This agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into by and between Interstate-Rim Management Company, LLC as agent for 9901 La Cienega (Los Angeles) Esong, LLC dba Holiday Inn Los Angeles International Airport (hereinafter referred to as "Hotel") and National Honors Society Lincoln High School in Lincoln California (hereinafter referred to as "Group"). 2.2 <u>Taxes</u>. The above rates do not include any applicable state or municipal taxes, fees or assessments. Group shall be responsible for any applicable taxes, fees or assessments, the amounts of which are subject to change by applicable government agencies with or without notice. If Group is claiming tax-exempt status, then (1) Group must present all documentation required by Hotel and pay in the manner specified by Hotel and (2) Group hereby accepts all liability and agrees to indemnify Hotel for all taxes paid and all costs incurred, including attorney fees, if a taxing authority requires that Hotel remit tax for the room nights covered by this Agreement.

ARTICLE IV: BILLING/CREDIT PROCEDURES

If payment is not received within thirty (30) days, a finance charge equal to the lesser of one and one half percent (1-1/2%) per month (18% Annual Rate) and the maximum allowed by law will be added to the unpaid balance commencing on the invoice date. Any payment by Group or acceptance by Hotel of an amount less than any amount due by Group shall be deemed solely as a partial payment of the full amount due. No endorsement or statement on any check or any letter accompanying any payment shall be deemed an accord and satisfaction, and Hotel may accept such check or payment without prejudice to Hotel's right to recover the balance of all amounts due or pursue any other remedies available to Hotel under this Agreement or in law or in equity.

ARTICLE V: CANCELLATION

5.1 <u>Cancellation by Group</u>. The following table contains an estimate (which the parties acknowledge and agree is reasonable) of the revenue to be generated from this Event. The table itself is not intended to warrant that the Event will generate these amounts of revenue. Neither is the table intended to prevent Hotel from generating more than these amounts of revenue from the Event.

Group acknowledges that if it cancels or otherwise substantially abandons the Event (a "Cancellation"), Hotel will be harmed. Group further acknowledges that the Group notifies Hotel of a Cancellation, the more harm Hotel will likely incur, because Hotel will have less time to mitigate its damages by marketing the sleeping room nights and function rooms to other customers and individual guests. Group also acknowledges that the actual amount of Hotel's damages from any Cancellation would be difficult to calculate. Therefore, the parties agree that if a Cancellation should occur for any reason (including Group's relocation of the Event to another hotel or resort), then Group shall pay Hotel, as liquidated damages and not as a penalty, the applicable amount identified below, plus any applicable taxes (a "Cancellation Fee").

Group must provide Hotel any notice of a Cancellation in writing. If Group does not provide written notice of any Cancellation, then Hotel may assess any higher Cancellation Fee owed under the above schedule at the time it receives written confirmation of the Cancellation or the highest amount identified above if it receives no written confirmation. The parties agree that the amounts in the above schedule are based on reasonable estimates of Hotel's harm from Cancellation. Any Cancellation Fee will be added to the Master Account. Any Cancellation Fee shall be due and payable immediately upon Cancellation.

5.2 Force Majeure. Either party may cancel the Event without liability to the other party upon the occurrence of any event or circumstance beyond the control of such party, including acts of God, declared war in the United States, acts of terrorism in the city where the Hotel premises is located, government regulations, disaster, strikes or civil disorder, to the extent that such event or circumstance makes it illegal or impossible for Hotel to provide, or for groups in general to use, the premises of Hotel. The Event cannot be cancelled under this section because of general economic conditions, including (without limitation) any recession or governmental budget cut. Either party that wishes to cancel the Event pursuant to this section must provide written notice to the other party identifying the event or circumstance that is the basis for such cancellation as soon as practicable after learning about such event or circumstance. If the Event is duly cancelled under this Section, then Hotel shall, within thirty (30) days after such cancellation, refund any deposits made by Group.

ARTICLE VI: PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

6.1 <u>Sleeping Room Performance</u>. Group acknowledges that if it holds the Event, but Group and/or guests attending the Event do not purchase the full amount of the Room Block, then Hotel will be harmed. Group also acknowledges that the actual amount of Hotel's damages from sale of less than the full amount of the Room Block would be difficult to calculate. Therefore, the parties agree that if the Event is held, but less than **Eighty-five percent (85%)** of the Total Guestroom Revenue identified in the table above is generated, then Group shall pay Hotel, as liquidated damages and not as a penalty, an amount equal to the difference between the immediately aforementioned percentage of the Total Guestroom Revenue and the actual guestroom revenue generated during the Event, plus any applicable taxes (the "Sleeping Room Performance Fee"). Any Sleeping Room Performance Fee will be added to the Master Account.

ARTICLE VII: MISCELLANEOUS

7.1 <u>Signs and Displays / Use of Hotel's Name</u>. Group shall not display signs in Hotel or use the name or logo of the Hotel or any franchisor of Hotel in any promotional materials without prior written approval of the General Manager of the Hotel. Group further agrees that no sign, banner or display shall be affixed to any part of the Hotel without the prior written consent of Hotel. Group will be responsible for the cost of repairing any damages caused to the walls, fixtures or carpet caused by any such sign, banner or display.

7.2 Security. Hotel may, in its sole and absolute discretion, require additional security procedures, at Group's sole expense, because of the size or nature of the Event or any Function. These procedures may include the assignment by Hotel of additional security personnel employed by Hotel or Hotel's independent contractor (which may be the local police department). Hotel may allow Group to retain an outside security service provider that is approved in writing by Hotel prior to the Event or the applicable Function. If Group hires an outside security service provider, Group must provide Hotel with a copy of its agreement with the service provider, which shall indemnify Hotel, its owner, its management company and their respective parents, subsidiaries and affiliates, and all of their respective owners, members, partners, directors, officers, employees, representatives and agents, from and against any liabilities related to the security services. Under no circumstances shall any armed security personnel be permitted onto the premises of Hotel without Hotel's advanced written approval, which Hotel may withhold in its sole and absolute discretion.

7.3 <u>Shipping and Packages</u>. If Group will be shipping packages to Hotel, Group must notify Hotel at least one week in advance. Each package sent to Hotel must include the name of Group, the Arrival Date and the number of items contained in the package. Each package should arrive no earlier than three (3) days before the Arrival Date. Hotel reserves the right to add storage fees to the Master Account for any packages that arrive earlier. Hotel shall have no liability for the delivery, security or condition of the packages.

7.4 <u>Notices</u>. All notices, offers, acceptances, requests and other communications hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed sufficient if hand delivered (against receipt) or sent by a commercially recognized express delivery service (e.g. FedEx or UPS), or certified or registered U.S. Mail, postage prepaid, to the Group Contact, at the address for the Group Contact, both identified on the first page of this Agreement; or, if to Hotel, to the street address of the Hotel premises to the attention of its General Manager, with a copy to Interstate Hotels & Resorts, Inc., 4501 N. Fairfax Drive, Suite 500, Årlington, VA 22203, Attn: General Counsel. Hotel may change Hotel's designated contact at any time upon notice. Hotel will not be bound by any notice unless delivered to Hotel in the manner specified herein.

7.5 Damage to Hotel Premises. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Group assumes full responsibility for any damage done to the Hotel during your Event or any setup for the Event or disassembly after the Event, to the extent that such damage is caused by Group, its employees, guests, agents, or contractors (other than Hotel and its subcontractors), including any damage resulting from the installation, placement, and removal of Group's displays, equipment, exhibits, or other items.

7.6 Indemnification. Group shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Hotel, its owner, its management company, their respective affiliates and all of their respective officers, directors, partners, members and employees from and against all demands, suits, judgments, settlements, claims, damages to persons and/or property, fines, liens, losses and other liabilities, including reasonable attorneys' fees (collectively "Claims") arising out of related the negligence or intentional misconduct of Group, its contractors or exhibitors, or their respective employees, agents, contractors or attendees. Group does not waive, by reason of this section, any defense that it may have with respect to such Claims.

7.7 <u>Disturbances</u>. Group agrees that its use of assigned Function spaces will not create any unreasonable disturbance to other guests or meetings, such as excessive noise, smoke, fog or offensive smells. Neither Group nor its contractors will use such features without advance approval of Hotel.

7.8 Additional Remedies. If this Agreement is one of a group of (any two or more) agreements between Hotel and Group and/or any of Group's affiliates for Hotel to host events, then Hotel reserves the right to terminate this Agreement and/or other agreement(s), without liability to Hotel, if (a) Group (or, if applicable, its affiliate) fails to timely pay any amounts due and owning under, or commits any other material breach of its obligations under, this Agreement or any of the other agreements; or (b) Group, its affiliate or any of their respective employees, agents or contractors causes damage or disruption to the Hotel's premises, operations, guests or reputation. Notice of any such termination by the Hotel shall be made to Group in writing. If Hotel cancels the Event pursuant to this section, Group shall be responsible for the applicable Cancellation Fee as if Group cancelled the Event. If, pursuant to this section, Hotel cancels any other event(s) it had booked for Group or one or more affiliates of Group, then Group shall be responsible for any applicable cancellation fee(s) provided for under the applicable agreement(s).

7.9 Group's Property. Group agrees Hotel will not be responsible for the safe-keeping of equipment, supplies, written material or other valuable items left in meeting rooms, sleeping rooms or anywhere on Hotel's premises. Group is responsible for

securing any such aforementioned items and hereby assumes responsibility for loss thereof. Group may not rely on any verbal or written assurances provided by Hotel staff, other than as provided in this Agreement. Property of Group is the sole responsibility of Group and/or its owner. Group warrants that it has procured sufficient insurance to cover the loss of such property and waives any claims under Hotel's insurance policy for the loss of Group's property or the property of any of its attendees or invitees.

7.10 <u>Choice of Law</u>. This Agreement will be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the state in which Hotel premises is located, without giving effect to any conflict-of-law principles thereof that would result in application the laws of any other state.

7.11 Dispute Resolution.

a. The parties shall exercise commercially reasonable efforts to informally and timely resolve any dispute arising under or related to this Agreement before commencing litigation, unless the litigation seeks emergency injunctive relief.

b. Any action between the parties arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be filed solely in the United States District Court for the district in which the premises of Hotel is located or, if subject matter jurisdiction in that court is lacking, in a state court in whose jurisdiction Hotel is located. Each of the parties hereby consents to the personal jurisdiction of these courts and venue of any such action in these courts, and hereby waives any objection based on the doctrine of *forum non conveniens* to any such action being adjudicated by any such court.

c. If any action by either party against the other to enforce its rights under this Agreement, including (without limitation) any litigation and/or other efforts to collect any payments due under this Agreement, the non-prevailing party shall be responsible for the prevailing party's costs related to such action, including (without limitation) reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses, collection costs and pre- and post-judgment interest.

d. THE PARTIES HEREBY KNOWINGLY, VOLUNTARILY, INTENTIONALLY AND MUTUALLY WAIVE ANY RIGHT TO A TRIAL BY JURY IN ANY CIVIL ACTION BASED ON, ARISING FROM OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT, THE EVENT, OR ANY COURSE OF CONDUCT, COURSE OF DEALING, STATEMENTS (VERBAL OR WRITTEN) OR ACTIONS BY THE PARTIES.

7.12 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the Event and supersedes any previous agreements, communications, representations or agreements, whether written or oral. Any modifications, additions or corrective lining out made on this Agreement will not be binding unless such modifications have been signed or initialed by both parties. Any amendments to this Agreement must be made in writing and signed by authorized representative of each party. For the avoidance of doubt, this section shall not prevent Group from ordering particular or additional services from Hotel through a banquet event order or other document signed by an Authorized Representative.

7.13 <u>No Assignment</u>. Neither party may assign or transfer this Agreement or any of its rights (other than rights to receive payments) or obligations hereunder without the written consent of other party, unless the assignment is to an affiliate of the assigning party pursuant to an internal reorganization or acquisition of the assigning party, or the assignment is made to an entity that acquires all or substantially all of the assigning party's assets. Any attempted assignment or transfer by Group without such consent may, at the option of Hotel, be deemed to be a Cancellation, in which case Group shall be liable for a Cancellation Fee set forth herein.

7.14 <u>Miscellaneous</u>. Each person signing this Agreement warrants that he or she is authorized to bind the party for which he or she is signing. Any provision of this Agreement that is deemed unenforceable shall be ineffective to the extent of such unenforceability without invalidating or rendering the remainder of this Agreement invalid. Each party shall execute such other and further documents as may be necessary to carry out the intention as well as to comply with the provisions of this Agreement. The failure of either party to insist, at any time, on strict performance of any terms or conditions of this Agreement, or to exercise any option, right or remedy contained in this Agreement, shall not be construed as a waiver or as a relinquishment for the future of such term, condition, option, right or remedy. No waiver by either party of any term or condition hereof shall be deemed to have been made unless expressed in writing and signed by such party.

ARTICLE VIII: EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT

8.1 Hotel's transmission of an unsigned copy of this Agreement to the Group or its Agent shall be deemed an invitation for Group to make an offer. The Group or Agent's return of its signature on a copy of this Agreement shall be deemed an offer by the Group. Group shall return signed Agreement and required deposit to the Hotel by 1/16/18. Hotel's subsequent signature of the Agreement shall be deemed an acceptance of the Group's offer by Hotel.

8.2 This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, which together shall constitute one and the same Agreement. Signatures sent by facsimile or equivalent means shall be deemed original, valid and binding signatures to this Agreement.

8.3 Any handwritten changes to this document will not be binding unless initialed by authorized representatives of both parties.

8.4 Each individual signing this document represents and warrants that he or she has authority to bind the party for which he or she signs.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Between the WESTERN PLACER UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT And the WESTERN PLACER TEACHER'S ASSOCIATION January 26, 2018

WHEREAS, The Western Placer Unified School District ("District") and the Western Placer Teacher's Association ("WPTA") mutually desire to honor the existing tenants of Article X in the staffing process for the 2017-2018 school year and both Parties also desire to complete the staffing process in an expeditious manner in order to afford the District the best and earliest opportunity to search for and hire new teachers;

NOW, THEREFORE WPUSD AND WPTA AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. On March 16, 19, and 20, 2018, site reassignments will take place which may include up to two rounds per day of site postings. On or before April 6, 2018, the District will send out a list of the known current vacancies which will be available during Reassignment/Transfer Round 1 at the Assignment Fair (April 10, 2018). On April 10, 2018, the District and WPTA will host an Assignment Fair at which WPTA unit members will be able to submit their interest for reassignments and transfers to any vacant or previously not posted/routed positions in lieu of the traditional site and district posting/routing procedures that have been used in the past and as are spelled out in the CBA. Attendance at the April 10, 2018 Assignment Fair is completely voluntary and employees attending the Assignment Fair will not be compensated for attendance to the extent the event goes beyond the contracted work day.
 - a. At the Assignment Fair on April 10, 2018, both the District and WPTA will have a designated representative on hand to ensure that the spirit of this MOU is being complied with and who can make determinations for each respective party as to any questions or procedural issues that may arise. In the event the WPUSD and WPTA representatives cannot come to agreement on any issue presenting itself during the Assignment Fair, the Assignment Fair will cease and the CBA, Board Policy, and Law will provide the method for proceeding for all remaining reassignments and transfers required.
 - b. At the Assignment Fair on April 10, 2018, each of the rounds will be Reassignment/Transfer Round(s). Employees looking for a change in assignment either at their current site or at a different site should be prepared to interview on the spot with site principals and/or other available staff where appropriate. Unit members should also bring with them any documents that verify credentials if they intend to put in for any position outside of the credential they are currently teaching under.

- c. In the event a unit member who wishes to put in for a reassignment or transfer is unable to attend on April 10, 2018, the unit member may designate another WPTA unit member to act as a proxy, and said proxy may put in for reassignments and transfer opportunities on behalf of the unit member who has given them the appropriate authority. In order to designate a proxy both the unit member seeking to change assignment and the unit member acting as a proxy must sign the Assignment Proxy Form attached as Exhibit A. Decisions made by the proxy designee regarding assignment are binding in the same manner as if they were made by the unit member seeking a change in assignment.
- d. Due to the unique circumstances regarding the assignment process for the 2017-2018 school year both WPTA and WPUSD agree that the assignment, reassignment and transfer process taking place at the Assignment Fair on April 10, 2018 shall not be subject to the grievance procedures established in the CBA between WPTA and WPUSD.
- 2. This agreement establishes no past practice or precedent between the parties and shall not alter the terms of the current Collective Bargaining Agreement except as expressly stated above.
- 3. In the event any term of this MOU shall, to any extent, be found to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this MOU shall remain valid and enforceable.
- 4. This MOU shall be governed by and controlled in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- The MOU shall become effective upon approval by Western Placer Teachers Association and Western Placer Unified School District as evidenced by the signature of the WPTA and WPUSD designees below.

Due to projected growth and lack of available classroom space at Lincoln High School, it will be necessary for the District to add five (5) additional portable classrooms and associated site work at the site.



RESOLUTION CALLING FOR FULL AND FAIR FUNDING OF CALIFORNIA'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS

WHEREAS, California has the sixth largest economy in the world, and the largest Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of any state in the nation; and

WHEREAS, despite California's leadership in the global economy, the state falls in the nation's bottom quintile on nearly every measure of public K-12 school funding and school staffing; and

WHEREAS, California ranks 45th nationally in the percentage of taxable income spent on education, 41st in per-pupil funding, 45th in pupil-teacher ratios and 48th in pupil-staff ratios; and

WHEREAS, K-12 school funding has not substantially increased, on an inflation-adjusted basis, for more than a decade; and

WHEREAS, under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), state funding for K-12 schools has only this year recently returned to levels predating the Great Recession of 2007; and

WHEREAS, the modest revenue increases since the implementation of LCFF have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs for health care, pensions, transportation and utilities; and

WHEREAS, 58 percent of California's public school students are eligible for free and reduced-price lunch — 13 percent above the national average — and 23 percent of California students are English learners, more than twice the national average; and

WHEREAS, California's investment in public schools is out of alignment with its wealth, its ambitions, its demographics and the demands of a 21st-century education; and

WHEREAS, in 2007, a bipartisan group of California leaders commissioned a report titled *Getting Down* to *Facts*, which stated it would take an additional \$17 billion annually to meet the State Board of Education achievement targets for K-12 schools; and

WHEREAS, in 2016, a California School Boards Association (CSBA) report, *California's Challenge: Adequately Funding Education in the 21st Century*, updated the *Getting Down to Facts* data and determined that, adjusting for inflation, an additional \$22 billion to \$40 billion annually would be required to provide all public school students with access to a high-quality education; and

WHEREAS, California funds schools at roughly \$1,961 per student less than the national average, which translates to approximately \$3,462 per student when adjusted for California being a high-cost state; and

WHEREAS, California trails the average of the top 10 states by almost \$7,000 in per-pupil funding; and

WHEREAS, in *Robles-Wong v. State of California*, a group of plaintiffs led by CSBA argued that California's school funding system violated Article IX of the State Constitution by denying all students access to an education that prepares them for economic security and full participation in our democratic institutions; and

WHEREAS, the California Supreme Court declined to hear the case by a 4-3 margin, prompting Justice Goodwin H. Liu to write: "It is regrettable that this court, having recognized education as a fundamental right in a landmark decision 45 years ago [Serrano v. Priest (1971) 5 Cal.3d 584], should now decline to address the substantive meaning of that right."; and

WHEREAS, in order to prepare our students for participation in a democratic society and an increasingly competitive, technology-driven global economy, California must fund schools at a level sufficient to support student success; and

WHEREAS, despite its vast wealth, California has consistently underfunded public education while widening its scope, adding new requirements and raising standards without providing appropriate resources to prepare all students for college, career and civic life; and

WHEREAS, if California is to close opportunity and achievement gaps and create a public school system that offers consistently high levels of education, the State must provide schools with the resources to meet the needs of their specific populations;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the governing board of the Western Placer Unified School District, County of Placer urges the State Legislature to fund California public schools at the national average or higher by the year 2020, and at a level that is equal to or above the average of the top 10 states nationally by 2025 and to maintain, at a minimum, this level of funding until otherwise decreed.

(BP revised)

Policy updated to include the local control and accountability plan (LCAP) as a comprehensive plan of the district and to emphasize the need for consistency among the documents that set direction for the district.

BP/AR 0460 - Local Control and Accountability Plan

(BP/AR revised)

Policy and regulation updated to delete references to 5 CCR 15497.5 (repealed) which formerly contained the LCAP template. The LCAP template continues to be approved by the State Board of Education and is available on the California Department of Education (CDE) web site. Policy also adds a definition of "numerically significant student subgroups" whose needs must be addressed in the LCAP. Regulation also deletes requirement to use the state's Academic Performance Index (API) as a measure of student achievement, as the API has been replaced by a new state accountability system.

BP 0500 - Accountability

(BP revised)

Policy updated to reflect the new state accountability system (the California School Dashboard), which consists of both state and local indicators to assist districts in identifying strengths and areas in need of improvement in each priority area addressed by the LCAP.

BP/AR 0520.2 - Title I Program Improvement Schools

(BP/AR deleted)

Policy and regulation deleted as federal program improvement requirements have been suspended for the 2017-18 school year and will, beginning in the 2018-19 school year, be replaced by a new system of comprehensive and targeted improvement established by the Every Student Succeeds Act.

BP 0520.3 - Title I Program Improvement Districts

(BP deleted)

Policy deleted as federal program improvement requirements have been suspended for the 2017-18 school year and will, beginning in the 2018-19 school year, be replaced by a new system of comprehensive and targeted improvement established by the Every Student Succeeds Act.

BP 3513.4 - Drug and Alcohol Free Schools

(BP added)

New policy prohibits the possession, use, or sale of drugs or alcohol by any person on district property and addresses enforcement and discipline for violations of this policy. Policy also reflects NEW LAW (Proposition 64, 2016) which prohibits any person from possessing, smoking, or ingesting cannabis on school grounds while children are present.

AR 5125.2 - Withholding Grades, Diploma or Transcripts

(AR revised)

Regulation updated to clarify the circumstances under which the district may withhold a student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts until the student's parents/guardians have paid for the damages to or loss of district property willfully caused by the student. Regulation also clarifies the student's due process rights, as well as the requirement to continue to withhold the grades, diploma, and/or transcripts when such a student transfers from one district to another.

BP 5131.6 - Alcohol and Other Drugs

(BP revised)

Policy updated to reflect the goals and purposes of the federal Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grants program, as established by the Every Student Succeeds Act. Policy also deletes material on drug and alcohol master plans and county primary prevention programs, since the related laws repealed on their own terms.

E 5131.63 - Steroids

(E deleted)

Exhibit deleted since the California Interscholastic Federation provides the sample agreement that student athletes and parents/guardians must sign to promise that the student will not use steroids or banned dietary supplements.

BP/AR 6020 - Parent Involvement

(BP/AR revised)

Policy and regulation updated to reflect requirements for parent involvement in schools receiving federal Title I, Part A funding, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act, including expanding activities to include engagement of family members. Policy also reflects parent involvement as a state priority that must be addressed in the district's LCAP.

BP 6153 - School-Sponsored Trips

(BP revised)

Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 341, 2017) which eliminates the prohibition against the use of district funds to pay for the expenses of students participating in field trips or excursions to another state, to the District of Columbia, or to a foreign country.

BP/AR 6173.2 - Education of Children of Military Families

(BP/AR revised)

Policy updated to reflect the Every Student Succeeds Act, which provides that military-connected students will be assigned a national identification number to facilitate monitoring of their academic progress and requires districts to issue an annual report card that includes state achievement results for such students. Policy also adds optional language on collaborating with the military's school liaison officers and providing staff development related to the educational rights of military-connected students. Regulation updated to add material regarding the transfer of course credits, exemption from local graduation requirements when a student transfers after the completion of the second year of high school, and use of the uniform complaint procedures for allegations of noncompliance by the district, pursuant to NEW LAW (AB 365, 2017). Regulation also reflects NEW LAW (SB 455, 2017) which provides that a student will be deemed to meet district residency requirements if his/her parent/guardian is transferred or is pending transfer to a military installation within the state, and NEW LAW (AB 2659, 2016) which provides that districts must not prohibit the transfer of a military-connected student out of the district regardless of whether the district has an interdistrict transfer agreement with another district.

A community-based, comprehensive, data-driven planning process shall be used to identify annual goals and specific actions aligned with state and local priorities and to facilitate continuous improvement of district practices.

The Superintendent or designee shall gather data and information needed for effective and meaningful plan development and present it to the Board and community. Such data and information shall include, but not be limited to, data regarding the numbers of students in various student subgroups, disaggregated data on student achievement levels, and information about current programs and expenditures.

The Board shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other school personnel, employee bargaining units, parents/guardians, and students in developing the LCAP. Consultation with students shall enable unduplicated students and other numerically significant student subgroups to review and comment on LCAP development and may include surveys of students, student forums, student advisory committees, and/or meetings with student government bodies or other groups representing students. (Education Code 52060; 5 CCR 15495)

The notification shall be provided using the most efficient method of notification possible, which may not necessarily include producing printed notices or sending notices by mail. All written notifications related to the LCAP shall be provided in the primary language of parents/guardians when required by Education Code 48985. (Education Code 52062)

(Education Code 42127, 52062)

The Board may adopt revisions to the LCAP at any time during the period in which the plan is in effect, provided the Board follows the process to adopt the LCAP pursuant to Education Code 52062 and the revisions are adopted in a public meeting. (Education Code 52062)

Submission of Plan to County Superintendent of Schools

Not later than five days after adoption of the LCAP, the Board shall file the LCAP or the annual update with the County Superintendent of Schools. (Education Code 52070)

If the County Superintendent sends, by August 15, a written request for clarification of the contents of the LCAP, the Board shall respond in writing within 15 days of the request. If the County Superintendent then submits recommendations for amendments to the LCAP within 15 days of receiving the Board's response, the Board shall consider those recommendations in a public meeting within 15 days of receiving the recommendations. (Education Code 52070)

Monitoring Progress

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at least annually in accordance with the timeline and indicators established by him/her and the Board, regarding the district's progress toward attaining each goal identified in the LCAP. Evaluation shall include, but not be limited to, an assessment of district and school performance **reported on California School Dashboard.** based on evaluation rubrics adopted by the State Board of Education pursuant to Education Code 52064.5. Evaluation data shall be used to recommend any necessary revisions to the LCAP.

Technical Assistance/Intervention

When it is in the best interest of the district, the Board may submit a request to the County Superintendent for technical assistance, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 52071)

- 1. Assistance in the identification of district strengths and weaknesses in regard to state priorities and review of effective, evidence-based programs that apply to the district's goals
- 2. Assistance from an academic expert, team of academic experts, or another district in the county in identifying and implementing effective programs to improve the outcomes for student subgroups
- 3. Advice and assistance from the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence established pursuant to Education Code 52074

In the event that the County Superintendent requires the district to receive technical assistance pursuant to Education Code 52071, the Board shall review all recommendations

received from the County Superintendent or other advisor and shall consider revisions to the LCAP as appropriate in accordance with the process specified in Education Code 52062.

If the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) identifies the district as needing intervention pursuant to Education Code 52072, the district shall cooperate with any action taken by the SPI or any academic advisor appointed by the SPI, which may include one or more of the following:

- 1. Revision of the district's LCAP
- 2. Revision of the district's budget in accordance with changes in the LCAP
- 3. A determination to stay or rescind any district action that would prevent the district from improving outcomes for all student subgroups, provided that action is not required by a collective bargaining agreement

Whenever a school is identified for Year 4 PI but is not identified as a "persistently lowest achieving school" pursuant to Education Code 53201, the parents/guardians of students attending that school may petition the Board to implement an intervention for the purpose of improving academic achievement or student safety, provided that the state limit on the number of such schools has not yet been reached. To be considered by the Board, the petition shall contain all required content and signatures and specify one of four intervention models (i.e., turnaround model, restart model, school closure, or transformation model) or an alternative governance arrangement, as described in 5 CCR 4803-4807. The district shall implement the option requested by the parents/guardians unless, at a regularly scheduled public hearing, the Board makes a finding in writing stating the reason it cannot implement the recommended option and instead designates one of the other options to be implemented. (Education Code 53300-53303; 5 CCR 4800-4808)

Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall develop an annual report card that includes the information specified in 20 USC 6311 for each district school and for the district as a whole. The required information may be incorporated into each school's school accountability report card. (20 USC 6311)

TITLE I PROGRAM IMPROVEMENT SCHOOLS

Year One Program Improvement

For any district school in its first year of program improvement (PI), the Superintendent or designee shall implement a school improvement plan that was approved by the Governing Board.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the school receives technical assistance from the district, California Department of Education (CDE), an institution of higher education, a private organization, an educational service agency, or another entity with experience in helping schools improve academic achievement, including assistance in:

- 1. Analyzing state assessment data and other examples of student work to identify and address problems in instruction and/or problems in implementing Title I requirements pertaining to parent involvement, professional development, or school and district responsibilities identified in the school's plan
- 2. Identifying and implementing professional development, instructional strategies and methods of instruction that are based on scientifically based research and that have proven effective in addressing the specific instructional issues that caused the school to be identified for school improvement
- 3. Analyzing and revising the school's budget so that the school's resources are more effectively allocated to the activities most likely to increase student achievement and to remove the school from program improvement status

Year 2 Program Improvement

For any district school in its second year of PI, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to implement the school improvement plan and to provide for technical assistance in accordance with the section "Year 1 Program Improvement" above

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall arrange for the provision of alternative supports to eligible students from low-income families, as described below in the section "Alternative Supports."

Year 3 Program Improvement: Corrective Action

After the second full school year after identification for PI, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to implement all elements of Year 1 and Year 2 PI, specified above, as well as the corrective actions(s) determined by the Board, which may include:

1. Replace school staff relevant to the failure

2. Implement a new curriculum and related professional development

- 4. Appoint an outside expert to advise the school
- 5. Extend the school year or school day for the school

Year 4 Program Improvement and Beyond: Restructuring

For any school in Year 4 of PI or beyond, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to implement all elements of Year 1 and Year 2 PI specified above, as well as one of the following options for alternative governance and restructuring, as determined by the Board:

- 1. Reopen the school as a charter school
- 2. Replace all or most of the school staff relevant to the failure
- 3. Enter into a contract with an entity with a demonstrated record of effectiveness to operate the school
- 4. Turn the operation of the school over to the California Department of Education
- 5. Institute any other major restructuring of the school's governance arrangements that makes fundamental reforms

TITLE I PROGRAM IMPROVEMENT SCHOOLS (continued)

Alternative Supports

In any school identified for Year 2 PI or beyond, eligible students from low-income families shall be offered district-selected alternative supports designed to improve their academic achievement. Alternative supports may include, but are not limited to, any of the following:

1. Academic support offered during school hours, before school, after school, during intercession, and/or during summer learning programs

(cf. 5148.2 - Before/After School Programs) (cf. 6176 - Weekend/Saturday Classes) (cf. 6177 - Summer Learning Programs) (cf. 6179 - Supplemental Instruction)

- 2. Small group instruction and/or pull-out interventions offered during the regular school day
- 3. Interventions offered during After School Education and Safety or 21st Century Community Learning Center programs
- 4. High quality academic tutoring
- 5. Provision of supplemental materials that support alternative support services
- 6. Provision of a crisis, intervention, and/or academic counselor to meet with eligible students
- 7. Services and programs that remove barriers to promote academic achievement of eligible students

The types of alternative supports and the criteria used to identify eligible students may be included in the district's local control and accountability plan and shall be consistent and aligned with local priorities.

If the district contracts with outside entities or community partners to provide alternative supports to eligible students, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that no electronic device or other items of value are given, retained, or used as an incentive or achievement award and that funds are expended only on direct services to eligible students.

The district shall set aside a reasonable amount of Title I, Part A funds for alternative supports. Whenever the district does not have sufficient funds to serve all eligible students, it may give priority to the lowest achieving PI schools or the lowest achieving eligible students attending a PI school. The Superintendent or designee may identify the lowest achieving eligible students based on assessment scores, grades, teacher evaluations, or another locally defined measure.

The Board of Trustees desires to continuously improve educational programs and district operations to enable all students to achieve proficiency. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure the implementation and coordination of all district improvement plans and shall annually report to the Board regarding the district's-performance in making progress toward student achievement standards.

1. Review the Title I local educational agency (LEA) plan and, as needed, revise the plan. Revisions may be made in an addendum to the existing plan. The revised LEA plan or plan addendum shall be approved by the Board and electronically submitted to the CDE.

2. Reserve and spend at least 10 percent of its Title I, Part A allocation to provide highquality professional development for instructional staff

In addition, during Year 3 of PI or beyond, the Board shall cooperate with the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the State Board of Education (SBE) in the identification and implementation of appropriate corrective actions. As applicable, the district shall implement the recommendations of the district assistance and intervention team (DAIT) that has been assigned to assist the district pursuant to Education Code 52055.57.

The Superintendent or designee shall submit to the CDE an annual report regarding the district's evidence of progress, including a summary description of the district's progress toward implementing the strategies in the LEA plan, an analysis of the district's progress

toward student achievement goals in the LEA plan based on state or local assessment data, and documentation that the Board has been notified of the report.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL FREE SCHOOLS

The Governing Board recognizes the need to keep district schools free of drugs and alcohol in order to create a safe and healthy environment conducive to learning and promote student health and well-being. The Board prohibits the possession, use, or sale of drugs and alcohol at any time in district-owned or leased buildings, on district property, and in district vehicles, unless otherwise permitted by law.

The following substances are prohibited on all district property:

- 1. Any substance which may not lawfully be possessed, used, or sold in California
- 2. Cannabis or cannabis products (Health and Safety Code 11362.3; 21 USC 812, 844)
- 3. Alcoholic beverages, unless approved by the Superintendent or designee for limited purposes specified in Business and Professions Code 25608

Prescription medication, except for prescribed cannabis, may be administered at school in accordance with law, district policy and regulations, and written statements by the parent/guardian and the student's authorized health care provider as applicable.

Information about the district's drug- and alcohol-free schools policy and the consequences for violations shall be communicated clearly to employees, parents/guardians, students, and the community.

Enforcement/Discipline

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate action to eliminate the possession, use, or sale of alcohol and other drugs and related paraphernalia in district facilities, on district property, in district vehicles, or at school-sponsored activities. As appropriate, he/she may direct anyone violating this policy to leave school property and/or refer the matter to law enforcement.

Students

WITHHOLDING GRADES, DIPLOMA OR TRANSCRIPTS

When school property has been willfully damaged or not returned upon demand, the principal or designee shall inform the parent/guardian in writing of the responsible student's alleged misconduct and the reparation that may be due.

This notice shall include a statement that the district may withhold grades, diploma or transcripts from the student and parent/guardian until reparation is made.

When a minor student willfully cuts, defaces, or otherwise injures real or personal property of the district or does not return district property that has been loaned to him/her upon demand of a district employee, the student's parents/guardians may be required to pay the costs of all damages within the limits established pursuant to Education Code 48904. Until the student's parents/guardians have paid for the damages, the Superintendent or designee may withhold the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts. (Education Code 48904)

Before withholding the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts, the Superintendent or designee shall inform the student's parents/guardians in writing of the student's alleged misconduct. (Education Code 48904)

If reparation is not made, the district The student shall be afforded the student his/her due process consistent with established for the rights in conformance with Education Code expulsion of students. procedures and may withhold the student's grades, diploma or transcripts.

If the student and parent/guardian are unable to pay for the damages or return the property, the principal-Superintendent or designee shall provide a program of voluntary work for the student to do in lieu of monetary damages. When this-Upon completion of voluntary work, is completed, the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts shall be released. (Education Code 48904)

When a student from whom the district is withholding grades, diploma or transcripts transfers to another district, this information shall be sent to the new district with the student's records and a request that these items continue to be withheld until the new district receives notification that the debt has been cleared.

WITHHOLDING GRADES, DIPLOMA OR TRANSCRIPTS (continued)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian in writing that this district's decision to withhold grades, diploma or transcript will be enforced by the new district. (Education Code 48904.3)

When a student who is transferring into the district has had his/her grades, diploma, and/or transcripts withheld by the previous district, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to withhold the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts until notified by the previous district that the decision to withhold has been rescinded. (Education Code 48904.3)

Upon receiving notice that a student whose grades, diploma, and/or transcripts have been withheld by this district has transferred to another district in California, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the student's records to the new district and notify the new district that the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts are being withheld from the student and parents/guardians pursuant to Education Code 48904.

The district shall withhold grades, diploma or transcripts from any student transferring into the district whose misconduct caused a previous district to withhold them. When informed by the previous district that its decision has been rescinded, the district shall release these documents. (Education Code 48904.3)

Students

ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS

The Board of Trustees believes that the use of alcohol or other drugs adversely affects a student's ability to achieve academic success, is physically and emotionally harmful, and has serious social and legal consequences. The Board desires to keep district schools free of alcohol and other drugs in order to help prevent violence, promote school safety and create a well-disciplined environment conducive to learning. The Superintendent or designee shall develop comprehensive programs and activities to foster safe, healthy, and drug-free environments that support academic achievement.

(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan) (cf. 4020 - Drug and Alcohol-Free Workplace) (cf. 5137 – Positive School Climate)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop, implement and evaluate a comprehensive prevention and intervention program that is coordinated with other school and community based services and programs. The district's program shall be scientifically based and designed to prevent or reduce alcohol or other drug use and the possession and distribution of illegal drugs. It shall include primary prevention activities such as decision-making skills and conflict management, instruction, referral to a rehabilitation program, enforcement/discipline, activities that promote the involvement of parents/guardians and coordination with appropriate community agencies and organizations.

The district's alcohol and drug prevention and intervention programs shall be coordinated with other school and community-based services and programs and shall promote the involvement of parents/guardians. The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with the county office of education, community-based organizations, health providers, law enforcement agencies, local child welfare agencies, postsecondary institutions, businesses, and other public and private entities in program planning, implementation, and evaluation.

The Board and Superintendent shall agree upon performance measures that will be used to monitor and determine the effectiveness of the district's program in reducing drug and alcohol use. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement an evaluation process that includes ongoing assessment and analysis of objective data regarding the incidence of drug and alcohol use among district students, including discipline problems, and the prevalence of risk factors.

Prevention and intervention programs and activities may include, but are not limited to: (20 USC 7118)

1. Evidence-based drug and violence prevention activities and programs that educate students against the use of alcohol, tobacco, cannabis, smokeless tobacco products, and electronic cigarettes

(cf. 5131.62 - Tobacco)

2. Professional development and training for school staff, specialized instructional support personnel, and interested community members on drug prevention, education, early identification, intervention mentoring, recovery support services, and, where appropriate, rehabilitation referral

(cf. 4131 - Staff Development) (cf. 4231 - Staff Development) (cf. 4331 - Staff Development)

3. School-based mental health services, including early identification of drug use and referrals to counseling services, and/or partnerships with public or private health care entities that have qualified mental and behavioral health professionals

(cf. 5141.6 - School Health Services)

4. Programs and activities that provide mentoring and school counseling to all students, including students who are at risk of drug use and abuse

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with principals, teachers, other school personnel, students and parents/guardians when developing the district's program.

The Superintendent or designee shall clearly communicate to all students, staff and parents/guardians the district's policies, regulations and school rules related to the use of alcohol and other drugs on school campuses or at school activities. Information about program needs and goals shall be widely distributed in the community.

Staff should encourage students to participate as responsible partners in efforts to maintain a safe, constructive school climate.

Instruction

The district shall provide science-based preventative instruction which has been proven effective in helping students avoid the use of alcohol and other drugs.

(cf. 6142.1 - Sexual Health and HIV/AIDS Prevention Instruction) (cf. 6142.8 - Comprehensive Health Education) (cf. 6143 - Courses of Study)

All instruction and related materials shall consistently state that unlawful use of alcohol or other drugs is **prohibited**. wrong and harmful. Instruction shall not include **any message on** the concept of responsible use of drugs or alcohol when such use is illegal. (20 USC 7114, 7162; Health and Safety Code 11999.2)

The district shall offer staff development activities for staff who implement the comprehensive drug and alcohol prevention and intervention program.

Intervention, Referral and Student Assistance Programs

The Superintendent or designee shall inform Sschool staff, students, and parents/guardians shall be informed about early warning signs which may indicate alcohol and other drug use and about appropriate agencies offering intervention programs, counseling, referral and other student assistance programs.

The Board strongly encourages any student who is using alcohol or drugs to discuss the matter with his/her parent/guardian or with any staff member. Students who disclose their use of alcohol or other drugs when seeking help from an intervention or recovery program shall not be disciplined for such use.

Enforcement/Discipline

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate action to eliminate possession, use or sale of alcohol and other drugs and related paraphernalia on school grounds or at school-sponsored activities.

Students shall not possess, use, or sell alcohol or other drugs and related paraphernalia on school grounds or at school-sponsored activities.

Students possessing, using or selling alcohol or other drugs or related paraphernalia shall be subject to disciplinary procedures including suspension or expulsion and/or referral to law enforcement in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation. In addition, such students may be referred to an appropriate counseling program, transferred to an alternative placement, and/or be restricted from extracurricular activities, including athletics.

The Superintendent or designee shall clearly communicate to all students, staff, and parents/guardians the district's policies, regulations, and school rules related to the use of alcohol and other drugs.

Any student found by the Board to be selling a controlled substance listed in Health and Safety Code 11053-11058 shall be expelled in accordance with BP/AR 5144.1 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process. A student found to have committed another drug or alcohol offense, including possession or intoxication, shall be referred to appropriate behavioral interventions or student assistance programs, and may be subject to discipline on a caseby-case basis.

Program Evaluation

The Board and Superintendent shall agree upon performance measures that will be used to monitor and determine the effectiveness of district programs in reducing drug and alcohol use. The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board on the effectiveness of district activities in achieving identified objectives and outcomes. (20 USC 7116)

This compact shall address:

a. The school's responsibility to provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables participating students to achieve the state's student academic achievement standards

- a. Ensure that teachers provide frequent reports to parents/guardians on their children's progress and hold parent-teacher conferences at least once per year with parents/guardians of elementary school students
- b. Provide opportunities for parents/guardians to observe classroom activities and to volunteer in their child's classroom
- c. Provide information about parent involvement opportunities through district, school, and/or class newsletters, the district's web site, and other written or electronic communications
- d. To the extent practicable, provide notices and information to parents/guardians in a format and language they can understand
- e. Develop mechanisms to encourage parent/guardian input on district and school issues
- f. Identify barriers to parent/guardian participation in school activities, including parents/guardians who are economically disadvantaged, are disabled, have limited English proficiency, have limited literacy, or are of any racial or ethnic minority background
- g. Encourage greater parent/guardian participation by adjusting meeting schedules to accommodate parent/guardian needs and, to the extent practicable, by providing translation or interpreter services, transportation, and/or child care
- 4. Train teachers and administrators to communicate effectively with parents/guardians (Education Code 11502, 11504)

The Superintendent or designee may:

a. Provide staff development to assist staff in strengthening two-way communications with parents/guardians, including parents/guardians who have limited English proficiency or limited literacy

- b. Invite input from parents/guardians regarding the content of staff development activities pertaining to home-school communications
- 5. Integrate parent involvement programs into school plans for academic accountability

The Superintendent or designee may:

- a. Include parent involvement strategies in school reform or school improvement initiatives
- b. Involve parents/guardians in school planning processes

SCHOOL-SPONSORED TRIPS

The Board of Trustees recognizes that school-sponsored field trips are an important component of a student's development and supplement and enrich the classroom learning experience, lead to increased student achievement, and foster student engagement. The Board encourages field trips to reinforce and increase learning opportunities and to enhance district programs. School-sponsored trips may be conducted in connection with the district's course of study or school-related social, educational, cultural, athletic, school band activities, or other extracurricular or cocurricular activities. A field trip to a foreign country may be permitted to familiarize students with the language, history, geography, natural science, and other studies relative to the district's course of study.

Field trips shall be conducted in connection with the district's course of study or schoolrelated social, educational, cultural, athletic, school band, or other extracurricular or cocurricular activities. A field trip to a foreign country may be permitted to familiarize students with the language, history, geography, natural science, and other studies relative to the district's course of study. (Education Code 35330)

Requests for school-sponsored field trips involving out-of-state, out-of-country, or overnight travel shall be submitted to the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee shall review the request and make a recommendation to the Board as to whether the request should be approved by the Board. All other school-sponsored field trips shall be approved in advance by the principal.

The principal shall establish a process for approving a staff member's request to conduct a school-sponsored field trip. When planning trips, staff shall consider student safety, objectives of instruction, the most effective use of instructional time, the distance from school, district and student expense, and transportation and supervision requirements. Principals may exclude from the trip any student whose presence on the trip would pose a safety or disciplinary risk.

The Board may approve the use of district funds for student expenses for in-state, out-of-state, or out-of-country field trips or excursions when permitted by law. In addition, expenses of instructors, chaperones, and other personnel participating in such trips, as well as incidental expenses for the use of district equipment during the trip, may be paid from district funds. EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF MILITARY FAMILIES

The Governing Board recognizes the challenges to the academic success of that children of military families face challenges to their academic success caused by the frequent moves or deployments of their parents/guardians in fulfillment of military service. In accordance with law, tThe district shall provide such students with academic resources, services, and opportunities for extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all district students.

In making decisions about children of military families, including decisions regarding their enrollment, placement, eligibility for extracurricular activities, or waiver of any graduation requirement, the Superintendent or designee shall be flexible to the extent permitted by law and district policy.

The Superintendent or designee may waive district policies or rules when necessary to facilitate the enrollment, placement, advancement, eligibility for extracurricular activities, or on-time graduation of children of military families, in accordance with the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children as ratified in Education Code 49700-49704.

The Superintendent or designee shall work with parents/guardians and shall collaborate with local, state, and other agencies within and outside the state to facilitate the transition of children of military families into and out of the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide information and/or training to administrators, other appropriate district staff, and military families regarding the provisions of the Interstate Compact and the educational rights of children of military families.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with parents/guardians, school liaison officers from military installations, and/or other agencies within and outside the state to facilitate the transition of children of military families into and out of the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board and the public on the educational outcomes of children of military families. Such reports may include, but are not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade levels, and graduation rates.

Instruction

EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF MILITARY FAMILIES

Children of military families are school-aged children in the household of: (Education Code 49701)

- 1. Members who are in full-time duty status in the active uniformed service of the United States, including any member of the National Guard and Reserve on active duty order pursuant to 10 USC 1209 or 1211
- 2. Members or veterans of the uniformed services who are severely injured and medically discharged or retired, for one year after their medical discharge or retirement
- 3. Members of the uniformed services who have died while on active duty or as a result of injuries sustained on active duty, for one year after their death

Enrollment

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate the enrollment of children of military families and ensure that they are not placed at a disadvantage due to difficulty in the transfer of their records from previous school districts and/or variations in entrance or age requirements. (Education Code 49701)

A child of a military family shall be deemed to meet district residency requirements if his/her parent/guardian, while on active military duty pursuant to an official military order, is transferred or is pending transfer to a military installation within the state. The Superintendent or designee shall accept electronic submission of such a student's application for enrollment, including enrollment in a specific school or program within the district, and for course registration. (Education Code 48204.3)

When a child of a military family is transferring into the district, the Superintendent or designee may enroll the child based on the child's placement in the previous district, pending receipt of the child's records. Upon enrollment, the Superintendent or designee shall immediately request the student's records from the student's previous district. The Superintendent or designee shall allow the student 30 days from the date of enrollment to obtain all required immunizations. (Education Code 49701)

A child of an active military duty parent/guardian shall not be prohibited from transferring out of the district, if the school district of proposed enrollment approves the application for transfer. (Education Code 46600, 48307)

When a child of a military family is transferring out of the district, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the student's parents/guardians with a complete set of the student's records or, if the official student record cannot be released, an unofficial or "hand-carried" record. Upon request from the new district, the Superintendent or designee shall provide a copy of the student's record to the new district within 10 days. (Education Code 49701)

Placement and Attendance

Whenever a student's parent/guardian is serving on active duty or has been discharged from military service within the last year and the student transfers to a new school as the direct result of the military transfer or discharge, the Superintendent or designee may, prior to the receipt of official transcript(s) or the arrival of the student, review the student's coursework to date, including any unofficial transcript(s), to determine the appropriate placement of the student in classes. The evaluation shall also include communication with school counselors and teachers at the former school by videoconferencing, email, and/or telephone calls. (Education Code 51251)

The Superintendent or designee shall initially honor the placement of any child of a military family in educational courses and programs based on the child's enrollment and/or assessment in his/her previous school. The Superintendent or designee may, to the extent permitted by Board policy, waive course or program prerequisites, preconditions, and/or application deadlines when making decisions regarding placement of children of military families and their eligibility for extracurricular academic, athletic, and social activities. (Education Code 49701)

When a child of a military family transferring into the district has been identified as an individual with a disability pursuant to 20 USC 1400-1482, the Superintendent or designee shall provide comparable services to the student based on his/her current individualized education program. In addition, when the child of a military family transferring into the district is eligible for services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act, the Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable accommodations and modifications to address the needs of the student subject to the student's existing Section 504 plan. The district may authorize subsequent evaluations of the student to ensure appropriate placement. (Education Code 49701)

Transfer of Coursework and Credits

When a child of a military family transfers into a district school, the district shall accept and issue full credit for any coursework that the student has satisfactorily completed while attending another public school, a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency, or a juvenile court school and shall not require the student to retake the course. (Education Code 51225.2)

(cf. 6146.3 - Reciprocity of Academic Credit) (cf. 6159.2 - Nonpublic, Nonsectarian School or Agency Services for Special Education)

If the student did not complete the entire course, he/she shall be issued partial credit for the coursework completed and shall be required to take only the portion of the course that he/she did not complete at his/her previous school. However, the district may require the student to retake the portion of the course completed if, in consultation with the student's parent/guardian, the district finds that the student is reasonably able to complete the requirements in time to graduate from high school. Whenever partial credit is issued, the student shall be enrolled in the same or equivalent course, if applicable, so that he/she may continue and complete the entire course. (Education Code 51225.2)

Partial credits shall be awarded on the basis of 0.5 credits for every seven class periods attended per subject. If the school is on a block schedule, each block schedule class period attended shall be equal to two regular class periods per subject.

In no event shall the district prevent a child of a military family from taking or retaking a course to meet the eligibility requirements for admission to the California State University or the University of California. (Education Code 51225.2)

Absences

When a student's parent/guardian is an active duty member and is called to duty, is on leave from, or is immediately returned from deployment to a combat zone or to combat support posting, the Superintendent or designee may grant additional excused absences to the student to visit with his/her parent/guardian. (Education Code 49701)

Graduation Requirements

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate the on-time graduation of children of military families by providing supplemental instruction to incoming students as necessary to enable them to meet the district's graduation requirements. (Education Code 49701)

The Superintendent or designee may also waive specific district course requirements for graduation if similar coursework has been satisfactorily completed by the student in his/her previous school. (Education Code 49701)

To obtain a high school diploma, a child of a military family shall complete all courses required by Education Code 51225.3 and fulfill any additional graduation requirements prescribed by the Governing Board.

(cf. 6146.1 - High School Graduation Requirements) (cf. 6162.52 - High School Exit Examination) (cf. 6179 - Supplemental Instruction)

However, when a child of a military family who has completed his/her second year of high school transfers into the district from another school district or transfers between high schools within the district, he/she shall be exempted from all district-adopted coursework and other district-established graduation requirements, unless the district makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the additional requirements in time to graduate from high school by the end of his/her fourth year of high school. Within 30 calendar days of the student's transfer, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the student and his/her parent/guardian of the availability of the exemption and whether the student qualifies for it. If the Superintendent or designee fails to provide this notification, the student shall be eligible for the exemption once notified, even if the notification occurs after the student no longer meets the definition of a child of a military family pursuant to Education Code 49701. (Education Code 51225.1)

If after considering all alternatives, the Superintendent or designee believes that a student who has transferred into the district in grade 12 will not be able to satisfy the district's graduation requirements in time to graduate with his/her class, the Superintendent or designee shall work with the sending district to have the sending district issue the student its diploma, provided the student satisfies that sending district's graduation requirements. (Education Code 49701)

Upon request of a school district to which a former district student has transferred, the Superintendent or designee may issue the district's diploma of graduation to the former student, provided the student has satisfactorily completed the district's graduation requirements, including the passage of the high school exit examination.

To determine whether a child of a military family is in his/her third or fourth year of high school, the district shall use either the number of credits he/she has earned as of the date of the transfer or the length of his/her school enrollment, whichever qualifies him/her for the exemption. (Education Code 51225.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify any child of a military family who is granted an exemption and his/her parent/guardian how any requirements that are waived will affect the student's ability to gain admission to a postsecondary educational institution and shall provide information about transfer opportunities available through the California Community Colleges. (Education Code 51225.1)

The district shall not require or request a child of a military family to transfer schools in order to qualify for an exemption, and no child of a military family or his/her parent/guardian shall be permitted to request a transfer solely to qualify for an exemption. (Education Code 51225.1)

If a child of a military family is exempted from local graduation requirements, the exemption shall continue to apply after the student no longer meets the definition of a child of a military family or if he/she transfers to another school or school district. (Education Code 51225.1)

If the Superintendent or designee determines that a child of a military family is reasonably able to complete district graduation requirements within his/her fifth year of high school, he/she shall: (Education Code 51225.1)

- 1. Inform the student and, if under 18 years of age, his/her parent/guardian of the option available to the student to remain in school for a fifth year to complete the district's graduation requirements and how that will affect his/her ability to gain admission to a postsecondary educational institution
- 2. Provide information to the student about transfer opportunities available through the California Community Colleges
- 3. Upon agreement with the student, or with the parent/guardian if the student is under 18 years of age, permit the student to stay in school for a fifth year to complete the district's graduation requirements

Notification and Complaints

Information regarding the educational rights of children of military families, as specified in Education Code 51225.1 and 51225.2, shall be included in the annual uniform complaint procedures notification distributed to students, parents/guardians,

employees, and other interested parties pursuant to 5 CCR 4622. (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2)

Any complaint alleging that the district has not complied with requirements regarding the education of children of military families, as specified in Education Code 51225.1 or 51225.2, may be filed in accordance with the district's procedures in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.
