000, with an interest rate of 3.0%. The 2017 TRANs are payable only out of taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts and other monies which are received by the District for its General Fund and are attributable to the fiscal year 2017-2018 and legally available for payment thereof. The TRANs are secured by a pledge of certain unrestricted revenues received by the District issuing such TRANs for its General Fund attributable to the fiscal year 2017-2018, and the TRANs constitute a first lien and charge payable from the first monies received by the District from such pledged revenues. The TRANs are scheduled to mature on June 30, 2018.

<u>Certificates of Participation</u>: In September 2017, the District issued \$51,795,000 Refinancing Project COP, with interest rates between 2.0% and 5.0% and maturing in August 2049, for the advance refunding of the District's 2009 refinancing COPS.

The General Fund fund balance has increased by \$3,363,883 over the past three years. The fiscal year 2017-2018 budget projects an decrease of \$1,528,417. For a district this size, the state recommends available reserves of at least 3% of total General Fund expenditures, transfers out, and other uses. For the year ended June 30, 2017, the District met this requirement.

The District has incurred an operating surplus in two of the past three years, and anticipates an operating deficit in fiscal year 2018.

Total long-term liabilities have increased by \$77,601,122 over the past two years.

Average daily attendance has increased by 137 over the past two years. An increase of 80 ADA is projected for the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

#### **NOTE 1 - PURPOSE OF SCHEDULES**

#### A - Schedule of Average Daily Attendance

Average daily attendance is a measurement of the number of pupils attending classes of the District. The purpose of attendance accounting from a fiscal standpoint is to provide the basis on which apportionments of state funds are made to school districts. This schedule provides information regarding the attendance of students at various grade levels and in different programs.

#### B - Schedule of Instructional Time

The District has received incentive funding for increasing instructional time as provided by the Incentives for Longer Instructional Day. The District neither met nor exceeded its target funding. This schedule presents information on the amount of instructional time offered by the District, and whether the District complied with the provisions of Education Code Sections 46201 through 46206.

#### C - Schedule of Expenditure of Federal Awards

The Schedule of Expenditure of Federal Awards includes the federal award activity of the District and is presented on the accrual basis of accounting. The information in this schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance)*. Expenditures are recognized following, as applicable, either the cost principles in OMB Circular A-87, Cost Principles for Educational Institutions or the cost principles contained in the Uniform Guidance, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement. The District has elected not to use the 10-percent de minimis indirect cost rate allowed under the Uniform Guidance.

The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

#### Criteria

Twelve Bridges Middle School

- A dual count is not being documented when funds are turned into the office.
- Student Body minutes were not available for review.
- Profit and Loss statements and bank reconciliations are not being reviewed.

#### **Effect**

ASB funds could potentially be misappropriated.

#### Cause

Adequate internal control procedures have not been implemented and enforced.

#### Fiscal Impact

#### Recommendation

Based on the deficiencies identified above, we recommend the following:

- Cash count forms should be performed evidencing dual count of funds for receipt of funds.
- · Student Body minutes should be maintained to support the transactions that occur during the year.
- Monthly financial transactions should be reviewed by the site Principal.

#### Views of Responsible Officials and Planned Corrective Actions

The District agrees with the auditor's recommendations and notes they have brought in an experienced ASB advisor to ensure proper controls are in place over ASB.
