Government Code 53646 requires that if a local agency has placed all of its investments in the Local Agency Investment Fund or in a Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insured accounts in a bank or savings and loan association, in a county investment pool or any combination of these, the chief financial officer needs to provide to the Board of Trustees the most recent statement of statements received by the local agency from these institutions.

The District maintains its entire reserve in the County of Placer investment pool. Therefore, to meet the requirements of Government Code 53646, the County of Placer Treasurer's Investment Reports are submitted to the District's Board of Trustees on a quarterly basis for their review.

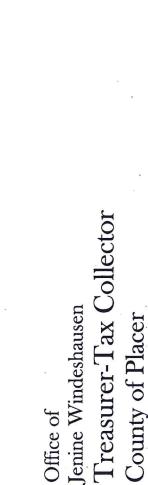

PREFACE

For the purpose of clarity the following glossary of investment terms has been provided.

Book Value is the purchase price of a security plus amortization of any premium or discount. This may be more or less than face value, depending upon whether the security was purchased at a premium or at a discount.

Par Value is the principal amount of a security and the amount of principal that will be paid at maturity.

Market Value is the value at which a security can be sold at the time it is priced or the need to sell arises.

Market values are only relevant if the investment is sold prior to maturity. Profit or loss would be realized only if the specific investment were to be sold.

Government Code 53646 Compliance Report

The following information is a monthly update of funds on deposit in the Placer County Treasury pursuant to California Government code Section 53646. Further details of individual investments are included in the Treasurer's Monthly Investment Report. All investment transactions and decisions have been made with full compliance with California Government Code and Placer County's Statement of Investment Policy.

Individual securities are priced at the end of each month by Wells Fargo Bank.

The Weighted Average Maturity of the investments with the Treasury is 1,528 days.

The ability of the Placer County Treasury to meet its cash flow needs is demonstrated by \$373,170,840.90 in cash and investments maturing in the next 180 days.

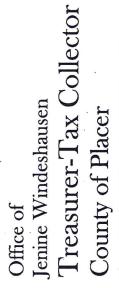

PREFACE

Placer County Treasurer's Pooled Investment Report

For the purpose of clarity the following glossary of investment terms has been provided.

Book Value is the purchase price of a security plus amortization of any premium or discount. This may be more or less than face value, depending upon whether the security was purchased at a premium or at a discount.

Par Value is the principal amount of a security and the amount of principal that will be paid at maturity.

Market Value is the value at which a security can be sold at the time it is priced or the need to sell arises.

Market values are only relevant if the investment is sold prior to maturity. Profit or loss would be realized only if the specific investment were to be sold.

Government Code 53646 Compliance Report

The following information is a monthly update of funds on deposit in the Placer County Treasury pursuant to California Government code Section 53646. Further details of individual investments are included in the Treasurer's Monthly Investment Report. All investment transactions and decisions have been made with full compliance with California Government Code and Placer County's Statement of Investment Policy.

Individual securities are priced at the end of each month by Wells Fargo Bank.

The Weighted Average Maturity of the investments with the Treasury is 1,717 days.

The ability of the Placer County Treasury to meet its cash flow needs is demonstrated by \$ 227,884,896.68 in cash and investments maturing in the next 180 days.

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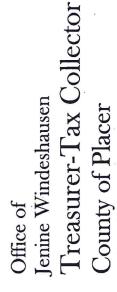

WHEREAS, it is not within the capacity of KidZKount to prepare specified meals under the Child Care Food Program for enrolled participating children, and

WHEREAS, the facilities and capabilities of the Vendor are adequate to prepare and deliver specified meals to KidZKount's facilities, and

WHEREAS, the Vendor is willing to provide such services to the KidZKount on a cost reimbursement basis:

THEREFORE, both parties hereto agree as follows:

THE VENDOR AGREES TO:

1. Prepare and deliver the meals, inclusive of milk, to the following sites:

- 2. Provide **KidZKount**, for approval by **KidZKount's** Nutrition Services Unit, with a proposed menu for each month at least ten (10) days prior to the month to which the menu applies. Any changes to the menu made after **KidZKount's** approval must be agreed upon by **KidZKount** and documented on the menu records.
- 3. Assure that each meal provided to **KidZKount** under this contract meets the minimum requirements as to the nutritional content as specified by the Child and Adult Care Food Program Meal Pattern, Schedule B (attached) which is excerpted from the regulations 7 CFR Part 226.20. Schedule B requirements are component-based, but meals are prepared under the guidelines of the *allowable* nutrient-based system. **KidZKount** also acknowledges that **Vendor** may furnish meals that additionally meet component-based requirements; however, this is not a requirement under the nutrient-based system, supported by the nutritional analyses.
- 4. Maintain full and accurate records which document:
 - a. The menus listing all meals provided to KidZKount during the term of this contract.
 - b. A listing of all nutritional components of each meal, and
 - c. An itemization of the quantities of each component used to prepare said meal.

The **Vendor** also agrees to provide meal preparation documentation by using yield factors for each food item as listed in the USDA Food Buying Guide or the CNFDD Simplified Buying Guide when calculating and recording the quantity of food prepared for each meal.

- 5. Maintain such cost records as invoices, receipts, and/or other documentation that exhibit the purchase, or otherwise availability to the **Vendor**, of the meal components and quantities itemized in the meal preparation records.
- 6. Maintain on a daily basis an accurate count of the number of meal orders, as needed.
- 7. Allow **KidZKount** to increase or decrease the number of meal orders, as needed.
- 8. Present to **KidZKount** an invoice accompanied by reports no later than the tenth (10th) day of each month which itemizes the previous month's delivery. The **Vendor** agrees to forfeit payment for meals which are not ready within one hour of the agreed upon delivery time, or are spoiled or unwholesome at the time of delivery or do not otherwise meet the meal requirements contained in this Agreement.
- 9. Provide **KidZKount** with a copy of current health certifications for the food service facility in which it prepares meals for use in the CACFP. The vendor shall ensure that all health and sanitation requirements of the California Retail Food Facilities Law, Chapter 4 of the California Health and Safety Code are met at all times.
- 10. Operate in accordance with current CACFP regulations.

- 11. Retain all required records for a period of three years after the end of the fiscal year to which they pertain (or longer, if an audit is in progress); and upon request to make all accounts and records pertaining to the Agreement available to the Certified Public Accountant hired by **KidZKount**, representatives of the California State Department of Education, the US Department of Agriculture, and the US General Accounting Office for audit or administrative review at a reasonable time and place.
- 12. Not subcontract for the total meal, with or without milk, or for the assembly of the meal.

KIDZKOUNT AGREES TO:

- 1. Request by telephone, no later than 9:00 a.m. the day of, an accurate number of meals to be delivered to **KidZKount.**
- 2. Ensure that a **KidZKount** representative is available at each delivery site, at the specified time on each specified delivery day to receive, inspect, and sign for the requested number of meals. **KidZKount** assures the **Vendor** that this individual will be trained and knowledgeable in the record keeping and meal requirements of the CACFP, and in health and sanitation practices.
- 3. Provide personnel to serve meals, clean the serving and eating areas, and assemble transport carts and auxiliary items for pickup by the **Vendor** no later than 3:30 p.m. daily.
- 4. Notify the vendor within ten days of receipt of the next month's proposed menu of any changes, additions or deletions which will be required in the menu request.
- 5. Provide the **Vendor** with a copy of 7 CFR Part 226, the Child and Adult Care Food Program Meal Pattern, Schedule B; the USDA Food Buying Guide or the CNFDD Simplified Buying Guide (as applicable); and all other technical assistance materials pertaining to the food service requirements of the CACFP. **KidZKount** will within 24 hours of receipt from the State Agency, advise the **Vendor** of any changes in the food service requirements of CACFP.
- 6. Pay the **Vendor** by the 20th day of each month the full amount as presented on the monthly itemized invoice. **KidZKount** agrees to notify the **Vendor** within 48 hours of receipt of any discrepancy in the invoice.

MISCELLANEOUS AGREEMENTS:

Vendor will complete the required daily Transport Record indicating number of meals, menu item, and service size per person of item. In addition, for food safety purposes, **Vendor** will also indicate <u>time</u> the food was packed and the <u>temperature</u> of the food at packing time. Receiving **KidZKount** staff member will sign for food received. Staff member will also be responsible for taking the temperature of the food received, as applicable, for the duration of time before the food is served.

Vendor will furnish insulated transport containers that maximize temperature-holding capacity. In general, these containers will be picked up the following day as new lunches are delivered. If any food

trays are also furnished, **KidZKount** will wash them out and understands that the **Vendor** will take responsibility for sterilizing them before the next use.

KidZKount agrees to accept all responsibility for cleanliness, prevention of contamination, and hold of food products immediately upon receipt of such food products from the **Vendor**. **KidZKount** further agrees to ensure and hold harmless the **Vendor** from all liability claims resulting from actions occurring after receipt of food products from the **Vendor**.

TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT:

This agreement will take effect commencing the first day of August in the year signed below, and shall be for a period of one calendar year. It may be terminated by notification given by either party hereto to the other party at least 30 days prior to the date of termination. The agreement is contingent upon the agency being annually re-funded by the Department of Health and Human Services each February 1.

BACKGROUND:

Common Core State Standards reflect an enormous shift in instructional strategies and learning expectations on the parts of school districts and students. The Common Core were adopted by the State of California on August 2, 2010, and have now been adopted by nearly all of the 50 United States. The Common Core State Standards attempt to align the learning standards for students in grades K – 12 across the nation on a par with international standards. The Common Core State Standards are a major revision for California from the previously adopted 1997 California State Standards, being more rigorous, more clearly organized, sequentially organizing skills for easier reference K/12, and focusing on higher levels of thinking on the part of students.

New national assessments are being developed that will in part replace our current STAR testing in the areas of Mathematics and English/Language Arts. California had the option of choosing one of the two developing assessments, choosing Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC). SBAC will "go live" in the 2014/15 school year, with the option of a trial run in the 2013/14 school year. SBAC is aligned with the new Common Core State Standards.

WPUSD has been providing professional development to our administrators and instructional staff over the last year. A series of Common Core State Standards presentations will be made during the 2013/14 school year to inform our Board of Trustees and general public regarding the impact and importance of these new standards.

What are the Common Core State Standards?

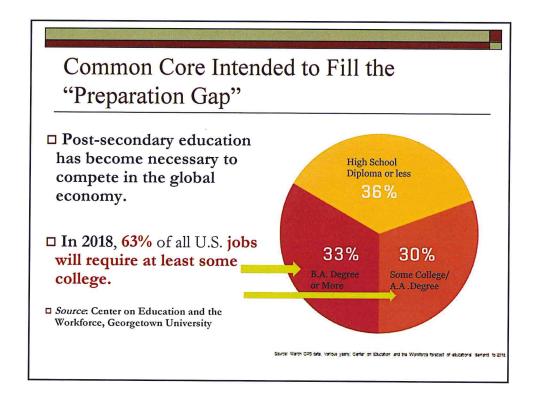
- □ A shared set of clear educational standards.
 - Common Standards are intended to ensure students are receiving a high-quality education consistently from school to school and state to state.
- □ CCSS are designed to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in **college and careers**.
- □ CCCSS ~ CA's additional standards; since minimized

What Prompted the Common Core State Standards?

- □ Need for comparability of student achievement state to state (federal funding purposes; student/family mobility).
- ☐ Assurance of college-ready high school graduates (students not needing remedial college classes)
- □ Need for career-ready high school graduates (business ~ focus on academics not always applicable to non-academia environments)
- □ Needed shift from NCLB emphasis of "skills" to "critical thinking/problem solving"

Who Wrote the Common Core?

- □ Coalition of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) & National Governors' Assn (NGA) ~ 2008/09 drafts
 - Influence of Coalitions of Business, Policy Makers & Education (including USDOE & NEA)?
 - Hunt Institute ~ Affiliated Center of UofNC, Chapel Hill ~ "strategic catalyst for transforming public education & securing our country's future" ~ 2001
 - □ P21~ Partnership for 21st Century Skills emphasis on 3R's/4C's critical thinking, communication, collaboration, creativity ~ 2002
- □ Involvement of higher education reps ~ 2009
- \square K/12 teacher input ~ 2009/10 (10,000 submissions)
- □ Adopted by $CA \sim 2010$
- □ Adopted by 46 of 50 states by 2013
 - Texas, Alaska, Virginia, Nebraska "holdouts"
 - Michigan and Indiana "pausing" studying \$\$



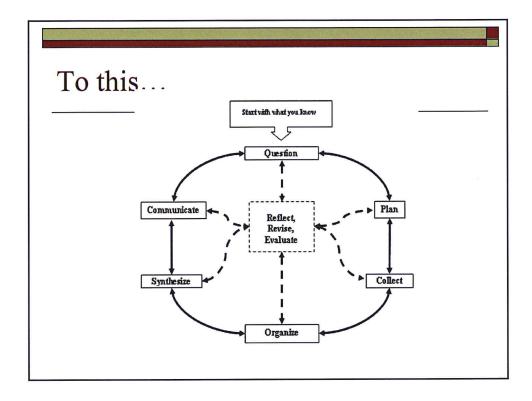
CCSS Correlated to 21st Century Competencies

The Four C's - Partnership for 21st Century Skills - P21Coalition

- □ Critical thinking and problem solving—including the ability to make decisions, solve problems, and take action as appropriate;
- □ Communication skills—the ability to synthesize and transmit ideas in written (incl tech) and oral formats;
- □ Collaboration and team building—the ability to work effectively with others, including those from diverse groups & with opposing viewpoints;
- □ Creativity and innovation—the ability to see what's NOT there and make something happen.
- □(Character "5th C" grit, work ethic, perseverance not specifically included in CCSS)

Strengths of the New Common Core

- □ Focus on Literacy and Mathematics across all content areas
- □ Aligned with expectations for College and Career Readiness
- □ Developed to provide **consistency** from state to state
- ☐ Include content understanding requiring deep thinking and complex solutions on the parts of students in response to complex questioning on the parts of teachers
- □For California: more of a shift in <u>how</u> we teach and <u>what</u> we expect students to do ~ students develop Habits of Mind (HOM) as they approach problems/questions

CCSS Habits of Mind (HOM) ~ ELA//Literacy Capacities

- □ Demonstrate independence
- □ Build strong content knowledge
- □ Respond to varying demands of audience, task, purpose, and discipline
- □ Comprehend as well as critique
- □ Value evidence
- □ Use technology and digital media strategically
- □ Understand other cultures and perspectives

CCSS Habits of Mind (HOM) ~ MATH Standards for Mathematical Practice (SMP)

- 1. Make sense of problems and persevere in solving them.
- 2. Reason abstractly and quantitatively.
- 3. Construct viable arguments and critique the reasoning of others.
- 4. Model with mathematics.
- 5. Use appropriate tools strategically.
- 6. Attend to precision.
- 7. Look for and make use of structure.
- 8. Look for and express regularity in repeated reasoning.

Common Core State Standards – So what does this look like in the classroom?

- □ Deeper questioning techniques teachers
- ☐ More complex assignments/projects with real-life applications **teachers**
- ☐ More use of textbooks & challenge of student answers teachers
- ☐ Defense of answers showing greater understanding of concepts & detailed evidence from text students
- ☐ More research-based & project-based learning students
- ☐ More use of technology students

CCSS Habits of Mind ~

All content area teachers:

- □ Design deeper learning environments where students develop **Habits of Mind**
 - Lead high-level, text-based discussions
 - Focus on the process, not just content
 - Create assignments for <u>real</u> audiences and with <u>real</u> purposes
 - Teach argument (logic/reasoning), not just persuasion (emotion)
 - Increase text complexity~use challenging text!

CCSS Habits of Mind

All content area teachers:

- □ Intentionally sequence instructional strategies to progressively engage students in **Habits**:
 - Think, Pair-Share (or Think, Write, Pair-Share)
 - Show/model "thinking" in classrooms
 - Practice questioning and wait time
 - Group students and use engaging problems
 - Use deep questions and prompts with student groups
 - Allow struggle time; require evidential responses
 - Encourage/model logical reasoning

The Myths of Common Core....

What the CCSS "are not"

- ☐ A national/business dictation of curriculum content
 - CCSS define skills (literacy) **not content** in ELA, Social Studies, Science, & Technical Subjects
 - 40 of 500 possible Race to Top Points "CCSS"
 - P21 / Other Corporate influence
- ☐ A "dumbing down" of current CA standards
 - CCSS require higher reading levels than current CA standards; use of higher lexicon textbooks and ancillary materials
 - CCSS require extending thinking; creating viable arguments; citing text/proof to support arguments
 - Algebra CAN be taught before Grade 9 IF student is ready; if not, Grade 8 Math curriculum exists

The Myths of Common Core

What the CCSS "are not"

- ☐ A definitive change in content in English Language Arts classes deemphasizing the classics
 - CCSS suggests 70% use of non-fiction reading in grades 7 12; however, this is NOT limited to ELA classes includes Science, Social Studies & Technical Subjects
 - Classical literature will continue to be taught in ELA!
 - Cursive writing can be taught (WPUSD currently teaches cursive in Grade 3)
- ☐ A new vehicle to track sensitive family demographics
 - This already exists re poverty, ethnicity, parent ed, etc. as required for federal and state accountability; monitoring subgroup progress
 - There is NO additional iris scanning, tracking of religion, fingerprints, DNA, blood type etc. in CCSS!

CCSS ~ What about the assessments?

- □ SMARTER Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) replaces STAR CST/CMA ELA & Math ONLY ~ Grades 3 8 & 11
- □ Begins in 2014-2015 school year.
 - Smarter Balanced assessments will go beyond multiplechoice questions and include short constructed response, extended constructed response, and performance tasks that will allow students to complete in-depth work that demonstrates analytical skills and real-world problem solving.
- □STAR CST Science & Social Studies? CAPA? CAHSEE? CELDT? PFT?
- □ Assessments for Grades 2, 9, 10??

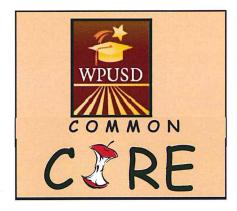

BACKGROUND:

AB 86 Education Omnibus Trailer Bill appropriates \$1.25 billion statewide to support the integration of academic content standards in instruction, apportioning these funds to school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and state special schools on an equal rate per pupil basis, based on prior year enrollment. The bill requires the receiving entities to adopt a plan delineating how the funds shall be spent and to report detailed expenditure information to the State Department of Education on or before July 1, 2015. Funds are of a one-time nature, are approximately \$200/student, and must be spent during the 2013 – 2014 and/or 2014 – 2015 school year. Funding apportioned pursuant to this section is specifically intended to fund the costs of any new programs or higher levels of services associated with implementation of the Common Core State Standards. Expenditures must fall within one or more of the following areas: technology enhancement, instructional materials, or professional development.

The Preliminary Allocation Plan was presented at the August 6, 2013 Board of Trustees meeting for discussion. Based on the discussion, adjustments were made and it is now presented for action.

AB 86: EDUCATION OMNIBUS TRAILER BILL

This bill would appropriate \$1,250,000,000 from the General Fund to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for transfer to Section A of the State School Fund to support the integration of academic content standards in instruction, as specified. The bill would require the Superintendent to apportion these funds to school districts, county offices of education, charter schools, and the state special schools using an equal rate per pupil based on prior year enrollment. The bill would require the school districts, county offices of education, charter schools, or state special schools receiving these funds to use them for certain purposes, including professional development of teachers, administrators, and paraprofessional educators or other classified employees involved in the direct instruction of pupils, as specified. The bill would require, as a condition of receiving funds apportioned pursuant to the bill, a school district, county office of education, charter school, or state special school to adopt a plan delineating how the funds shall be spent and to report detailed expenditure information to the State Department of Education on or before July 1, 2015, as specified. The bill would require the department to provide a summary of the expenditure information provided to it to the appropriate budget subcommittees and policy committees of the Legislature and to the Department of Finance on or before January 1, 2016. (AB 86 p.9)

- SEC. 85.(a)(1)The sum of one billion two hundred fifty million dollars(\$1,250,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for transfer to Section A of the State School Fund. The sum of six hundred twenty-five million dollars (\$625,000,000) shall be transferred in July 2013 and the sum of six hundred twenty-five million dollars (\$625,000,000) shall be transferred in August 2013.
- (2) It is the intent of the Legislature that school districts, county offices of education, charter schools, and the state special schools use funds allocated pursuant to subdivision (b) to support the integration of academic content standards in instruction adopted pursuant to Sections 60605.8, 60605.85,60605.10, 60605.11, and 60811.3 of the Education Code, for kindergarten and grades 1 to 12. inclusive, for purposes of establishing high-quality instructional programs for all pupils.
- (b) The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall apportion funds to school districts, county offices of education, charter schools, and the state special schools using an equal rate per pupil based on prior year enrollment.
- (c) A school district, county office of education, charter school, or state special school may encumber funds apportioned pursuant to this section at any time during the 2013–14 or 2014–15 fiscal year.
- (d) A school district, county office of education, charter school, or state special school shall expend funds allocated pursuant to this section for any of the following purposes:
- (1) <u>Professional development</u> for teachers, administrators, and paraprofessional educators or other classified employees involved in the direct instruction of pupils that is aligned to the academic content standards adopted pursuant to Sections 60605.8, 60605.11, 60605.85, and 60811.3 of the Education Code.
- (2) <u>Instructional materials</u> aligned to the academic content standards adopted pursuant to Sections 60605.8, 60605.85, 60605.11, and 60811.3 of the Education Code, including, but not limited to, supplemental instructional materials as provided in Sections 60605.86, 60605.87, and 60605.88 of the Education Code.
- (3) Integration of these academic content standards through technology-based instruction for purposes of improving the academic performance of pupils, including, but not necessarily limited to, expenditures necessary to support the administration of computer-based assessments and provide high-speed, high-bandwidth Internet connectivity for the purpose of administration of computer-based assessments.
- (e) As a condition of receiving funds allocated pursuant to this section, a school district, county office of education, charter school, or state special school shall do both of the following:

- (1) Develop and adopt a plan delineating how funds allocated pursuant to this section shall be spent. The plan shall be explained in a public meeting of the governing board of the school district, county board of education, or governing body of the charter school, before its adoption in a subsequent public meeting.
- (2) On or before July 1, 2015, report detailed expenditure information to the State Department of Education, including, but not limited to, specific purchases made and the number of teachers, administrators, or paraprofessional educators that received professional development. The State Department of Education shall determine the format for this report.
- (f) The State Department of Education shall summarize the information reported pursuant to paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) and shall submit the summary to the appropriate budget subcommittees and policy committees of the Legislature and to the Department of Finance on or before January 1, 2016.
- (g) Funding apportioned pursuant to this section is specifically intended to fund, and shall first be used to offset, the costs of any new programs or higher levels of service associated with implementation of the academic content standards adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant to Sections 60605.8, 60605.85, 60605.10, 60605.11, and 60811.3 of the Education Code, including those required by this section or Article 3.8(commencing with Section 52060) of Chapter 6.1 of Part 28 of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Education Code.
- (h) Funding apportioned pursuant to this section is subject to the annual audits required by Section 41020 of the Education Code.
- (i) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, of the funds appropriated by this section:
- (1) One billion dollars (\$1,000,000,000) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision(c) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2012–13 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2012–13 fiscal year. (2) Two hundred fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2013–14 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2013–14 fiscal year.
